WYNNUM'S OWN CHRIS WOOD TAKES HOME BARTONS/BMD PRO-AM TITLE

The 44th annual Bartons/BMD Pro-Am with a prize purse of \$40,000 returned to the Wynnum Golf Club with home-club local Chris Wood taking home the Pro-Am title – after almost 20 years since he joined the club as a pre-junior.

The Pro-Am was established in 1979 at Wynnum Golf Club by Paul King together with Australia's largest privately owned civil contractor, the BMD Group, and one of the largest family owned dealerships in Queensland. Bartons.

Holding the title of Australia's richest one-day Pro-Am for 15 years, the event brought together a field of over 70 professionals and 138 amateurs including greats of Australian golf such as lan Baker-Finch, Rod Pampling, Terry Price and Michael Ferguson. It also saw VIP sporting legends Allan Border, Leigh Matthews, Jonathan Thurston, Gorden Tallis, and Jon Sieben OAM in attendance.

Chris Wood's winning formula saw him channel his home-course knowledge to secure the title, finishing one-stroke clear of Gold Coaster Dillon Hart with a round of 7-under 62.

Speaking to his win on the day, the Wynnum local said it was an honour to represent his local club at the event, so much so he delayed his Golf Australia Australian Open preparations to play on the day.

"It was a pretty easy decision. Being a Wynnum boy, I wanted to come back and represent the club and see a lot of familiar faces. It was definitely the right decision to make at the end of the day," Mr Wood said.

Bartons' Managing Director, Mark Beitz, said it provided a valuable opportunity to connect with the local community while supporting professional golf.

"It's always a fantastic day for our sponsors to get the opportunity to play with professional golfers on the PGA Pro-Am circuit.

"We pride ourselves on the rich history of our event on the bayside and we are committed to the continuation of holding the title of Australia's richest one day Pro-Am," Mr Beitz said.

Patron of Wynnum Golf Club and the BMD Group's founder and Chairman, Mick Power AM, was honoured on the day with Honorary Lifetime PGA Membership for his investment and service to the golf industry and in particular PGA Professionals.

"It was a privilege to receive the Honorary Lifetime Membership from the PGA. I was introduced to golf by my dad and it's a game which is close to my heart and I am truly honoured by the recognition," Mr Power said.

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CHANGES UNDERWAY TO LINDUM STATION

Lindum Train Station is receiving a full accessibility upgrade during 2024. This is wonderful news for the community and commuters, making Lindum Station safer and fully accessible to commuters and all users of the station.

To ensure the safety of commuters Lindum Station will close, temporarily, from 22 January 2024. It is scheduled to reopen in October.

Key information regarding Lindum Train Station:

- Closed to commuters from 22 January 2024 to October 2024
- All trains will run express through the station
- Reduced car parking
- Alternative Transport Plan will be in place from 22 January 2024
- Shuttle service 229 will run between Lindum Station and Wynnum North Station
- Visit translink.com.au, MyTranslink App or telephone 13 12 30 for further details

Valuable feedback, gathered through recent community surveys, has played a crucial role in shaping the alternative transport options that are being put in place to meet your travel needs during the closure. We appreciate your input, and rest assured that your preferences have guided the decision-making.

To assist the community during the closure, a dedicated shuttle bus service will operate between Lindum and Wynnum North stations. The shuttle, numbered 229, will run at intervals of 10 to 15 minutes during peak hours (7 am to 9 am and 3 pm to 4 pm on weekdays), with additional services supporting school start and finish times. Outside of peak hours, the route will connect with arriving trains at Wynnum North station. It's important to note that all route 229 services will be fully accessible.

For those driving to Lindum station to access the shuttle service, limited parking will be available. Station parking will be designated specifically for commuters catching the 229 shuttle. No train services will stop at Lindum Station. Additionally, Wynnum North and Hemmant stations, both in close proximity to Lindum station, will remain open and accessible throughout the upgrade.

Detailed timetable information for the shuttle service will be made available shortly. You can plan your travel efficiently by downloading the MyTranslink app, visiting translink.com, au, or by calling 13 12 30 once the information is released.

LINDUM STATION ACCESSIBILITY UPGRADE

Baysiders, the Lindum Station Accessibility Upgrade is full steam ahead. From 22 January 2024, the station will close to the public to build



new platforms, a new footbridge with lift access and many other outstanding accessibility features.

