Their contribution is making a difference to the lives of children and their families who are going through similar challenges to what Richie and his family faced.

Richie's Rainbow Foundation was launched last March and has already been voted in the top five per cent of Australia's start-up charities for 2022.

This book is a comfort to children going through hospital treatment



UPGRADED LINDUM PARK N RIDE NOW OPEN!

The Siblev Road Lindum Station Park n Ride upgrade is now open and being well used!

I was thrilled to recently open the brand new car park, which boasts 30 additional spaces for



commuters driving to and from Lindum station.

It's secure, convenient parking that will keep more commuter cars out of neighboring residential streets.

The expanded Park n Ride facility on Sibley Road is part of a suite of works and improvements that are being made to increase the safety and accessibility of the Lindum Precinct. This will include a further Park n Ride expansion on North Road; a Station Accessibility Upgrade; and a realignment of the Lindum Level Crossing.

Key benefits of the upgraded carpark include:

- Increased commuter parking spaces.
- · Upgraded disabled parking facilities.
- Improved accessibility for all users.
- Improve passenger amenities, experience, and security through CCTV and lighting.
- Decreased road congestion on the surrounding road network.

I'm delighted to be getting on with the job of delivering these important infrastructure upgrades for the Bayside.

REFORMS TO IMPROVE COMMUNITY TITLE SCHEMES

It's no secret that the Bayside is home to an ever-growing community of residents living in self-contained units under community title schemes, so I am delighted to announce



that the Queensland Government is proposing changes to existing body corporate legislation to improve the liveability and transformability of community title complexes.

The highlights of these reforms include the strengthening of laws to better protect residents from second hand smoke by empowering bodies corporate to make by-laws that prohibit smoking in outdoor and communal areas of a community titles scheme; the addition of new laws to protect pet owners by preventing bodies corporate from banning pets in community titles schemes, except in specific circumstances; and the addition of further laws allowing bodies corporate to tow vehicles which are preventing access or causing a hazard.

Additionally, important legislative reforms will occur to make it easier to sell and redevelop ageing or rundown community titles schemes in Queensland, by allowing for the termination of a scheme with the support of 75 per cent of lot owners, where the body corporate has agreed it is more financially viable for lot owners to terminate rather than maintain or remediate the scheme.

These much needed reforms will not only protect the investments of property owners in community title schemes, but ensure they remain viable and enjoyable places to live for years to come.




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AN INVITATION FOR MEN TO WALK, TALK AND CONNECT

SOCIALISING YOUR PUPPY

BY DR NICKY THOMAS, WYNNUM MANLY VETERINARY HOSPITAL

The socialisation period for puppies is from three to 17 weeks of age. The experiences your puppy has during this time of learning and development can influence their behaviour well into adulthood. To ensure your puppy grows into an adult dog who relates well to other dogs, animals and people it is important to provide socialisation with people and other



animals and exposure to different environments.

This critical time period of socialisation is also an important time to make sure that your puppy stays safe and healthy. Puppies may be socialised with puppies and dogs who are up to date with their vaccinations and worming. You can take your puppy to family and friend's houses to meet their dogs if they are vaccinated. DO NOT take your puppy to areas where there are numbers of unknown dogs until they have had their third puppy vaccination — this is generally performed at 16 weeks of age.

Below are just some of the experiences you should try and provide your puppy.

SOCIALISATION AND DESENSITISATION CHECKLIST

- New environments suburban neighbourhoods, residential and city streets, inside buildings (Bunnings is a favourite!), beaches, forests, parks.
- Objects with wheels skateboards, bikes, rubbish bins, shopping carts, prams, cars, buses, motorbikes.
- New surfaces concrete, metal, unstable surfaces, stairs, wet grass, mud.
- Loud noises thunder, fireworks, alarms, doorbells, barking dogs, vacuum cleaners, traffic.
- Other animals cats, horses, livestock.
- Unfamiliar people people of different ages, genders, appearances, ethnicities; people wearing hats, helmets, boots; people using canes or walkers; people running, walking and crawling.

Interactions should be safe and positive — if your puppy is showing signs of fear and stress during socialisation you should remove them from the situation. Work slowly and carefully with your puppy and reward calm behaviours when they are exposed to new situations. Have a chat with your vet about other ways to help your puppy adjust to the big wide world!

WHAT IS A HOME MEDICINES REVIEW?

