Dog sports competitors Sharon Clark and Christine Smith will be working together to stage two demonstrations featuring their talented border collies, and you'll want to dance along with them.

The first will be a Dances With Dogs demonstration during which Sharon and her three border collies, Holly, Gift and young Banjo, will perform some of their breathtaking routines to music.

Sharon's older dog, Holly, is an Australian champion at the sport and seeing the connection between Sharon and her dogs as they perform a routine is really special. What makes it all the more amazing is that Holly has been deaf for many years and Sharon uses hand signals to communicate.

She will be supported by Christine and her border collie Tweed, one of the first dogs in Australia to win an advanced tricks sport title. The pair have only just started competing in Dances With Dogs but because of their advanced tricks background they will also be able to showcase a high-level routine.

Later in the day, Sharon and Christine will combine to do a tricks demonstration and show you step-by-step how you can teach your dog some of the easier tricks at home.














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ROTARY TO THE RESCUE: LOCAL LANDMARK RESTORED

Back in the early 1920s permission was granted by the Wynnum Town Council for Neville Balgue to build a boat slip that he could use to float his 22ft trailer sailer "Lizzy" at high tide, and at low tide scrape off any barnacles ready for painting. The boat slip became known as Balgue's Slip.

After many years of neglect the slip needed urgent repairs and on the 21st of October 2012, 12 members of The Rotary Club of Wynnum and Manly replaced the ageing timbers and supports — breathing an extended life into this historic Wynnum landmark.

In 2023 many local residents expressed their concerns that the historic Balgue's Slip was once again in need of repair as the timbers were rotting and the structure breaking away. Permission was sought and



granted for the Rotary Club of Wynnum and Manly to undertake the restoration with the assistance of a grant from the Port of Brisbane.

It took ten enthusiastic Rotarians, many pieces of special hardwood and several hours working at low tide to completely remove the deteriorated timbers and replace them with fresh hardwood and stainless-steel components ready for another decade or more of life.

Thank you to everybody who worked together to finalise this project and to the Rotary Club of Wynnum and Manly and Port of Brisbane for their ongoing community support!

JOAN PEASE'S COMMUNITY UPDATE, STATE MEMBER FOR LYTTON

COST OF LIVING RELIEF FOR THE BAYSIDE



The cost of living is a significant issue affecting Baysiders and families across the country.

In response, the Queensland government has announced measures and initiatives to relieve the financial pressure on individuals and families.

These include a Rental Security Subsidy to pay a portion of rent directly to the property manager for up to 12 months, limiting rent increases to once a year, and cost-of-living relief for pensioners and seniors covering bills such as electricity, water, local government rates, and even providing a free pair of basic prescription glasses every two years.

Additionally, there is support for households such as cheaper learner licences, discounted public transport fares for children and students, rental bond loans, and fee-free TAFE available for eligible Queenslanders.

Emergency relief programs are also available to provide financial and material support to those in financial crisis, and several charities offer support to Queenslanders in need.

The Queensland Government has also announced a further electricity rebate for households next financial year, which will be higher than last year's \$175 rebate.

VAPING INQUIRY OFFICIALLY COMMENCED

I'm travelling with the Health and Environment Committee this week as we conduct an inquiry into e-cigarette usage in Queensland.

The Health and Environment Committee (the committee) are inquiring into and reporting to the Legislative Assembly by 31 August



2023 on reducing rates of e-cigarette use in Queensland

In undertaking the inquiry, the committee will consider:

- The current status in Queensland relating to the:
 - prevalence of e-cigarette use, particularly amongst children and young
- risks of vaping harmful chemicals, including nicotine, to individuals, communities, and the health system; and
- approaches being taken in Queensland schools and other settings relevant to children and young people to discourage uptake and use of e-cigarettes.
- Opportunities to increase:
 - awareness of the harmful effects of e-cigarette use (with and without nicotine) to an individual's health, and the effectiveness of preventative activities: and
 - accessibility and effectiveness of services and programs to prevent uptake and continuing use of e-cigarettes.
 - Consideration of waste management and environmental impacts of e-cigarette products.
 - A jurisdictional analysis of other e-cigarette use inquiries, legislative frameworks, policies and preventative activities (including their effectiveness in reducing e-cigarette use).

Submissions are still open for the Vaping - An Inquiry into reducing E-Cigarette use in QLD. I encourage you to make a submission by visiting my website.

The vehicle is a top-of-the-line Mercedes Sprinter 419, funded through a commitment of \$246,000 as part of the 2021-22 Vehicle Build

The new ambulance is an exciting addition to our Bayside's emergency services. Equipped with the latest medical equipment, it is sure to enhance our emergency response capabilities and provide Baysiders with better and faster medical assistance when they need it the most.