To ensure the needs of customers are met, Queensland Rail and the Department of Transport and Main Roads have developed an Alternative Transport Plan.

Shuttle Bus 229 will operate between Lindum and Wynnum North stations, with a stop at North Road opposite Iona College. The fully accessible Shuttle will operate every 10-15 minutes during peak periods (7-9 AM and 3-4 PM on weekdays), and in-line with train arrivals at Wynnum North Station during off-peak periods.

Customers can also utilise the existing Bus Route 224 from Sibley Road, and Wynnum North and Hemmant Stations will also continue operations during the upgrade.

The Community Breakfast will also host the Scope Colouring In Competition, supported by Wynnum Manly Leagues Club, and the Scope Australia Day Award.



ALL ABOUT HEAT STROKE IN DOGS AND CATS

Heat stroke is a common emergency in dogs and cats. Our furry friends cannot regulate their heat in the same way we do – they only have sweat glands in their paws and nose so evaporative cooling is limited. Environmental conditions such as high temperature and humidity and breed related conformation issues such as thick/long coats and short noses pre-dispose dogs and cats to developing heat stroke.



SIGNS OF HEAT STROKE

The signs of heat stroke are similar for dogs and cats and include:

- High body temperature
- Restlessness/agitation
- Excessive panting or difficulty breathing
- Drooling saliva is often very thick and tacky
- Change in gum colour gums may be dark red, pale, purple or blue
- Severe cases may progress to vomiting and diarrhoea, increased heart rate, lethargy, collapse, ataxia, muscle tremors and seizures

Cats do not usually pant so open-mouthed breathing may be an indicator of heat stroke in a cat. Cats may also show increased grooming as they try to cool their bodies.

TREATMENT OF HEAT STROKE

First aid for heat stroke includes:

- Remove your pet from the hot area
- Thoroughly wet their body with a hose (avoiding the face as pets may aspirate water when panting) and use a fan to help with evaporative cooling
- Wet the surface which the pet is on
- Offer wate
- DO NOT USE ICE BATHS as this may cause pets to cool too rapidly and result in blood vessels constricting which will reduce the ability to cool themselves

PREVENTION

Prevention is the key to ensuring pets stay safe particularly in the hot summer months.

 Do not leave pets confined in a car or small space with poor ventilation



- Avoid exercising your pet in the heat of the day
- Do not walk dogs on hot surfaces if the footpath/road is too hot for you to comfortably hold your hand on it will burn your pet
- Ensure pets have access to plentiful water and a source of shade at all times

If you are concerned that your pet is suffering from heat stroke it is important to seek veterinary attention as soon as possible.

It's 2024! Now is the ideal time to refocus on your health. With so many recent celebrations, a lot of good habits may have slidden, and it's time to renew healthy lifestyle choices.

My tips for the new year:

- Set realistic goals for yourself goals define our priorities and make
 them more achievable. However, if the goals are vague (like "be fitter") or
 aspirational (like "lose 10 kg in two weeks"), it can set you up for disappointment. Talk with your doctor
 about what goals you want to achieve.
- 2. Eliminate the word "diet"! What leads to healthy and sustainable weight loss (if that's what you're aiming for), is long-term lifestyle changes. Crash diets may lead to rapid weight loss in the first few weeks but they are not helpful in the long term and will "confuse" your body so it holds onto fat stores. You may have tried a range of diets before with little success, or you may not know where to start (or you do, but can't generate the motivation to do it) in any of these scenarios, talking with a dietitian about what suits your lifestyle, can make all the difference.
- 3. Keep hydrated and not with alcohol or coffee! Water intake is especially important when the weather is hot, and helps you feel fuller so you're less likely to over-indulge. Alcohol and caffeinated drinks dehydrate you, and add to your calorie ("sugar") intake.
- 4. Start or stick to an enjoyable exercise program. Using energy actually generates energy, and this improves better sleep, metabolism, mental health, blood pressure, balance it's the all-rounder! If you have trouble finding an exercise that fits in with your lifestyle or physical limitations, see an exercise physiologist for a tailored program.



5. Don't ignore your mental health — this time of year is not easy for a lot of people, and pretending everything is ok doesn't work in the long run. It's ok to not be ok. Tell family and friends if you're not up to doing something — pace yourself. Friday 1 December 2023 saw six able-bodied people take up the challenge to be in wheelchairs for the Rotary Wynnum Wheelchair Challenge. The objective was to highlight the daily challenges faced by those in wheelchairs in and around the Wynnum CBD.