FROM MANLY VILLAGE MEDICAL

A Home Medicines Review is a free service that can be organised by your GP. The purpose of the review is to improve your understanding of the medicines you are using, including over the counter medications, herbs and vitamins.

During the visit, a pharmacist will attend your home and address any questions and concerns you may have about your medications. This may include how well the medications are working and any side-effects you may be experiencing. If you use inhalers, patches, creams and eye or ear drops, the pharmacist will also ensure that they are being used correctly.

You may be eligible for a home medicines review if you:

- take lots of medicines
- have medicines prescribed by different doctors
- started a new medicine
- · have recently been in hospital
- · feel unwell after taking medicines
- don't always remember to take your medicines
- are concerned about your medicines

Following the review, a report will be provided to your GP along with any recommendations to help you get the best from your medicines. Your GP will then discuss the report with you and make any necessary changes. If you or a person you care for lives in an aged-care home, the pharmacist will visit you at the aged-care home and talk to you, your family, carers, or staff about your medicines.




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Rent control not a panacea for rental pain

The Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ) says calls from tenants' advocates for rent control in Queensland is a short-sighted solution to a complex problem.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said rent control would not be a panacea for the rental crisis and would likely have the opposite effect and exacerbate challenging rental conditions.

"We are acutely aware of the devastating impacts of the rental crisis and against that backdrop, it's understandable that some tenants' advocates are proposing rent control as a solution – but rent control is not the panacea that many argue it to be," she said.

"It's clear Queensland does not have sufficient rental housing supply to meet the ever-increasing demand for rental properties and, as a result, we are living in the tightest rental market in the history of our state. These tight conditions make for an incredibly challenging environment for renters.

"However, rent control is a short-sighted solution to a complex problem and could in

fact significantly deter property investment and reduce rental supply at a time when we're already in a rental crisis."

Ms Mercorella said everyone was feeling the pressure of inflation and increasing costs.

"it's unsustainable to assume property investors will keep meeting free-market driven cost increases such as mortgage repayments, rates, repairs and maintenance, and insurance, while artificially capped rents create a hard limit on their return to cover such expenses," she said.

"Given regular Mum and Dad property investors provide the vast majority of housing for our state's rental community, with the Government's social housing supply program accounting for under 4 per cent, it needs to be recognised that the contribution of property investors to housing Queenslanders is vital.

"If even a small percentage of investors were to sell their properties or withdraw them from the permanent rental market, this would have a material impact on the Queensland rental sector."

She stressed the importance of ensuring our state has fair and balanced rental legislation.

"We are in extraordinary times and we need to be careful about creating a regulatory framework designed to respond to some fairly exceptional circumstances," she said.

"Rental legislation needs to work in all markets and it needs to be fair and balanced because on one hand, renters need to be afforded statutory protections and on the other, if restrictions on what property owners can and can't do become too onerous, there will be a proportion of property owners who simply choose to walk away.

"This delicate balancing act is a tricky one to get right, but it's important that the regulatory framework is fairly balanced and isn't too tipped in the favour of one party."

Ms Mercorella said last year the State Government introduced rental reforms to give greater rights and protections to tenants.

"There are already statutory constraints that relate to rent in Queensland that limit how frequently you can increase rent and provide

rules around the way rent increases are implemented," she said.

"There's also important statutory safeguards in place to enable tenants to dispute excessive rent increases with QCAT."

She said the rental crisis ultimately comes back to supply.

"This is not a problem that has emerged overnight, and while COVID has had a role to play, the number of dwellings being built in Queensland has diminished considerably over the last five years and our future pipeline is also likely to fall short of demand," she said.

"Until we are able to achieve a greater balance between the demand for rental housing and supply, and introduce greater diversity of housing, we won't be able to fix this critical problem we are facing.

"What's needed is a concerted effort from all levels of government to create the right environment to sustain existing established rental stock and to build new housing each year that matches targets based on detailed population forecasts."

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
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Location, land and lifestyle

There is something intrinsic about purchasing land and building your own home that some people prefer to give the whole process a wide berth. In contrast, others feel that's the only way they will get the desired home after exhausting available established homes. Still, others see it as a rite of passage, one of their life goals - collecting the keys to that never-lived-inbefore home!

Irrespective of how they arrived on the doorstep of building a new home, let's take a quick look at some items to consider along the way.

