




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### THE CREATIVE YEAR AHEAD FOR THE OLD SCHOOLHOUSE GALLERY



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### **OUR NEW LAGOON WARD IS OFFICIALLY OPEN**

Works continue to go gangbusters at Redland Hospital with the new Intensive Care Unit and wards under construction with ADCO and it was wonderful to officially open our new \$25 million Lagoon Ward with Minister Fentiman. The new 28-bed ward will allow locals to receive first class care closer to home. It's located at the back of the main hospital and will increase medical bed capacity for the hospital by 57 per cent. The ward will consist of one and two bed suites, an isolation and bariatric rooms and extra facilities for patients and staff. The new ward will improve patient flow through the hospital. We will keep working to deliver world class care closer to home for all Redlanders.



#### HALF A MILLION FOR OUR DONALD SIMPSON CENTRE



Our State Government has come to the rescue of the Donald Simpson Centre after Redland City Council withdrew its operational funding in 2019. ### **GROWING UP AS A SKATEBOARDER IN THE REDLANDS**

#### I first got into skateboarding in the early '90s when my brother and I both received skateboards for Christmas, and have been hooked since then.

There were no skateparks in the Redlands back then, so the only place to skate was the local Koala Park shopping centre. I guess you could say at a young age skateboarding opened my eyes up to the world, and after seeing my first international skateboard video, I knew I wanted to travel to skate those spots.

Growing up as a skateboarder in the Redlands, you were mostly seen as an outcast or to the general public, 'up to no good', but skateboarding has been the one thing that has kept me out of trouble and let me travel the world.

I have been teaching skateboarding for the last 15 years and trying to get the youth of the Redlands back outside and on the board.

Over the years I have seen a decline in skateboarders in the Redlands; I do believe that a major factor is our outdated skateparks here in the Redlands, with even the locals travelling out of town to skate.

With the Redlands producing some of the best skateboarders in Australia, including Joel Mcilroy (pictured), Tommy Fynn and Alex Lawton, I hope the local council can finally do something for the youth and give them a better skateboarding facility.

### **BAYSIDE BEEKEEPERS ASSOCIATION SAYS WORKING BEES ARE A BUZZ!**

Bees have always had a special significance for people. In ancient Egypt they were believed to be the tears of the sun god Ra, and honey, a major domestic and export product, was used as a sweetener and a medicine, while beeswax was used as an ingredient in cosmetics, embalming preparations and paints. In Greece the nymph Melissa was credited with teaching humans to use honey and the art of prophecy. For the Celts, bees were messengers between our world and the world of spirits.

The respectful partnership still continues. Members of the Bayside Beekeepers Association are helping keep alive the tradition of nurturing bees and gathering their produce. Association President Michael Cavanagh says that beekeeping attracts a variety of people – for a variety of reasons.

"Our beekeepers come from all walks of life," he says; "Engineers, teachers, tradespeople, academics, scientists – and they all have their own reason for being involved. Frequently, it's keeping up a long family tradition; many beekeepers have been brought up with bees and they usually have a very practical, hands-on approach and tend to stick with the traditional methods and tools.

"Then there are folk who are looking for a hobby – maybe they're approaching retirement – who just fall into beekeeping. They often fluff around the edges for a while, get an idea of it, then take the plunge.

"Environmentalists of all ages come to beekeeping, though you do get a lot of younger folk. They're people who want to make a difference to the world's welfare and see nurturing bees as a way to help.

"Then there are those who see beekeeping as a good money-making proposition. Their hive numbers tend to grow exponentially over the years as they get the feel for the various markets; honey, beeswax, bees and hives and queen bees."

Michael says that raising queen bees is a real specialty and the best queens are frequently sourced from DNA-savvy raisers rather than swarms. "Queens have to be replaced about every two years and the breeders strive for bees that are placid, productive and clean."

(So essentially, a good queen is easy-going and non-aggressive, a good mother and a good housekeeper. Hmmm.)

Opinions on the best flowering plants to offer bees are as varied as the reasons for taking up beekeeping.

"Traditionalists will advise planting tree species that bees used before we chopped them down," Michael says; "trees like acacias and eucalypts, blue, grey and flooded gums. Others will argue for trees and shrubs that look attractive in suburban gardens, like leptospermums and grevillea. Still others say self-sufficient market garden plantings are the best; flowering plants like lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower and various herbs. The essential bottom line is that the plant produces a flower with a nectar source that the bee's proboscis can reach."

While the attractions of beekeeping are many, there are other considerations. Setting up as an apiarist costs roughly \$1,000 for hives, frames, safety

equipment, bee suit, smokers, and the rest and going into serious honey production will add a further \$1,000 to the bill. Boxes need to be replaced every five to seven years and frames every two to three years.

The Bayside Beekeepers Association has regular Field Days at the Redlands Research Facility in Delancy Street, Cleveland, where the non-cognoscenti can be initiated into the mysteries and marvels of working with bees. The next Field Day will be held on January 14 from 8:00am to 12:00pm; for more information check out their Facebook page or their website at https://baysidebeekeepers.org.au/.

