THEATRE REDLANDS PRESENTS THE OTHER DIGGERS

Redland Museum's Queensland Day celebrations will be marked by Theatre Redlands' premiere presentation of The Other Diggers, a play based on the Australian Women's Land Army and the vital role it played in World War 2.

Written and directed by Theatre Redland's Jan Nary, the play was created to pay homage to the Land Army women and to afford their contribution more public recognition. The Redlands (known as the "Fruit Bowl") and its surrounding regions depended heavily on Land Army labour so the story, while its anecdotes and incidents are drawn from all around Australia, have a special resonance here.

"Like many of us I had only a basic understanding of the Land Army and what it achieved," says Jan. "A talk given by Cr. Paul Bishop about the Land Army's camp at Birkdale Community Arts Hall made me think - there's a play in that!"

And indeed there was. In 1942 Australia faced the double threat of invasion and, due to the number of able-bodied men who had enlisted, a critical rural labour shortage. The government formed the Australian Women's Land Army and called for women to take on the role of producing food and fibre for the domestic population, for our forces overseas and for USA troops stationed in Australia. Women answered the call, coming mostly from occupations in shops, factories, offices, homes and restaurants. With little or no previous experience they signed up for the back-breaking work of digging, planting, harvesting, milking, slaughtering, butchering, tractor driving, baling, shearing and crating – and they kept their country and its dependents fed, even managing to supplement the UK's rationing.

The women in the story are fictitious but their history and anecdotes are drawn from research that revealed a fascinating and admirable story that had almost faded from the pages of history. The Other Diggers hopes to help give the Land Army women the status that they deserve.



SIT N CHAT VOLUNTEERS TACKLE LONELINESS, ONE CHAT AT A TIME

A non-professional, non-profit initiative is tackling loneliness, one chat at a time, encouraging positive human interactions.

Recently, you may have seen volunteers dressed in bright orange shirts and caps sitting in parks and waving from street corners. These volunteers are members of Sit N Chat, a movement that encourages human connection and positivity by reaching out to people and simply talking.

Sit N Chat is a network volunteer organisation that facilitates time for conversations and fosters connections in the community. Like its name, it's all about sitting, listening, and chatting.

Organiser Craig Moore says Sit N Chat is "not just a fake 'Hi how are you?'".

"We want communities to connect with each other," said Craig, adding that nine people die from suicide daily in Australia.

"Our goal is to have pop-up locations all over the country at parks and riverfronts, locations at schools for senior students to engage with one another, a mobile Sit N Chat where volunteers visit people's homes.

"Many of our volunteers can sit for hours with people. If volunteers are free, they wave at cars. It's all about giving time for people to vent and seeing them smile."



LEARNING TO DRIVE?



JOIN IN THE SONG WITH FOLK REDLANDS!

Music fashions come and go but folk music is always around. Its home on the coast is at Folk Redlands, formed in 2005 by a dedicated handful of folk musicians and supporters under the guidance of Colin Nightingale.

Colin's unmistakable accent marks him as a Yorkshireman but Australian folk music moves him as deeply as the songs from his old country. When Colin immigrated to Australia with his wife and two sons, he was immediately captivated by the special flavour of our folk and bush songs.

"Most of Australia's folk songs emigrated from the UK and Ireland but in their new home they took on a new identity and energy," he says. "They're an honest reflection of working class life, songs people sang – and continue to sing – about their lives and traditions."

Realising that the Redlands lacked a focus for folk music aficionados, Colin established a weekly folk music program, Acoustic Harvest, on the Redlands Coast community radio Bay fm. Acoustic Harvest, in its various incarnations, ran from 1993 to 2017 and was the original springboard for the creation of the

Folk Redlands club.

"There was no local centre for anything like folk music," he says, "an accessible, inclusive space for acoustic artists who like to listen, perform and mix with good, pleasant people. For some members, just belonging has helped them through some rough passages in life."

With a small team of dedicated folkies and drawing on the extensive network built up through Acoustic Harvest Colin was instrumental in creating Folk Redlands, which since 2005 has run a monthly folk event that presents a blackboard concert (put your name on the board if you want to perform!) and a featured artist. Its original home was at Indigiscapes but through the years of COVID turbulence it relocated to the Victoria Point Bowls and Recreation Club – and with a mailing list of 800 it's still going strong. Because folk music is always around.