This is also an important investment in the safety and well-being of Lytton residents. It is a reminder of how crucial it is to invest in emergency services and infrastructure, especially in communities like ours.



The delivery of the new ambulance fills me with hope and confidence that Baysiders are in good hands in case of a medical emergency. I look forward to the positive impact this new ambulance will have on our Bayside.

WYNNUM FIRE AND RESCUE STATION RECEIVES **NEW FIRE TRUCK**

A new, locally manufactured fire truck has officially been delivered to the Wynnum Fire and Rescue Station!

I recently had the pleasure of attending the handover of the truck, which is dedicated to the memory of Firefighter Jeffrey



Bruce Penfold, who lost his life in the line of duty in 2001

The new truck is a welcome addition to the Wynnum Fire and Rescue Station, and is worth approximately \$1.2 million with an operational lifespan of approximately 15 years.

It's fitted with a 3,000-litre water tank, and will be critical in boosting the emergency response to industrial incidents.

This state-of-the-art firefighting truck was also built just down the road at local body manufacturer Liquip Sales, at Pinkenba, supporting good local jobs for the community.

Our dedicated crews deserve the very best equipment, and this new appliance will support the day-to-day needs of the Wynnum team, while importantly, it will also assist in the emergency response for industrial incidents.

TUNNEL VISION UPDATE

In November last year I provided an update about a true nation building project for the Bayside – 'Tunnel Vision'. This project has the potential to take hundreds of thousands of trucks off our local Bayside roads and make Brisbane the logistics capital of the nation!

I recently spoke about the Inland Rail project in Parliament last month and highlighted the countless economic, social and environmental benefits of my Tunnel Vision proposal. Tunnel Vision will add 1200 new jobs per year while drastically reducing local congestion and noise pollution on the Bayside.

However, there has been one major hurdle in finalising plans for this project. The Port of Brisbane

Strategic Rail Access Study has not yet been released by the Queensland State Government. I wrote to the Queensland State Minister for Transport and Main Roads back in February 2021, to urge him to release the findings of the report. However, two years later on and this taxpayer funded report has still not been released. This is unfair and un-Australian.

I am again calling on the Queensland State Government to release this report to ensure that I, along with my State and Council colleagues, can engage in community feedback. If you would like more information, or to see my speech in Parliament, please head to my website, rossvasta.com.au.

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COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUT CARING FOR KANGAROO PAW PLANTS

FROM THE NURSO

The Nurso's horticultural team answers five of the most commonly asked questions about caring for kangaroo paw plants.

Have you ever seen vibrant kangaroo paw plants and thought you'd love them in your garden? Then you're in luck! The Nurso's talented team of horticultural experts answer the top five most commonly asked questions about these beautiful native plants below.

1. Are there different varieties of kangaroo paws?

Yes! There are short and tall varieties of kangaroo paws. The dwarf varieties are generally viewed as annuals or biennials, whilst the tall varieties are more reliable.

2. What two things do all kangaroo paws need to thrive?

There are two things that all kangaroo paws need: full sun and very well drained soil. For this reason, they love living in pots, particularly the dwarf varieties. It's a good thing The Nurso currently has an extensive range of select pots on sale (while supplies last).

3. How do I keep kangaroo paws looking their best?

One word: pruning! To keep them looking their best, try cutting

back flower stems at the base as they brown - this will encourage new flowers to form.

4. My kangaroo paws are getting black ink spots. How do I stop this?

If you live in Brisbane, there's a good chance your kangaroo paw is prone to getting black ink spots. This is because humid weather causes discoloration in the petals.

If you notice any black ink spots cut back to about 3-5cm above the crown. This will get rid of any affected leaves and helps to prevent disease spreading.

5. Do kangaroo paws attract native animals?

Yes! One of the best parts about growing a native plant is creating a microenvironment in your garden. According to Gardening Australia, kangaroo paws attract honeyeaters, red wattle birds and eastern spinebills.

Pop on down to The Nurso and grab a kangaroo paw plant today!

The Nurso's gardening centre is open seven days a week until 4pm. Their friendly and knowledgable horticultural team can help with all your gardening needs.

Your worst habit? Barking at the front door for no reason so Mum will come to the front door with me.



CARING FOR SENIOR PETS

Dogs and cats age at different rates to humans. Generally dogs and cats are considered "senior" at around 8 - 10 years of age.