Are there some nervous nellies still out there in relation to building? Yes! And rightly so, caution always needs to be taken when purchasing a block of land and building.

You'll want to check you're comfortable with the suburb, the street and the position of the street. For example, is the land on the high or low side of the street? What is the direction of the fall on the site, i.e. does the water run to the rear, front, or side of the block? Are the services (water/sewer) etc., ready to go/included? Are titles issued, or are they still being processed?

It's also wise to have a soil test carried out, or stipulated in the contract, to make sure you are happy with the earth, and to ensure the soil type is compatible with the method of building within your budget. Does the soil require a standard slab, or are pier footings required, which add to the construction cost?

A big ticket item that can blow your budget is site works: the cost of excavating and retaining. Another element is flooding/overland flow, which is not ideal, but not a complete knockout. If there's overland flow, you need to be aware of costs added and the different types of build required, i.e. the sub-floor being above a certain height from the natural earth.

Height restrictions for most standard residential areas allow a maximum height of 9.5 metres. A factor to consider here is the zoning of your proposed land. Are there protected trees that you have to factor in keeping and working around? If you have a pool in mind, check that anything subterranean that you can't see with the naked eye doesn't impede your plans.


You may have an ideal home design in mind. Does the building envelope allow you to build that vision, with the home's orientation just how you want it? It also doesn't hurt to take a look around the left/right and behind your lot to see any obvious issues that may be apparent with neighbours. Does it all seem peaceful and quiet enough?

Walking a block of land, dreaming up the ideal build, seeing it through to completion, and enjoying living in the creation that was (and is) yours - now that's the exciting stuff!

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

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2022 Queensland vacancy rates end on a low note

While market pressures have pinned Queensland vacancy rates down during 2022, REIQ data released showed the year ended with a slight uplift across the state.

Of the 50 local government areas and sub regions covered in the REIQ's Residential Vacancy Rate Report for the December 2022 Quarter, 43 experienced a vacancy rate rise compared to the previous quarter, while the remaining seven were static.

The state-wide vacancy rate rose from 0.6 per cent in the September quarter to 0.8 per cent to close the year, at an improved yet still critically low rate.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella welcomed the momentary relief but said vacancy rates were still far too low to be considered 'healthy' and it was too early to draw conclusions that there is a material shift in the rental market

Promising as this news may seem, we're taking it with a grain of salt until we see if this is uplift is here to stay or if it's merely a seasonal fluctuation," Ms Mercorella said.

"Tiny movements, however hopeful, should not be overanalysed. What this essentially means is the market is holding tight, and only time will tell if a trend is emerging.

An influx of rental property changeovers at the end of the year is certainly not a new phenomenon, and the past decade of vacancy rates reveals patterns of generally higher vacancies in December.

"However, the REIQ is hearing from property managers that there is noticeably less exit and entry activity than usual, as there's still plenty of tenants that are staying put and choosing to renew their lease rather than compete for a new place.

"Even with this small improvement in rates, let's not forget that we're still talking about incredibly low vacancy figures which tells us there's no-where near enough rental properties to meet demand, and tough conditions continue for tenants."

While upward movements in most areas stayed between 0.1 – 0.3 per cent, Redland's Bay Islands rose by 1.8 per cent to a considerably weak vacancy rate of 6.0 per cent, and Mount Isa was a standout lifting by 1.1 per cent to 2.4 per cent – teetering on the edge of 'healthy'.

Other regional areas which saw vacancy rates relax substantially over the quarter were Gladstone (1.6%), Mackay (1.0%), Townsville (1.0%) and neighbouring Burdekin (1.1%), Central Highlands (0.9%), Isaac (1.7%), Lockyer Valley (0.8%), and Maranoa (0.9%).

Similarly, tourism areas which welcomed markedly more residential vacancies in the December quarter, were Hervey Bay (1.1%) and Fraser Coast (0.9%).

Meanwhile, the Gold Coast and Sunshine Coast rates barely budged, both now sitting at 0.7 per cent, and there was no relief whatsoever for the Caloundra Coast (0.7%), Maroochy Coast (0.4%) or Sunshine Coast Hinterland (0.4%) which includes towns such as Maleny, Nambour and Eumundi.

With no surprises on the list, the regions that took out the tightest vacancy rates in the state were Southern Downs (0.2%), Cook (0.3%), Goondiwindi (0.3%) and Tablelands (0.3%).