BEHIND THE LENS: REDLANDS CAMERA CLUB PHOTOGRAPHER PROFILE

A lifetime love of natural history led me to begin recording in the late '70s what I saw through the medium of photography.

During the last 20 years, I have a developed a strong interest in pelagic (seabirds), not just those who frequent our shoreline, but those that spend almost their entire lives in the "Big Blue Paddock", only coming to land on some isolated island or remote shore to nest and continue the species.

The great Southern Ocean, that wild expanse of ocean between Australia and Antarctic continents, is home to an amazing array of seabirds - from the well-known Albatross species with wingspans of up to three metres, to the tiny Storm Petrel with wingspans measured in centimetres.

I had the privilege of traversing part of that Southern Ocean in 2018 and visited a number of islands situated therein. These islands are collectively known as the Subantarctic Islands of Australia and New Zealand.

But it wasn't just about birds. I also sought to understand the complex yet fragile ecology of this

special place in our world. While man has exploited and nearly destroyed some of these fragile ecosystems in the past, the work and commitment of the Australian and New Zealand governments recently in restoring these remote sanctuaries by removing the introduced species, is commended.

This is a win for the unique species that rely on these islands to breed.

The home to the species that live there, some temporarily, is a dangerous and harsh environment, but at times can show a beauty not seen elsewhere on our planet.

The last tv show or movie you watched? I really am not a great movie go-er, it is difficult to find a movie based on real life. My favorite TV shows are Back Road, Places with Ernie Dingo, Letters and Numbers and Landline.

Is there anything you'd like to see happen in the local area? I would like to see more of our natural bushland preserved. I live on acreage with mostly bush where I can feed the wallabies, bandicoots, the occasional koala, king parrots and lots of other birds.

Is there a local business/community group/club you'd like to give a shout-out to? I have been on the board of Horizon for many years and have a great affection for people with disability. I have a great feeling for Meals On Wheels and also love the activities provided by Donald Simpson Centre for elderly folk. There are so many great organisations in the community, too many to mention.

BUILDING FRIENDSHIPS AND COMBATTING LONELINESS IN AGED CARE

CONTRIBUTED BY CIRCLE OF MEN

In recent years, and especially in the post-COVID environment we live in today, loneliness and increasing isolation have become all-too-common problems faced by elderly men in aged care facilities around Australia, many of whom have fewer options for social interactions as time passes.

Circle of Men is a not-for-profit charity where dedicated male volunteers support elderly men living in selected aged care facilities throughout Brisbane south and the Redlands area. Their purpose is to reduce social isolation and loneliness via a weekly companionship and support program.


Each session is led by an experienced volunteer facilitator and consists of a "How are you going?" check-in, typically dealing with depression, grief, anger, loss, boredom, or fear, before having a great time cracking jokes, reminiscing, and often singing familiar songs.

Many men enter an aged care facility as a last resort, after they've lost their health, mobility, and final network of support. For 90 minutes each week, Circle of Men volunteers provide friendship, build trusting relationships, and break through that wall of isolation.

ALL ABOUT OSTEOPENIA AND OSTEOPOROSIS

Here I will be breaking down bone density myths and discussing advances in Osteoporosis management. Osteoporosis has been titled "the most common metabolic bone disease in the world". So how much do you know about it?

SO, WHAT IS OSTEOPOROSIS?

Osteoporosis is a condition in which the body's natural process of bone remodelling is disturbed and bone reabsorption occurs more rapidly than bone formation, resulting in low bone mineral density. Low bone mineral density can often go unnoticed until an individual has a fall or in serious cases, coughs and fractures a bone.

WHO IS AT RISK OF DEVELOPING OSTEOPOROSIS?

Women over the age of 50 are four times more likely to develop Osteoporosis in comparison to men (Alswat, 2017). Oestrogen deficiency in postmenopausal women increases the body's sensitivity to bone reabsorption signals released by the parathyroid hormone, subsequently resulting in significant reductions to bone mineral density (Keen, 2022). While women are predisposed to greater risk, recent studies have shown men have increased associated complications related to their disease (Alswat, 2017).

Other modifiable risk factors include smoking, excessive alcohol intake, poor diet and living a sedentary lifestyle (Osteoporosis Int., 2022). While we have only highlighted a few of the many risk factors for Osteoporosis, we hope you understand the importance for everyone to seek early treatment from a trained health professional.