Representatives from local, state and federal governments, Ham Bros, Raine and Horne, and club members took part. They were ably supported by six support staff, whose role was to ensure their safety.

Each person was given a set of tasks to complete in the Wynnum area. Purchases procured from Coles and Woolworths were donated to St Pete's Pantry. Representatives from Brisbane City Council's

accessibility unit, Rotarians, and other local citizens with mobility issues attended. Spinal Life Australia, and Raine and Horne's Byron Freeborn provided sponsorship.

Some of the main revelations were:

- Challenging intersection ramps with lips that are dangerous.
- Wheelchair pedestrians in designated crossings ignored by drivers.
- Few people gave way on the footpath to people in wheelchairs.
- People don't address the person in the wheelchair directly; they address the person standing.
- Traffic lights and pedestrian lights change from green back to red too quickly.
- Construction site pavement closures/interruptions cause access issues.
- Opening doors is challenging.
- Issues accessing businesses with steps at their entrances.
- Lack of accessible street parking.
- Lack of pedestrian crossings on Bay Terrace north of Charlotte Street
- No pedestrian crossing in busy Berrima Street.
- Wheelchair users feel very vulnerable.

As we round off the calendar year and lean into 2024, let's take look back at the year's highlights and some of the trends that influenced some of the purchasing decisions throughout the year.

We've seen a selection of people purchase their first homes, upgrade from their current home, relocate from either inter-state or from other parts of the state, all the while getting familiar with their new surroundings; joining groups or clubs, visiting the cafes and restaurants, which has helped our food/entertainment scene develop.

A shift this year has been an increasing familiarity with higher interest rates and the required adjustments to budgeting and lifestyle choices. There had been a shift to some extent of the type of dwelling being purchased, from an entry-level house to a townhouse, a house with a water view to one that doesn't (but is still walking distance to the esplanade), or from a modern/renovated home to one that's fit for purpose, with renovation will

plans for the future. Properties with bay views have still been in great demand – the budget is there, and the desire. There has also been the geographical adjustment – from Manly to Manly West, or Wynnum to Yarrabilba – particularly with the additional enticement of the increase in first home buyers' grants.

Decisions have been pending from some of the potential investment crew, certainly not all, but as most property owners have seen a gain in the value of their home, paid down the loan and now have a reasonable level of equity, so the next step is to convert the home to an investment. This prompts the question: do you wait for interest rates to cool off before you purchase and lock in the interest rate? The conundrum there is, while we wait for interest rates to (possibly) come down, is the property of interest likely to grow in value, stripping any possible savings from a lower interest rate?

As for the number of potential buyers in the market, the energy is good, partly due to an increase in values since

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the 2021 bull run, with little pullback in demand and enthusiasm in early/mid-2022. Purchasing a property is a personal event, and a financially significant one at that. If you're ready to buy, you've done your homework, and you're staying within your budget, it's time to move forward.

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Body corporate reforms strike the right balance

The Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ) is commending changes to a number of contentious body corporate matters that were previously placed in the "too hard basket", and have now been bought into line with modern community expectations.

The Body Corporate and Community Management and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2023 was passed by the Queensland Government, overhauling several Acts that regulate community title schemes in Queensland.

In summary, the body corporate changes will:

- Allow body corporates to make by-laws to prohibit smoking (including vapes) in outdoor areas and communal areas of strata communities,
- Prevent body corporates from making bylaws with blanket pet bans in community title schemes, and introduce a mechanism for pet approvals.
- Clarify and enhance the ability for body corporates to tow vehicles from common property in a timely manner, and
- Reduce consensus for scheme termination from unanimous to 75% of lot owners in limited circumstances.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said the reforms would help modernise apartment and unit living.

"The REIQ certainly supports the viewpoint that quiet enjoyment of people's homes is a right that should be upheld and not restricted as much as possible," Ms Mercorella said.

"However, we recognise that due to the nature of sharing a title and being in close quarters, there needs to be laws that govern communities with clarity and necessary protections to keep everyone within them safe.

"As our population grows, living in apartments and units is becoming more common place, and it's important to ensure our laws keep pace with changing community standards and expectations, and are balanced so that this lifestyle remains attractive in our state."

Ms Mercorella said the ability for body corporates to self-regulate and potentially prohibit smoking in outdoor areas such as balconies, courtyards, patios and verandas had attracted a high level of debate.