Here are some tips to keep your senior pet as happy and healthy as possible.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR PET'S MOUTH

Dental disease can be painful and may lead to food avoidance which results in weight loss. Cats may also lose grooming behaviours which can lead to a decline in mobility due to matting. Periodontal disease can affect other organs including the heart and kidneys. Regular dental chews or cleaning can help prevent periodontal disease.

FEED YOUR PET TO MAINTAIN IDEAL BODY WEIGHT

Ageing pets have different energy and protein requirements. Feeding your pet a diet formulated for older animals can help to maintain weight in the healthy range and reduce the risk of worsening conditions such as arthritis and kidney disease. Supplements such as omega fatty acids, glucosamine and chondroitin may be helpful in pets with arthritis.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS

Older, arthritic animals may benefit from ramps in place of stairs, and the use of rugs or carpet on hard floor surfaces to help gain traction. A soft bed which is easy to access can help rest tired joints. Older cats may benefit from a litter tray with lower sides for ease of access.




EXERCISE IS IMPORTANT TO MAINTAIN HEALTHY JOINTS AND MUSCLES

The intensity and type of exercise needs to be tailored to individual pets. Regular, gentle exercise can help maintain joint mobility and maintain a healthy weight.

SCHEDULE REGULAR CHECK UPS

A full vet check every 6-12 months can help with early detection of problems. Your vet may suggest a screening blood test which can help pick up changes in liver and kidney function, changes in blood cell counts and thyroid hormone levels. Blood pressure measurement can help detect heart and kidney disease.

Get yourself down to Kitchener Park for some magnificent grassroots rugby league and support the next wave of future stars.





LET'S TALK ABOUT IRON INFUSIONS!

Iron infusion is a rapid way to replenish the body of iron and I will recommend it to patients who struggle to remember to take their oral iron supplements or are unable to tolerate the side effects associated with it. Iron infusions have also been shown to be beneficial in certain patients with chronic kidney disease and heart failure.





The process takes just over an hour at our clinic with the actual infusion duration only 20 minutes. There is a lot of effort made to check baseline observations, finding a good vein and making sure the cannula is working well. Our patients are always closely monitored with either the GP or practice nurse staying in the same room while the infusion takes place and we monitor the observations regularly.

Common immediate side effects include headache, nausea and rashes and are usually easily manageable. However, there are two important complications that patients need to be aware of namely severe allergic reaction and iron staining

Severe allergic reaction can be a life threatening situation and therefore we take extra caution to monitor the patient so we can act on any immediate symptom. Iron staining tends to develop after the infusion and happens as a result of extravasation of the iron into the surrounding soft tissue. It leads to a permanent discoloration of the skin and that is why we take extra steps to ensure the cannula flushes well.

We love to discuss iron deficiency, explore causes of iron deficiency and plan for infusions with patients at Baywest Medical Centre. Side effects aside, I have received a lot of positive feedback from patients and believe it has an essential role in managing iron deficiency.



Time to wind back foreign investor surcharge, says REIQ

The Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ) is calling on the Queensland Government to rescind foreign investor surcharges, in light of the state's housing crisis.

The REIQ has long-opposed both the seven per cent surcharge applied to stamp duty introduced in October 2016, and the additional two per cent surcharge applied to land tax introduced in 2019 on Queensland property held by foreign entities.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella explained that both additional taxes on foreign investors – who are already being taxed at a Federal level - act as a deterrent for capital to be deployed in Queensland.

"When the Labor Government introduced additional surcharges for property transactions from foreign buyers, the REIQ called it out as a cash grab which would deter desperately-needed property investment and would slam the state shut for business," she said.

"A growing population is a great thing for our economy, but in order to welcome more people and reap these benefits, we also need to be welcoming investment in housing - particularly when it helps get new residential supply off the ground."

Ms Mercorella said that given the current housing crisis it was time for these taxes to be fully phased out.

"With about 36% of people in Queensland living in rental accommodation, the supply of rental properties is crucial, and therefore we need investors – both local and foreign – to make important contributions to the stability of the rental market," Ms Mercorella said.

"Queensland Revenue can offer ex

gratia relief where projects enhance the community or the economy," she explained.

"Given the ongoing housing crisis, surely any projects that provide a roof over the head of Queenslanders and increase much-needed housing stock would meet this criterion.

"We saw that with Build to Rent projects the Government was prepared to offer this relief to large foreign multi nationals investing in that asset class.

"This leads to the danger of a skew towards this asset class when diversity is required to meet the ever-changing demands of Queensland's growing population.

"Therefore, the REIQ's view is that it would be appropriate to extend this exemption to all foreign investors, not just foreign



pension funds and developers."

She said that a recent ruling in New South Wales found foreign investment surcharges to be in breach of Commonwealth Double Taxation agreements.