Yes. If caught early enough, bone mineral density can be maintained to prevent the progression from Osteopenia to Osteoporosis.

HOW CAN I MANAGE MY CURRENT DIAGNOSIS?

Management for Osteoporosis often consists of modifications to many lifestyle factors including physical activity, diet and medication prescription where deemed suitable by your general practitioner.

Physical activity is universally recognised as the gold standard treatment due to the multi-factorial approach of improving bone mineral density and reducing falls risk via mechanical loading, hormonal regulation and proprioceptive training (Osteoporosis Int., 2022). In conjunction with activity modification, it is important that an individual's diet meets their nutritional needs to promote bone mineral density across the lifespan.

A dietician can review your daily dietary intake to determine if any essential nutrients which support bone remodelling are deficient. Here you will be provided with a personalised diet plan and education on how to incorporate these changes into your daily life.

Finally, to manage fatigue, an occupational therapist is best suited to implement energy conservation strategies as well as offer home visits to assess your home environment to modify high risk areas with appropriate equipment prescription.



WHAT IS CANINE PARVOVIRUS?

We have recently seen some cases of parvovirus in the local area. It is critically important that dogs be kept up to date with vaccinations to prevent infection with this deadly disease.

WHAT IS PARVOVIRUS?

Parvovirus is a highly contagious gastrointestinal virus that can affect dogs of all ages. Unvaccinated dogs and puppies under four months of age are most at risk. Parvovirus spreads by direct contact between dogs and contact with contaminated faeces. The virus can live on kennel surfaces, food and water bowls, collars and leashes and the clothing of people in contact with infected dogs. It can survive in the environment for long periods and can be spread on the fur and feet of dogs and contaminated shoes, cages and other objects to infect other locations.

SIGNS OF PARVOVIRUS

Parvovirus causes signs including lethargy, loss of appetite, high fevers, vomiting and severe bloody diarrhoea. There is no specific treatment for the virus – dogs need to be hospitalised for supportive therapy consisting of intravenous fluids to combat electrolyte, fluid and protein loss, medications to control vomiting and antibiotics to prevent secondary infection. Parvovirus can acutely affect animals, and dogs

may die despite intensive treatment.

PREVENTION

Puppies are born with some immunity from their mother's milk but need vaccinations to ensure they develop their own immune response as the protective antibodies from the milk wear off. We recommend a course of three vaccinations given at 6-8

weeks, 10 - 12 weeks and 14 - 16 weeks of age. Puppies should be kept away from other dogs of unknown vaccination status and areas where lots of dogs congregate due to the risk of environmental contamination with the virus.

Adult dogs should be vaccinated a year after their final puppy vaccination. Following this first adult vaccination, dogs generally develop good immunity to the disease. Further vaccinations may be recommended yearly to three yearly, depending on the vaccine used – have a chat with your vet to decide the best course of vaccination for your dog.

Are you eligible for the hearing services program?

As a Masters Qualified Audiologist and passionate hearing health advocate, I've made it my mission to provide patient-centred care, clinical integrity, and expertise with empathy. Today, I want to share some important information about how eligible pensioners can access free hearing aids and I'll explain some of the benefits of taking advantage of Australia's world-class system.

First, let me explain how hearing care funding works in Australia. Instead of going through Medicare, it is delivered via a dedicated Australian Government program called the Hearing Services Program (HSP). Eligible pensioners and Department of Veterans' Affairs cardholders can access a range of hearing care services and hearing devices through this program, simply by registering.

Certain hearing clinics, including my own, are contracted to deliver these services on behalf of the Commonwealth. Once you're registered as a client of the HSP, you're issued with a virtual voucher, which your hearing care provider can use to claim the cost of services provided to you.

To be eligible for the HSP, you need to be an Australian citizen or permanent resident aged 21 years or older and fit into one of several categories such as being

a Pensioner Concession Card holder, Department of Veterans' Affairs Gold or White Card holder, or a dependent of a person in one of these categories.

The Hearing Services Program offers a comprehensive range of services, including a full hearing assessment every five years, a subsidy towards high-quality hearing aids (at a range of price points), support and advice on getting the most out of your hearing devices, and annual check-up appointments. There is also an optional yearly maintenance plan for a small fee, which covers the cost of repairs and consumables.