"When moving into a unit or apartment complex, people generally go in eyes-wideopen and understand that there are certain limits that apply to common use areas," she

"However, many of us agree that 'my home is my castle' and that you should be able to live the life you want to live when you're in the boundaries of your own home.

"Of course, the challenge comes with the fact that when you live in an apartment or a unit, your activity can also have an impact on others who live very close by – which is the case with smoke drift and second-hand smoke risk."

She said legislative reform to prevent body corporates from banning pets, except in specific circumstances, had been another controversial topic in body corporate schemes.

"Historically it's not uncommon to see body corporate bylaws with a blanket pet prohibition that says 'no pets allowed', and time and time again we have seen those bans being overturned," Ms Mercorella said.

"We know pets are an extension of our families

in many cases and the mental health benefits of having pets has been widely reported, so this reform will come as welcome news to many.

"However, it's the REIQ's view that there's a missed opportunity to align this legislation to the Residential Tenancies and Rooming Accommodation Act regarding the timeframe for a decision in relation to a pet request – any inconsistency will likely impact lot owners that rent their properties on the residential rental housing market."

In relation to allowing body corporates to tow motor vehicles if parked in contravention of a by-law, she said the REIQ expects this will be welcomed if there's sufficient notice.

"This reform addresses situations such as visitor parking being monopolised by the same lot owners or their guests, when the benefit is meant to be enjoyed by all," she said.

"Our view is that stakeholders should be educated about what signage should be erected and what information should be provided to lot owners about parking and towing by-laws, liability for the cost of same and particularly, with respect to third party quests."

She said the most controversial change was to allow the termination of a community titles scheme for economic reasons, after providing a termination plan and following a prescribed timeframe, with 75% of lot owners voting for the motion.

"This scheme termination reform, which was raised at the Housing Summit, is limited to specific circumstances with ageing or rundown buildings that will become unviable within five years, and there are rigorous statutory hoops

to jump through to satisfy this," she said.

"From our perspective, it was particularly important to see adequate consumer protection measures included for vulnerable people, such as options for recourse, and compensation for lot owners as well as for parties with contractual interests in the scheme."

In addition, changes have also been made to the Land Sales Act 1984 impacting the operation of sunset clauses in off-the-plan land sale contracts to:

• Limit when property developers can invoke sunset clauses in contracts for the sale of land to specific situations, including requiring buyer's consent.

"It is our view that the proposed provisions, albeit offering strong consumer protection, may lack consideration for the commercial challenges faced by developers in providing housing," Ms Mercorella said.

"We appreciate that in what has been an unprecedented, extraordinary market period, that there have been some reports of developers pulling the pin on developments and leaving buyers to start again.

"However, our concern is that this now legislates an outlier issue which is not prevalent or evident in today's market now that we've returned to 'normality', and under normal circumstances these clauses are needed for developers to avoid bankruptcy on unfeasible projects."

She added, "As peak body, the REIQ is committed to developing resources and training for the real estate sector to ensure they are supported and prepared for the changes."

FROM THE WYNNUM MANLY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Queensland became a colony in 1859. Brisbane pioneer investors were buying land along the foreshores from 1860, and the train line from Brisbane to Cleveland opened through the bayside in 1889. The permanent population was increasing, and it was declared that a "provisional school is needed for Wynnum".

In 1892, local residents applied to the Secretary for Public Instruction in Brisbane for a provisional school to be built at Wynnum. The application was rejected.

In June 1894, 75 children between the ages of six and 14 lived in the Wynnum area. A building committee was formed, and Mr Falkiner, the secretary, submitted a second application. Again, rejection, as Lytton School was already in the vicinity.

One month later, in July 1894, Mr Falkiner renewed the application.

The reply came: "If the Lytton School (built in 1882) is in the wrong place, it might be moved to a central site. There is no sense in building a new school in Wynnum and leaving the Lytton School (near the quarry in Wynnum North Road) standing empty."

The Works Department were keen to relocate Lytton School, for £350, rather than build a new State School in Wynnum for £655.

Building a school required funds from the local community to purchase a suitable site. The Ladies Committee of the Wynnum Divisional Board were ardent fundraisers running bazaars and concerts. When £65 had been raised, land was purchased in Charlotte through to Florence Street, and the first one-roomed school building was constructed in 1895.