Ms Mercorella said the REIQ's expectation is that this year will bring more of the same stubbornly tight conditions for the Queensland rental market.



"It's likely that 2023 will be a case of – New year, same rental pressures," she said.

"Our state will continue to feel the impact of population growth with very strong interstate migration as well international migration including students set to return in force to the southeast corner.

"This increased demand will continue to apply pressure to an already strained rental market.

"Queensland is crying out for additional housing supply to ease the tight conditions, but building costs and planning red tape are putting the brakes on new construction, while higher costs, more challenging lending conditions, and reduced legislative rights are deterring vital private property investment.

"This report has delivered some fleeting good news, but we're certainly not at a turning point yet, and with these economic factors continuing to apply pressure, it's hard to see any significant changes in sight."



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SOLAR-POWERED EV'S SET TO TRANSFORM OUR LIVES

FROM GOODHEW ELECTRICAL AND SOLAR

Electric vehicles and solar power are two technologies that are transforming the way we generate and use energy. The combination of these two technologies could have a profound impact on the way we power our homes in Australia. With the rise of EVs and solar power, we have a unique opportunity to transition towards a more sustainable and environmentally friendly future.

The transportation sector is one of the largest contributors to greenhouse gas emissions. According to the Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resources, in 2020, the transportation sector accounted for 18% of Australia's total greenhouse gas emissions. 100 YEARS OF WYNNUM GOLF CLUB

FROM THE WYNNUM HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Last year marked the centenary celebrations of the local Wynnum Golf Club (or WGC). At our November 2022 meeting, society member (and also WGC member) Michael Beard spoke about some of the highlights of WGC's first 100 years.

Brisbane residents started playing golf in the late 1800s. The arrival of Governor Lord Lamington – a keen golfer – in April 1896 helped promote the game in our city.

It wasn't until 1921 that community members here in Wynnum resolved to establish a golf course in the Wynnum-Manly area. Shortly thereafter — on 19 July 1922 — a meeting was held at the Wynnum Town Hall, and the Wynnum Golf Club was formed, with the then Mayor of Wynnum (Ald. John Greene) as the Club President.

Within months, the site for the golf course had been chosen: a piece of swampy land known as Lovekin's Paddock (or Lovekin's Estate), which was part of the WGC site as we know it today. The Wynnum Town Council bought the land and granted WGC an initial 21-year lease. Wynnum Golf Club's nine-hole course was opened on 29 March 1924 by the then president of the Queensland Golf Association (and WGC Member), Mr JW Brook. At the opening, Mr Brook spoke very

highly of golf and also of our beloved Wynnum-Manly when he said, "that it was fast becoming recognised that any community desiring to be acclaimed progressive must have a golf course and that the district was to be congratulated on being thoroughly up to date".' Well played, Wynnum-Manly!

An imposing two-storey timber clubhouse was constructed and opened by His Excellency the Governor of Queensland, Sir Mathew Nathan, at a gala event on 14 February 1925.

In subsequent years, additional land was purchased, and the nine-hole course became a standard 18-hole course. Manual labour – volunteered by humans and the WGC's resident Clydesdale horse 'Larry' – was invaluable in the early development of the course. The 18-hole course was opened officially by the then Lord Mayor of Brisbane (Ald. Roberts) on 15 September 1928. In 1929, the annual membership at WGC cost two guineas.

Since its opening, the course has been upgraded a number of times, including for layout, greens, irrigation and drainage.

Wynnum Golf Club is listed on the Brisbane City Council's Local

Heritage Places website as a place of local heritage significance (relevant criteria: historical, representative, aesthetic, social). WGC is the third oldest championship course in Brisbane (after Brisbane Golf Club and Royal Queensland Golf Club).


From a piece of swampy land to the beautifully landscaped and wildlife-friendly course we know today, and from 91 members in 1924 to more than 1,400 today, our local Wynnum Golf Club has had a successful first 100 years. Happy Birthday to Wynnum Golf Club!

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CATCHING TIGER SQUID IS FUN, GIVE IT A TRY THIS MONTH!

It's that time of the year when the tiger squid are at their best, and it's great fun for all, and I'm finding the kids, in particular, love catching them.