Please note that the program does have some limitations. For example, it doesn't provide unlimited hearing checks and some services are not included (such as ear wax removal). However, it remains an excellent resource for those who qualify.

For your ongoing hearing and cognitive health, early intervention is best so I encourage you to check your eligibility and take advantage of the Hearing Services Program if you're able.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PLACE WE CALL COOCHIE

Board the ferry at Victoria Point for a seven-minute ride to the island of Coochiemudlo. Here is a minute island, only five square kilometres in size.

Evidence of at least 25,000 years of Aboriginal occupation is acknowledged by the presence of traces of shell middens and stone mortars.

The spiritual significance of the iron-rich red ochre cliffs, on island's south western flank, visible from the mainland, gave the name Goochi-mudlo (red earth/stone) in the Jandai language of the Quandamooka people.

The first European to step onto the island on 19 July 1799 was Lieutenant Matthew Flinders, during his voyage of exploration in the "Norfolk", to find navigable rivers north of Sydney.

Flinders had sailed into Moreton Bay but did not discover the Brisbane River. He referred to Coochie as the Sixth Island. A re-enactment of his landing is celebrated annually on the Sunday nearest to 19 July, at Norfolk Beach, on the east side of the island. This beach was named in 1977 and gazetted in 1982. A stone monument to record Flinders' landing can be found there.

Government Surveyor, Robert Dixon, named the island "Innis Island" in 1840, in honour of Lieutenant Innis, who had recently explored southern Moreton Bay. This name stayed in place until the 1880s. The island's name then reverted to the original Aboriginal name, but was anglicized as Coochiemudlo.

The island was granted to the Queensland Acclimatization Society in 1868. The society's task was to import plants that could have commercial potential, and to conduct experiments to determine if they could be adapted to Queensland's tropical and subtropical climate. The grant was declined.

In the 1880s bullock teams were swum over from the mainland to drag the felled trees down to the sea for use in the construction of wharves in Brisbane. The Moreton Bay Oyster Company took oysters from beds surrounding the island.

Interest was aroused again 1887 in developing the potential of the island. The western side of the island was subdivided into one-acre lots for the future growth of bananas, passionfruit, grapes, paw paws, pineapples, tomatoes, vegetables and custard apples.

The first auction of this crown land was on 24 January 1888. Ninety allotments were advertised but no one showed any interest in settling on the island.

In 1896 Henry Wright and his son Norman set up camp. They left "this god forsaken place" in about 1900. The sandflies and mosquitoes were intolerable. Norman Wright went on to build Norman Wright and Sons, a nationally respected boat building firm.

The land, though subdivided, was unoccupied and was exploited for timber and for grazing of cattle, swum across from the Victoria Point farms. Prior to WW1, Mr Morcom cleared the southwest corner and built the first farmhouse. But the project was not viable. Phillip Forrest purchased this farmhouse in 1919 and offered Doug Morton and Eric Gardon, both ex WW1 survivors, the opportunity to share-farm the property.

Doug Morton stayed there for 40 years and made a success of the venture. He married Mary Colburn in 1921 and Mary was the only female on the island for the next 12 years. Doug was the initiator of the tourist industry in the 1930s. He built several jetties and the golf course in the southwest corner of the island. The Mortons left the island in 1966 when they felt the place was too crowded.

During WWII the island was home to the 42 and 43 Landing Craft Companies who trained there, then served with distinction in New Guinea and Bougainvillea in 1945. Trainees included Sir Frank Packer, Sir Ninian Stephen and Sir Nigel Bowen.

The farming era was over by the late 1950s when many of the leases were bought and subdivided by two real estate agents. Alfred Grant bought land to the east and Richard Marsh to the north and west. But the subdivisions were small, only suitable for holiday cottages. So, in the 1960s, sales were few with only 20 people living on the island by 1970.

Infrastructure development increased rapidly in the 1970s. A new concrete jetty was built in 1971. The island was connected to the town water supply. A community hall was built in 1973. Electricity was connected in 1978. There was a regular ferry service. The vehicular barge came in 1987. Unfortunately, connection to underground sewage was not available until 2006. But the level of permanent residency rose.