February 24, 1896, was the opening day of the new Wynnum State School, four years after the original application. Mr Frederick Henry Clarke was the Head Teacher for the first 10 years. Emma Snelling was the first of the 89 children to enrol. By the end of June 1896, 127 children were enrolled.

The early school registers included the occupation of the children's parents. This listing provides a valuable indication of the type of settlement in Wynnum at that time - tradesmen, shopkeepers, military, service, farmers, and fishermen.

On August 6, 1910, the school changed its name from Wynnum State School to Wynnum Central State School. The Lytton School had been moved to Tingal Hill, in Tingal Road and renamed Wynnum North State School.

In March 1918, the grounds in front of the school on Charlotte Street were developed as a memorial for soldiers who served in WWI. This area was to be a grand entrance to the school. A six-foot granite memorial, with drinking faucets and a fish pond (which became a sand pit) was built. Framed by camphor laurels, this courtyard remained the school's primary focus until the 1950s.

The 1930s saw the Depression years. Many children arrived at school shoeless and were fed at the soup kitchen by the railway line on Edith Street. Diphtheria, mumps, measles and whooping cough were rife.

In 1935, a decision was made to build a high school in the Wynnum area, where pupils progressed from Wynnum Central State School to Grade 6. When it opened in 1941, the new Wynnum High and Intermediate School had few facilities. Pupils returned to study Domestic Science and Manual Arts at Wynnum Central State School.

The 1940s were the War years. A shortage of teachers resulted in half-day education. Air raid shelters were dug on the Florence Street side of the school boundary. War Identification Discs, either necklets or bracelets, were worn. Each child donned a brown cloak for an air raid drill and had a rubber peg to put into their mouths in case a bomb was dropped.

The War was over. There was new hope and the Baby Boom. The first Parents and Citizens Association was formed on February 11, 1944. The meeting was sponsored by the Head Teacher, Mr Derrington, and 11 parents attended.

In August 1944, the Parents and Citizens Association applied for a new building. Progress was slow, and in February 1945, the Association approached Mr WM Gunn MLA to see if plans for a new building could be drawn, and part of the building started to relieve congestion in the infant classes. Mr Gunn had already approached the Minister for Public Instruction, but he agreed to have another try. Due to his persistence, approval was given on March 15, 1945, to prepare and plan a school with 17 rooms and a preliminary cost of six rooms for infant classes.

On November 2, 1946, the foundation stone was laid, and on March 5, 1947, building of the new school commenced. This building provided employment for local tradespeople and generally boosted the economy. There was a sense of enthusiasm in Wynnum's close-knit community.

The first phase was completed on December 24, 1948, and the building officially opened on February 5, 1949 by the Hon H A Bruce MLA, Minister for Public Instruction, assisted by Mr W M Gunn MLA, Member for Wynnum Manly. Daily attendance in January 1949 averaged 633 students, less than in the 1930s, but now only catering for grades 1 to 5 as Wynnum Intermediate and High School had been opened in 1941.

The second phase of the building was completed and opened in 1953. The School Association convinced the Department to retain the original timber buildings, and they remained until they were demolished in 2015 after Wynnum Central State School had closed.

Manly volunteer Rick Holder organised commemorative notebooks, to go with the commemorative pens and special 'History of Brisbane Coast Guard' which he produced for every guest, and Mara Basanovic, the CEO of Volunteering Queensland, came along to present guests with a special 'V for Volunteering' pin, designed by the man who created the Qantas logo.

Overall, the Coast Guard volunteers reported enjoying an excellent evening, embellished with a great collegial buzz which left everyone smiling!

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LOCAL BAND PROFILE: MAMA JUJU & THE JAM TARTS

Band nostalgia has been the flavour of recent years; the *Silver Chair* memoir, *Midnight Oil's* final concert, the Beatles' *Now and Then* release – but on a somewhat smaller stage a local women's quartet is celebrating its tenth anniversary year.

Mama Juju & the Jam Tarts have been rocking since 2014 with their encyclopaedic mix of Celtic, rock, blues, folk and country. Even more impressive than their musical repertoire is the range of instruments these women can play. The setup, which could be an eclectic tour of the orchestra, includes guitars, bass, drums, harmonica, a genuine 1980s keytar, ukuleles, flute and piccolo. All four band members sing so four-part harmonies are a natural and everyone gets a chance to shine with lead vocals. Front woman Julie Minto — Mama Juju — jokes that playing in a group of multi-instrumentalists has its moments.