"This ruling also gives weight to the argument that the Queensland Government needs to fully rescind these additional taxes to ensure Queensland aligns with Commonwealth laws and agreements," Ms Mercorella said.

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The economic and emotional aspects of a great view

How has a view of any kind - particularly of the water - become a dominant factor and a highly sought-after checklist item when it comes to quality of life?

In this article, I'll touch on the economic factors attached to a view and explore how much a great view adds to a property's worth (a deep question), how much value and happiness it brings, and does that happiness last (a very subjective question). Is a view tied to social prestige, or is there a deeper, ancient calling to be close to the water; is it a security element, i.e. keeping an eye out on the horizon for invading armada?

Let's start by applying Maslow's hierarchy of needs, which states that humans have a rung of needs that starts with covering the basic needs of food, shelter etc.

As long as we have a roof over our heads, we are OK; at this stage, no water view is OK.

Then we move on to safety and security - location becomes important and is likely one of the biggest cogs in the property market engine. People are seeking a healthy, safe environment that offers employment and affordability. This applies to Wynnum/Manly in particular, as we have

employment hubs in relatively close reach, while our area supports a relaxed, affordable lifestyle. This would help explain Brisbane's increased and continuing demand throughout the 2021 boom and the ever-increasing improvements in variable conditions of the last 12 months.

On the third rung, we seek love and a sense of belonging. Wynnum and Manly have a strong sense of community connection, encapsulating friendships fostered by local organisations, from fitness and sporting clubs to community groups such as Rotary.

The fourth rung includes confidence, achievement, and the need to be a unique individual. This is where purchasing a home, building, or renovating is an opportunity to express individual personality and taste in the architecture, internally and externally. The location of a home – the street and suburb – gives the owner an opportunity for unique expression from an architectural perspective, which is also influenced by the home's view and aspect.

Last but not least, we have the highest point of the pyramid: self-actualisation, creativity, experiencing purpose, meaning and inner potential. This can be relevant to waking up and opening the curtains (or most likely, they have already automatically opened as the sun strikes its sensors), looking out to the vastness of the open ocean (or, in our case Moreton Bay and the islands beyond). Our love of water is ancient; a calm sense of tranquillity comes with a water vista. It's also entertaining. Water changes and moves in subtle and dramatic ways daily and even hourly.

This being said, what dollar value is incorporated in a view? It's a big broad question, so any attempt to answer this "kahuna" of a question will be subjective and a best guess, but we'll try! One arbitrary percentage is an approximate 30-40% increase for great views, based on data, first-hand experience and casting the question across to colleagues in the real estate industry. Examples include recent land sales on the west side of Tingal Road versus the water view-positioned side. Sales on the west side of Tingal Road are approximately \$700,000s, increasing up to the circa \$1m+ mark for blocks with a water view position.

The desire will likely always be strong for a location that's either near a major CBD or the water – in our case here in Wynnum/Manly, we have both.







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

 The tempering valve mixes the water coming from the tank at above 60C with cold water to a safer delivery temperature of 50C or lower to prevent scalds.



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REIQ welcomes pause on interest rate pressures

The Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ) has welcomed the RBA's decision to leave cash rates on hold this month, an important pause after 10 consecutive rises took it to a near 10-year high of 3.6%.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said the pause was a welcome reprieve to homeowners and small businesses who were unfairly carrying the burden of fixing the inflation curse.

"Around 650,000 households in Queensland are mortgaged and it's likely the RBA's aggressive tightening cycle is already weighing heavily on many mortgage holders," she said.

"A pause in interest rate hikes is an appropriate response at this time, allowing households and businesses a few moments to pause and assess their expenditure.

"It also gives first home buyers a chance to stabilise their borrowing capacity.

"Further, with loan activity for new builds at 18-year lows in Queensland, the pause will give consumers more confidence to proceed with building their dream homes."

She called for the Government to ensure that fiscal policy did its part to curb inflation.

"Now it's important that the Government follows suit to ensure that fiscal policy matches monetary policy."

As World Blind Golf CEO Neil Herdegen explains, golf is a perfect sport for people who have less-thanperfect sight.

"It's one of the few sports which use a stationary ball – after a few introductory lessons, new golfers are usually hitting the ball and having lots of laughs," he said.

"We've found that golf is a great sport for blind and low-vision people as it provides a range of social and community participation opportunities."

"It gets people outside enjoying themselves and interacting with other people who are out to enjoy the many benefits that golf provides."


World Blind Golf has also developed a range of training methods and facilitates coaching for blind and visually impaired individuals who wish to improve their golf skills and abilities.