A land management plan was drawn up to preserve the foreshore and prevent the building of waterfront houses. This "Emerald Fringe" gives the island an air of mystery. The society of the island is now diverse, ranging from permanent and temporary residents, retirees, professionals, artists, writers and trades people. Community groups include a progress association, an art group and life saving volunteers. Sporting facilities exist for golf, tennis, croquet and bowls.

MY LOCAL MEMORIES: FROM Slates to smoky holes

We didn't write on paper when I started school in the 1950s: we wrote on slates with slate pencils made of a softer form of slate. Work was erased using sponges. Slate was considered easier for beginners than pen and messy ink. Ballpoint pens existed, but I can't remember when we started using them in school. I remember using pen and ink and often 'blotted my copybook'. Each desk had a hole for an inkwell located where two could share. Ink and kids are not a good mix, resulting in inky handprints, spills, and blots on books and clothes.



Eventually, we transitioned to pencils and ballpoint pens, but the holes in desks remained.

The desks also had a shelf where students could store books. Smoking was still a common practice. Some teachers smoked, but students would get into big trouble (e.g., the cane) if caught smoking. (Actually, people don't smoke. The cigarettes smoke – the people are just the suckers.) One day some boys in the back row showed off by smoking in class. They took puffs when the teacher was not looking, then held the cigarettes below the desk, out of sight. The smoke rose; the teacher got suspicious and moved closer. To avoid detection, the smokers threw their cigarettes into the shelf under their desks. Unfortunately, their books, papers and other flammable objects on the shelf caught fire, and smoke chimneyed out of the hole in the top of the desk. The more those boys tried to cover up their antics, the more they were exposed. 'Where there is smoke, there is fire' – or at least naughty boys.





Queensland is still worlds away from a healthy rental market

Obscenely tight rental conditions continue in Queensland according to the latest Residential Vacancy Rate Report released by the Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ).

The REIQ report covers more than a decade of quarterly vacancy rates for 50 local government areas (LGAs) and sub regions in Queensland, with the March 2023 quarter showing sustained historically tight rental conditions and mostly minor fluctuations from the previous quarter.

Of the 50 regions, 11 remained at the same rate, 13 grew slightly tighter, while the majority of 26 relaxed slightly, indicating improved but still limited rental options.

This saw the state-wide vacancy rate rise marginally from 0.8 per cent in the December 2022 quarter, to 0.9 per cent in the March 2023 quarter, still well short of the ideal 2.6 - 3.5% healthy rate.

Interestingly, the vacancy rate climbed

slightly in most of Queensland's tourism centres and coastal regions. A standout was Noosa which shot up substantially from 1.2 per cent to 2.3 per cent, just shy of the healthy rate, while neighbouring Gympie region also rose from 0.7 per cent to 1.1 per cent.

Mount Isa tipped into a healthy 2.6 per cent rate for the first time since the onset of the pandemic, while Gladstone held the highest rate of the regional centres at 1.8 percent.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said while the March quarter results offered some rental market relief, most of the state was a long way off from being out of the woods.

"Queensland is still worlds away from a healthy rental market and a grossly insufficient level of housing supply is squarely to blame," Ms Mercorella said.

"When we're witnessing these very tight vacancy rates persisting right across the

state, it's highlighting the importance of ensuring that we keep levels of property investment up so that we can maintain rooves over the heads of our growing population.

"We desperately need more rental properties but investors are not being encouraged to put their savings into property – on the contrary, often they're being deterred and punished."

Ms Mercorella said that despite the heavy reliance on private investors in the rental space, dangerous behaviour towards investors was continuing.

"Alarmingly, talk of rent control and imposing greater restrictions on the owners of rental properties is being touted as the solution to the rental crisis," she said.

"Making investment less appealing and demonising investors is not the right solution. We should be focussed on the underlying cause of the rental crisis and increasing housing supply, including social housing.

"Queensland spends the least per capita on social housing and even with the Housing Investment Fund it will only rise to second last. This under investment reached its nadir from 2015 onwards and has had a direct correlation with the crisis today.

"We're about to embark on the phase two rental reforms, and just as in phase one, the REIQ will be advocating strongly for fair and balanced residential tenancies legislation in Queensland that support all stakeholders involved in rental relationships," she said.