"Sometimes we forget who's playing which instrument and one of us has to do a quick swap. Having lots of instruments on stage means that quick access to them can sometimes be a challenge. I've found the best place to store my harmonicas is to stuff them down my bra and just rummage around for the right one as needed."

Julie and Vicky Macdonald, who write the group's original songs, started playing together 24 years ago in Irish band Thornlands which took them to many local and interstate festivals.



In 2014 Cath McCourt, was recruited by Julie from BUMs (*Brisbane Ukulele Musicians*), and along with Vicky, the trio Mama Juju & The Jam Tarts was born. (Mama Juju is a name Julie carried over from a jazz duo she played in.) Another group Julie jammed with introduced her to Trish Rodwell who became the Jam Tarts drummer. The newly-formed quartet did local gigs with no real plans for continuing as an entity but growing popularity — and increasing demand as a party dance band since the addition of Trish's driving drum rhythms — saw *Mama Juju & The Jam Tarts* become an established part of the Bayside music scene.

There were a few changes to the line-up; Cath McCourt moved on but still comes back for the occasional guest spot and Connie Di Dato joined the permanent lineup in 2016.

Each of the band members has a long association with music. Julie grew up in a musical family.

"My three older sisters all sang and played instruments, Mum was into musical theatre and played piano, so we all grew up listening to Gilbert and Sullivan, The Sound of Music and stuff like that," she says. "Dad played bag pipes. He'd given that up by the time I came along but I remember him singing the occasional Scottish folk song."

Julie progressed to choir and musical theatre in high school, wrote songs and performed in various bands playing guitar, bass guitar, harmonica and ukulele.

Vicky, with classical training in guitar, flute, voice and music arrangement, has played and sung in community orchestras, theatre productions, jazz ensembles, bush bands and folk groups and is Music Director for the Coral Chorale on Macleay Island. Vicky is also a teacher and composer, writing for such varied genres as experimental theatre music and fun songs for children.

"I am lucky to have so many musical influences – when song-writing, I find ideas often burst full-blown into my mind, and can be any genre – traditional, country, ballad, swing, jazz, blues, music theatre, silly kids' songs or quirky pieces." Vicki plays flute, piccolo, keytar, guitar, bass and ukulele – it's been said that given time, she could probably get a decent tune out of a brick.

Trish's burning desire to play drums in her primary school marching band was initially blocked by prevailing gender attitudes. "I was told 'boys play the drums, girls play the fife,' she says. But you can't keep a born drummer down and at fifteen Trish got her first drum kit. Two years later she got her first car — a two-door Toyota Corolla — and the bass drum took pride of place in the passenger seat; "That's the only place that it would fit!"

As well as singing and playing tenor guitar, harmonica and ukulele, Trish can play pretty well any percussion instrument she's presented with, including washboard, lagerphone, cajon, congas, bongos, djembe, shakers — and tin kettles. (She could probably get a rhythm out of Vicky's brick.)

Connie is a rock'n'roll devotee who took up guitar as a teenager. "I went to TAFE as a mature age student in 1999 and met other musicians, gained confidence in my musical ability and started a duo," she says. "Later I joined a few bands, including originals band Cosmic Honey which is when I met Julie. I got hooked on performing live and joined The Jam Tarts in 2016; I love the musical versatility and the friendship in the band, it's really good fun."

Connie sings and plays guitar, bass guitar, drums, harmonica and solid body electric ukulele (all the band members play ukulele) and is currently exploring the potential of the violin as well as recording a CD of her original songs.


Financial Contributors and Volunteers

Happy New Year to all our readers, and happy and healthy and good fishing in 2024. How time flies!

During the school holidays and the Christmas break, there's nothing better than spending time on the water in Moreton Bay with the family. Thousands of boats will be out with the families catching a fresh fish for the table. The bay has so many fishing options, from the fun of catching whiting to the tiger squid. Prime fishing spots in January will be around the shallows from the Chain Banks, the Rous Channel, the western side of Moreton Island, and Amity Banks.