"It's actually the perfect time for blind people to start golfing — we have amazing new technology that helps us be more independent on the course, such as talking GPS rangefinders, and we have the support of many local clubs and the club members have a newfound awareness that playing alongside their blind and low vision players can really make for a rewarding day of golf," Neil said.

BUILDING FRIENDSHIPS AND COMBATTING LONELINESS IN AGED CARE

In recent years, and especially in the post-COVID environment we live in today, loneliness and increasing isolation have become all-too-common problems faced by elderly men in aged care facilities around Australia, many of whom have fewer options for social interactions as time passes.

Circle of Men is a not-for-profit charity where dedicated male volunteers support elderly men living in selected aged care facilities throughout Brisbane south and the Redlands area. Their purpose is to reduce social isolation and loneliness via a weekly companionship and support program.

Each session is led by an experienced volunteer facilitator and consists of a "How are you going?" check-in, typically dealing with depression, grief, anger, loss, boredom, or fear, before having a great time cracking jokes, reminiscing, and often singing familiar songs.

Many men enter an aged care facility as a last resort, after they've lost their health, mobility, and final network of support. For 90 minutes each week, Circle of Men volunteers provide friendship, build trusting relationships, and break through that wall of isolation.

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GREAT AUTUMN FISHING ON MORETON BAY WITHOUT THE EARLY START!

There's a coolness in the air this month, and we will be talking about the weather changing quickly to 11°C and 12°C in the mornings, making it a little chilly to get up and go fishing. I'm glad Moreton Bay fish eat all day when the sun is up, and it's 26-plus degrees. My old Dad used to get me up predawn, and we had to be on the water and fishing as the sun came up. On the way there, I had to recite the times tables — no wonder I hate going fishing pre-dawn (and maths) these days!

WHITING AND SQUID

The whiting will be large and will have moved further into the Rous Channel, especially in Fisherman's Gutter, Maroon Gutter, and Amity Banks. There will be plenty at the Sandhills, and squid should also be in the same area by now; the water should be crystal clear, not like it was in April (brown). Squid strips, blood worms, beach worms and peeled prawns are the best baits. Also, look out for the influx of sea toads in the bay; they will be smashing squid jigs to bits.

SCHOOL MACKEREL

School mackerel will have moved across the bay, and you can get them anywhere around the southern side of Hope Banks and in from Wellington Point. Shark Spit is also worth trying at this time of the year. A few broad mackerel started to show up in April, so around the Peel Basin towards Amity Banks will be worth a troll with Smith jigs or Kimberly spoons.


SQUIRE

So, May is a cooler month, but the fishing will be as good as ever if the weather plays its part!











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CREAMY MUSHROOM SOUP RECIPE

Here's a nourishing, delicious soup that combines all the goodness of mushrooms with the richness of cream to create a cool-weather dish that can be served as a side, entrée, or as a meal on its own with crusty bread. Chances are even those fungi haters who screw their noses up at the very thought of eating mushrooms will love this creamy, hearty soup.


INGREDIENTS SERVES 4

- 2 tbsp butter
- 500g Swiss Brown mushrooms, chopped
- 100g Swiss Brown mushrooms, halved
- 1 white or brown onion, diced
- · 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- ½ cup of cooking cream

- 3 cups of chicken stock (or veggie stock for a vegetarian version)
- 2 sprigs of thyme, picked and stems discarded
- Salt and freshly cracked black pepper to taste
- Chopped parsley to serve

METHOD

- 1. Melt the butter in a large saucepan over a medium heat and add the onion, garlic and all the chopped and halved mushrooms. Sauté gently for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Remove the halved mushrooms from the pan and set aside (you'll use these at the end as a garnish).
- 3. Add the chicken stock and thyme to the mushroom mixture and simmer (uncovered) for 20 minutes.
- 4. Add the cream, stir through, and cook on low heat for a further 5 minutes to combine the flavours.
- 5. Season with salt and pepper, then turn off the heat.
- 6. In batches, transfer the soup to a blender and blend until smooth.
- 7. Pour into serving bowls, and top with the halved mushrooms you set aside in step 2 and serve with chopped parsley.

- Talk about what sensory stimuli might be present in the practice

 bright lights, music, new people and smells. Take a look at our website, where we have photos of our practice and team.
- Practice at home. Pretend to be the dentist, go over needing to open wide, how they can communicate if they need a break, e.g. place your hand up like asking a question. You can also practice if the patient feels comfortable asking questions or if their support person will do that on their behalf.
- Discuss what items or distractions might assist in coping with some
 of the sensory stimuli common ones in a dental practice are bright
 lights and a variety of different noises, new people at the front desk
 and perhaps patients in the waiting room.