CLUB PROFILE: REDCITY ROAR BUILDS ON SUCCESS

A new basketball entity was created towards the end of 2019 by a handful of people from the basketball community based at Redlands PCYC. The RedCity Roar Basketball Association Inc – a not-for-profit incorporated association – began its mission to "grow the game in Redland City and build a pathway from beginners to semi-professionals".

A handover of basketball activities from the Redlands PCYC saw RedCity Roar become active on September 23, 2019. The club inherited about 400 members in both junior and senior competitions. Included were junior and senior representative programs and a great introductory program called CUBs for four to seven-year-olds, formerly known as Biddyball.

A structure was implemented which resulted in four foundation clubs in Bayside Basketball (Cleveland DSHS, Bayview SS), Capalaba Wildcats (Redlands PCYC), Wellington Point Kings (Redlands College) and Alex Hills Raiders (Alexandra Hills SHS).

The impact of the clubs was immediate, with memberships surging in the first season of 2020, and despite the Covid break, another three clubs soon formed – Hornets, Crusaders and Faith, each servicing new locations. They bolstered membership after the lockdown.

At the same time, COVID-19 unexpectedly created an opportunity for RedCity Roar to compete in QSL, the only senior representative competition in Australia at that time. This brought the highest level of basketball to the Redlands Coast and is arguably the best venue in the state at the Cleveland DSHS's Paul Bancroft Centre.

After a successful 2020 season, the association was offered an



opportunity by Basketball Queensland to join the highest level available, the NBL1 North conference of a national competition.

Within 12 months, RedCity Roar membership exploded, and a pathway was in place for all participants of the game to excel.

For all the success, however, there have been major challenges. Access to facilities to accommodate its now eight clubs and 1800 members has become an ongoing problem. Building the financial resources to service the needs of members has current human resources stretched to the limit. The growth has fuelled a voracious demand for more coaches, referees and facilities.

Volunteers in the clubs and within the association have created a great community story and set the scene for the association's next mission: "To find a home for our growing family and develop processes and resources to better service the basketball community of Redlands."







MORETON BAY IS SWIMMING WITH CUTTLEFISH THIS MONTH!

The cold has arrived, and so have the cuttlefish in big numbers! They are always so much fun to catch close to home.

This month, find the cuttlefish around the eastern side of Wellington Point and King and Green Islands. All you need is a whiting rod, a couple of squid jigs with some orange in the body, a ball sinker above, and a drift in the 20 to 28-ft mark. Drop the jig to the bottom, lift it about a foot off the bottom, and wait for the tug. But be aware you will miss lots of cuttlefish as they tend to take the jigs around the middle rather than from the back where the prongs are. It's still fun, anyway. You can try the razorback squid jigs with prongs on their backs, but I tend to use my all-time favourites like the Daiwa nude in the prawn pattern in red and orange and the Yamashita pilchard colours (the macula red works as well).

If you don't like Indian ink on your boat, 'cuttlefishing' is not for you! Their ink is ten times thicker than squid ink, and they hold water in to be able to squirt much longer than squid, so be prepared. A long net helps rather than a short one near the boat, and the best tip I can give you is the 30-second mould

cleaner from Bunnings. It gets the ink off in seconds and is the best thing I discovered many years ago.

The arrow squid should also turn up in the same area but in the shallows. The tiger squid is in good numbers since the water was cleaned up last month; they are fun to catch, as you can see them coming to get the jig.

So put on a shirt you don't mind getting inked, have a bottle of 30-second cleaner handy, and get out there and get a few cephalopods. They're one of the tastiest treats from the sea, and they are right at our doorstep.

In a scoop net, I picked up a fully formed cuttlefish smaller than a five-cent piece. It was fully formed with all the patterns, and I found it fascinating.

Till next month, good fishing, and be careful with westerly winds. For weekly







SLOW COOKED OCTOPUS IN TOMATO SAUCE PASTA RECIPE

FROM SPERO KARTANOS

Check out this deliciously simple recipe from local fisherman Spero Kartanos, who knows his seafood! It's a dish that highlights the fresh octopus, with a focus on flavour and minimal ingredients, cooked low and slow.