The tiger squid season will get better as the water clears after storms and heavy rains, and in large tides, they should also front up at Green Island. At the moment, they're in the weed banks at the Small Boat Channel and all through the Rous and Amity Banks. The weed banks at Moreton Island will produce plenty of squid, especially an hour

Snapper and squire and some really nice

sweetlip will be around this time of year at Mud Island and the Lazaret Gutter at Peel Island, St Helena and Green Island, but for me, the best thing will be getting plenty of whitebait at Peel and Green Islands at night. Whitebait is one of our favourite foods to eat, and all you need to catch these tasty critters is a butterfly net and a light at the back of the boat at night. If you need a good bait net on a long cane, you can order or get one from Water Tower Bait and Tackle.

If all things line up in the universe, the spotty mackerel should start entering the bay in January. They are so nice to eat and so much fun to catch. Use a chrome slug and a spinning rod, and just cast and retrieve where you see them chopping up the water. I use the 34-gram chrome slugs; there



is no need to spend lots of money on them. Water Tower Bait and Tackle carry my chrome slugs, which don't break the bank if you lose a few.

With all the extra boat traffic, be aware and keep a good eye on the weather. It's always better to cancel or postpone a fishing trip than put your friends or family in danger.







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BBQ LAMB CHOPS WITH A MINTY MARINADE RECIPE

Fire up the barbecue for this simple grilled lamb chop recipe packed with flavour, thanks to the generous amounts of fresh herbs in the marinade. Add some crusty bread and your favourite salads, and you've got a gournet feast that makes a backyard barbecue something special.

INGREDIENTS

- 8 -10 lamb chops
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup fresh mint leaves, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup fresh rosemary leaves, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup olive oil

- · 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- Lemon wedges and rosemary sprigs to serve



METHOD

1. Whip up your marinade

In a small bowl, whisk together the garlic, mint, rosemary, olive oil, red wine vinegar, and Dijon mustard. Season with salt and pepper, and your marinade is ready for the lamb.

2. Massage your chops!

Place the lamb chops in a shallow dish or a ziplock bag. Pour the marinade over the lamb and massage it into the meat so it's coated all over. Cover the dish with plastic wrap or seal the bag and rrefrigerate for at least two hours (or overnight if you're organised) to let the flavours infuse.

3. Fire up the barbie

Preheat your BBQ to a medium-high heat.

4. Get ready to grill

Remove your lamb chops from the marinade and shake off any excess (keep the marinade for basting while your lamb is cooking). Place the chops on the barbecue and grill for around four to five minutes, turning halfway if you like your meat medium-rare (recommended) or longer if you want it well done. During the last minute of grilling, brush the lamb chops with the leftover marinade, giving the meat a delicious glaze.

5. Take a break

Your lamb chops are now done, but they need to rest for a few minutes. Take them off the grill and cover them with tin foil.

6. It's time to eat

A squeeze of lemon over your chops will add an extra zing, and you can even garnish with more freshly chopped mint and rosemary.

AUSTRALIAN YOUTH WATER POLO CHAMPIONSHIPS RETURN TO BRISBANE

The Australian Youth Water Polo Championships will make an exciting return to Brisbane from 5 to 16 January 2024. Brisbane helped launch the event in 2019; in 2024, 210 teams and 3,000 competitors, aged 12 to 18 years old, are expected to take part. The Australian Youth Water Polo Championships is the largest water polo Club competition in the Southern Hemisphere and this year's event is the biggest ever.

AYWPC's Acting CEO, Tim Welsford, says Championships engender unity amongst the teams.

"The Australian Youth Water Polo Championships began as a way to unite the junior water polo community in Australia, and have done so ever since the first event was held in Brisbane in 2019. The event remains a fantastic way to bring teams and clubs together in a tournament environment and promote the sport of water polo.

"Keen water polo players from all over Australia and the world are attracted to the event, with hundreds competing from U12 through to U18. While they all come from different teams and backgrounds, the one thing they all have in common is their love for the sport."

The age groups used to be run separately over different locations, but this event draws together all the competitors, who will come from across Australia, NZ and even the USA. It's not just the competitors who will feel the adrenalin rush; Tim says that water polo is a wonderful experience for spectators.

"Water Polo is a fantastic spectator sport, known for its competitive play and close games. At the Australian Youth Water Polo Championships there is seating available for all matches, with the crowd known to be quite loud during an especially competitive rivalry match or finals game," he says. "As an added attraction, both the Ord Minnett Aussie Sharks and Aussie Stingers (senior national teams) will be playing a three test match series to headline the event."

As well as providing young competitors with the opportunity to compete across a wide peer group, AYWPC brings to light some first-class talent.