Some folks make it sound hard to find tiger squid in Moreton Bay, but let me tell you, it's easy. A whiting rod and a squid jig are all you need. Cast over the weed banks (especially in whiting areas) and slowly retrieve with or without jerking the rod. If the squid are there, they will grab the jig, and then it's only a matter of slowly retrieving them. A net close to the boat is good, or you can lift them out of the water and grab between the squid's body and head. When you turn them upside down, water will be released, and it can't ink you! If there is no water in the squid's body, it can't ink you. And don't believe the stories about leaving squid in water to get rid of all the ink - it's not true; they only mix a small amount with water to spurt out, and they have plenty of ink to do that.

So where are the tiger squid? Try the shallow weed banks on the western side of Moreton Island, the

Small Boat Channel to the Rous entrance, the Rainbow Channel, and all the Bay Islands when the water is clean.

The rods and reels you need are the same as any whiting rods you have, but I would recommend good quality squid jigs like Yamashita and Daiwa and Masuta. The colours I find best are any of the orange prawn patterns. Pilchard colours and reds work best for me, and there are plenty of variations on the market. I tend to buy too many to ever use, so three or four jigs are all you need.

So go get them, tiger squid are great fun to catch and very tasty to eat, and I hope you get inked as this means you've caught some (even the author gets inked sometimes).

Moreton Bay reports. Water Tower Bait and Tackle at Manly carry all the jigs I use.

PORT TIDINGS MARCH 2023 LATEST NEWS FROM THE PORT OF BRISBANE



Port of Brisbane is Queensland's largest multi-cargo port, handling 95% of the state's containers and motor vehicles, and approximately 50% of its agricultural exports.

Over 70 businesses are located within the port precinct, employing thousands of people. We're also an active member of the local and regional community, supporting not-for-profit and community organisations and playing our part in protecting and enhancing the natural environment.

TRADE

The demand for imported goods experienced during the Covid pandemic – which led to record import container throughput - is softening, with volumes falling for the fourth consecutive month up to December 2022. Import container volumes are dominated by household goods, building materials, electrical goods and general retail items, all of which increased significantly over the last two financial years.

However the challenging economic outlook, including increasing cost of living pressures, is anticipated to result in lower demand for imported goods until consumer confidence and cost of living pressures improve.

COMMUNITY

ENVIRONMENT

Waders or shorebirds are birds commonly found around shorelines and mudflats and includes a large number of different species. The Port of Brisbane has been undertaking monthly shorebird counts with the Queensland Wader Study Group (QWSG) since 2005.

Large numbers of these birds use the Port and other nearby natural areas on port land as places to roost at high tide.

We undertook a count on Sunday 22 January, which was predicted to be one of the highest tides in Brisbane during 2023. In total 11,757 birds were recorded using the Port's roosting habitats. The data collected by QWSG is used to support the research and protection of shorebirds locally and further afield.

BRISBANE INTERNATIONAL CRUISE TERMINAL

Cruising out of Brisbane celebrated a big milestone in February, with the 100th vessel calling at the new Brisbane International Cruise Terminal in Pinkenba.

Not only are they a spectacular sight, but cruise ships are already bringing a welcome economic boost each visit - it's estimated that every cruise ship call contributes almost \$1 million to Queensland's economy.

Over the next decade, cruising out of Brisbane is estimated to contribute around \$1.15 billion to the state economy.

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SPONSOR THE RESTORATION OF A CLASSIC MOTORCYCLE

Redland Museum is embarking on a major restoration of an Indian Scout motorcycle and needs your help through "sponsorship of a part".

First built in 1919, the Indian Scout has become the machine most closely identified with that great manufacturer, which was America's most prolific motorcycle company for many years. The 1926 Indian Scout, which is to be restored, is claimed to be the best-known Indian of all – a 606cc, 12 HP twin model.

The project will be set up in the museum as a display of a "restoration in progress" with a storyboard. The work will be carried out by volunteers in the museum's workshop. Still, some specialist tasks (sandblasting, chrome plating, etc.) will need to be outsourced.