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup of olive oil
- 1 small onion, brown or white, chopped
- 6 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1kg of small, cleaned octopus (or squid)
- 400g tomato pulp/tinned tomatoes
- 300ml red wine
- 2 tbsp tomato paste

- 4 bay leaves fresh or dried
- A handful of freshly chopped parsley
- 1 tsp chilli flakes (optional)
- Salt and pepper to season
- Additional chopped parsley to garnish
- Cooked pasta (you choose the type) to serve

METHOD

- 1. Heat the olive oil in a large heavy-based pot, like a Dutch oven or a heavy casserole dish.
- 2. Add the garlic and onion and stir gently over a medium heat for a few minutes, then add the octopus to the pot, along with the tomatoes, red wine, parsley, tomato paste, bay leaves and chilli (if using).
- 3. Cook on a very low heat, covered, for 1.5 to 2 hours, stirring occasionally, until the octopus/squid is tender. Smaller squid will take less time to cook.
- 4. Once the octopus is tender, season with salt and pepper, then serve over pasta and garnish with chopped parsley.



SAILORS CAME FROM NORTH AND SOUTH FOR THE PEEL ISLAND MARATHON

The Cleveland Yacht Club has a strong history and a bright future. Established in 1904, the club has enjoyed regular Sunday sailing for members and guests and recently hosted the annual Peel Island Marathon sailing race for the 52nd time. This event, held on Sunday, 7 May, attracted participants from Hervey Bay to Tweed Heads.

Around 150 people fed, rigged, launched, sailed, looked after, and cheered on 42 sailboats (74 competitors) across 10 classes, from large yachts, dinghies and catamarans, to windsurfers.

The racers launched from the club's ramp at Cleveland Point and circumnavigated Teerk Roo Ra (Peel Island or "the place of many shells"), with the first boat home in around two hours. At stake was a bounty of nearly \$6,000 of prizes generously donated by local sponsors and supporters, including Boating & RV, Redland City Marina, Sunstate Watersports, The Lighthouse Restaurant, Manders Sails and many others. The event also rounded out the QLD NACRA Traveller Series of racing for high-performance catamarans. It was gazetted as a major sailing event for the QLD Formula 18 Association and SEQ Hobie sailing.

Light wind conditions on the day saw the 'marathon' course shortened to allow all competitors to return safely to shore. A huge team of volunteers supported the event, with eight safety boats on the water.

The use of yardstick handicapping allows the results of different types of boats to be levelled, making sailing an enjoyable and highly accessible sport for all ages and crew combinations. Out on the bay for the 52nd Boating and RV Peel Island Marathon were competitors in their 70s and children as young as 12, with some sailors using the event as a warm-up before heading off overseas to represent Australia, while one pair of ladies blasted out both the miles and the music as they enjoyed perfect conditions.

Cleveland Yacht Club is a not-for-profit club with a welcoming, family-friendly vibe. The team is enjoying a short break before the winter sailing series starts on 4 June. Members will celebrate their recently completed 2022-23 sailing series at their presentation night on Saturday, 10 June.

Racing usually takes place each Sunday during the summer season (September to April) and every second Sunday during winter. A

Time to start planning for the end

With the end of the financial year fast approaching, there's not much time left to think about how to get the most benefit out of your finances. While personal finance covers so many more areas than just superannuation, it's a significant subject that should be reviewed regularly. After all, this is likely to be the prime source of your retirement funding.

Superannuation is a big one. Most restrictions and obligations relating to super reset on 1 July each year, so it's useful to think about how much you've contributed in the current year and whether it's worthwhile to top up those contributions. Being able to carry forward unused concessional contribution caps from past years makes this area a slightly more complicated one than it used to be, because unused caps are discarded after 5 years. Other areas to consider are personal contributions, and whether you would benefit from spouse contributions or the government co-contribution also.

As one final point on contribution strategies, the superannuation guarantee rate is due to increase from 10.5% to 11% from 1 July 2023, so it makes sense to review your contribution rates to check whether you will exceed next year's contribution cap (currently expected to remain at \$27,500).

Superannuation income streams have been subject to reduced minimum repayment amounts since 2019, however the minimums are due to return to their normal levels from 1 July 2023 (unless the Federal Government decides to extend them again). The impact is that some retirees could be forced to take a greater amount of money from their super funds next year, which may be more than is needed. With more income on the way, it might be worthwhile to start thinking about other ways to save and invest it.

Everyone's individual circumstances will be different, and the rules that apply to superannuation can get complex. The best way to be sure that your arrangements are suitable to what you are trying to achieve is to talk with a financial planner about it.