Indian motorcycles of this vintage are hugely collectable and valuable. This is reflected in the availability and cost of either original or replacement parts. SIMPLY SCRUMPTIOUS SLOW COOKED BOLOGNESE RECIPE

It's a crowd pleaser, and for good reason. Everyone has their own version of this easy meal, but here's one with a few twists. Slow cooking in the oven lets the flavours develop; the balsamic adds some sweetness and the rosemary and chilli give the sauce its zing. This is a great recipe to make on a lazy weekend or when you want to feed a crowd.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 onion, finely diced
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 500g pork mince
- 1/4 cup of red wine
- · 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 1 tbsp of balsamic glaze
- 1 (700g) jar of tomato passata
- 1 (400g) tin of tomatoes
- 1 cup of chicken stock
- 1 small sprig of fresh rosemary
- 1 dried chilli (optional)
- Dried pasta (spaghetti or rigatoni)
- 2 tbsp butter
- Parmesan and lemon slices (for serving)

METHOD

- 1. Preheat your oven to 150°C
- 2. In a Dutch oven or a large pot with a lid, gently fry the onion over a low heat until it is transparent. Add the mince and garlic, then turn up the heat to medium and brown.
- 3. Add the red wine and cook for a minute or so until it has evaporated.
- Add the rosemary, tomato paste, passata, tomatoes, chicken stock and balsamic (and your chilli, if using) and bring to a simmer.
- 5. Put the lid on your pot and place it in the oven.
- 6. Bake for 1.5 hours.

- 7. Remove the pot from the oven and check the sauce. If it's not thick enough, pop it on the stovetop without the lid over a medium heat until it thickens.
- 8. Cook your pasta as per packet instructions and drain.
- 9. In the same pot you cooked the pasta in, melt the butter over a medium-low heat. Add a portion of the pasta, followed by the sauce, then heat through, and remove from heat.
- 10. Serve with a sprinkling of freshly grated parmesan and a squeeze of lemon (optional).



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WHAT TO EXPECT WHEN GETTING YOUR WISDOM TOOTH REMOVED

FROM DENTAL ON CAMBRIDGDE

Wisdom teeth, also known as third molars, are the last teeth to come in, usually appearing in the late teenage years or early adulthood. They can cause problems if they don't have enough room to come in properly, leading to pain, infection, and other issues. In some cases these may need to be removed, they can sometimes be removed at your local dentist, or in other cases, you will need to see a specialist such as an oral maxillofacial surgeon.

Here is what you can expect when getting your wisdom tooth removed:

Consultation: The first step in the process of wisdom tooth removal is to consult with a dentist. You can do this during your routine examination and clean, or can book a consultation appointment if they're starting to give you trouble. During this consultation, the dentist will assess your oral health and determine if wisdom tooth extraction is indicated. Often, the dentist will want to take x-rays of the wisdom teeth and may want to take an OPG (Orthopantomagram) which is a panoramic scanning dental X-ray of the upper and lower jaw. This type of x-ray will show the roots of the wisdom teeth and will help the dentist to determine if the wisdom teeth can be taken out safely within the normal dental practice setting. If they can, the dentist will discuss any potential risks and benefits of the procedure and answer any questions you may have.

If they can't be taken out at your local practice, you will need a referral to see a specialist. If you do need a referral, the dentist will send your

records, including any x-rays with the referral to the specialist for you. There are several options available, such as having your wisdom teeth extracted while you are currently in the specialists practice or under general anaesthesia with the specialist.

Preparation: If your dentist determines that wisdom tooth extraction is necessary, they will provide you with instructions on how to prepare for the procedure if it is to be undertaken un their practice. This may include stopping smoking to improve idealic healing, adjusting any medications that may interfere with the procedure and a consultation with your GP regarding the adjustment of any prescriptions.

Procedure: Wisdom tooth extraction is typically a surgical procedure. This means the dentist may need to cut the wisdom tooth into pieces to remove it, you may have stiches after the procedure, or they may be so ready to come out they're no trouble at all. The thing about wisdom teeth is that every single case is different to the next. Your dentist is highly trained and should only undertake extractions that they feel are within their scope of practice and skill level. The procedure can take anywhere from 40 minutes to 1.5 hours depending on the number of wisdom teeth to be extracted.


After the procedure: After the wisdom tooth has been removed, the dentist will provide you with instructions on how to care for the extraction site and manage any pain or discomfort. It is important to follow these instructions carefully to ensure a smooth and successful



recovery. If you have any concerns at all following your procedure, you should follow-up with a phone call to your dentist's practice.

Follow-up care: If required, your dentist may schedule a follow-up appointment approximately one week after your procedure. This is to check on the healing process and ensure that the extraction site is healing properly, it may also be to remove any stitches. It is important to attend this appointment as scheduled to ensure that there are no complications.