Get with the bees; it'll be a buzz.

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### WILL CANINE HYDROTHERAPY BE GOOD FOR MY DOG?

Canine Hydrotherapy has a number of benefits for our best friends' health and wellbeing. The water's natural buoyancy and resistance assists with strengthening their muscles whilst supporting their joints. The warmth of the water also keeps their joints and muscles warm.

It can be used for maintaining or regaining strength after surgery or injury as well as keeping our older or arthritic friends in their best form possible and let's not forget our athletic companions who can also benefit by working on their endurance, stamina and general fitness in the water.

Hydrotherapy is also great for weight loss as the resistance of the water adds to their workout, whilst the water is supporting their joints during the exercise. Fifteen minutes on the underwater treadmill is equivalent to roughly 30 minutes on dry land.

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### **COMMUNITY PROFILE: REDLAND YURARA ART SOCIETY INC.**

Tucked away in the Pinkland Recreation Reserve of Thornlands, just off Cleveland-Redland Bay Road, you'll find the gallery and studio of the Redland Yurara Art Society.

Yurara is a not-for-profit art society run exclusively by volunteers. It is the oldest and largest art society in the Redlands, established in 1962 by Clothilde Highton and a small group of artists. The Society initially met in Clothilde's home, "Yurara", which overlooked Raby Bay. Yurara is an Aboriginal word meaning "looking eastwards", and the Society initially was known as "the Yurara Art Group".

The group defined its purpose "to encourage practising artists and to awaken public interest in the Arts generally". These remain Yurara's objectives to the present day, though additionally, the Society now extends a warm welcome to all, irrespective of their level of artistic expertise. Eventually, the Society plans to expand its activities to become the Redlands area's major arts and crafts hub.

In 1991, the group became an incorporated entity named the "Redland Yurara Art Society Inc.", known informally as just "Yurara". Following an allocation of land by the Redland Shire Council in the Pinkland Recreation Reserve, a significant fundraising effort was matched by a dollar-for-dollar grant from the Queensland State Government, and Yurara was able to build its own studio, which was officially opened in August 1992 by the then Premier of Queensland, Mr Wayne Goss. This remains the hub of members' activities. In 1998, a generous bequest from founding member Joan Higgins allowed for an extension that doubled the available space and the creation of a professional gallery.

Yurara holds regular workshops and art classes, including life drawing, tutorials, meetings and social gatherings. Weekly portraiture and en plein air sessions allow members to hone their skills whilst enjoying a social get-together. A feature at Yurara is the members' themed exhibitions of artwork, which change monthly. In addition, each year, a judged major exhibition is held.

The studio and gallery are well-equipped and air-conditioned, with modern hanging facilities and professional lighting. The studio is equipped with a wide variety of art equipment for members' use and an extensive library of books, magazines, DVDs and videos.

Yurara Gallery is open to the public from 10:00am to 4:00pm on weekends. Artworks on display are for sale, and pottery, greeting cards, bookmarks, and other items produced by Yurara members are also available.

### **COOCHIEMUDLO ISLAND: IF YOUR NAME'S MUD - FEATURE IT!**

For the unknowing, an island with "mud" in its name could discourage any intended visits. For those in the know, Coochiemudlo (which means "red rock", the ochre gathered by the Quandamooka people) is a gem in the bay, a precious little place that is becoming increasingly popular with mainland tourists and folk who come for a visit to enjoy the swimming and fishing – and end up staying.

When Jan MacIntyre settled on Coochiemudlo 23 years ago, the population totalled 350. The most recent census put the current population at 870, which, while not astronomical, is a sizable increase on a land mass with a total area of 4.1 km<sup>2</sup>. Jan is now the President of the Coochiemudlo Heritage Society, which holds the collected history and artefacts of white settlement on the island.

Matthew Flinders, captain of the ship Norfolk, landed on Coochiemudlo in July 1799 at what is now called Norfolk Beach. Flinders called it the Sixth Island, later known as Innes Island, then reverted to its Indigenous name in the 1880s. While a valuable source of timber, the mosquitoes and lack of a reliable water supply kept white settlement at bay until the early 20th century.

Jan says that the Heritage Society – originally the Historical Society – had early hopes of having a dedicated building brought over from the mainland to house the collection. The dream didn't eventuate and the museum is now housed in a downstairs room of the Coochiemudlo Community Hall. A donation of display cabinets from the Queensland Museum gave the space a distinctly professional air – even though it's run by volunteers – and the museum has a comfortable relationship with its housemate, the Coochiemudlo Library.

While white history on the island isn't extensive, the museum has a collection of historical family artefacts, tools of trade, historical documents, photographs, artwork and books that pieced together give a sense of how this little settlement grew.

"Since 2016, volunteers have compiled a Year Book for the island," Jan says. "Everything of note goes into it; even the installation of the island's sewage system rated a mention!

"We have books about the island written by locals and edited by Emeritus Professor John Pearn. *Chronicles of Coochiemudlo* starts with the prehistory of the island and tracks its history through to Federation and World War One. The other really popular book is *Characters, Clothes and Cliffs*, a compilation of stories from various local writers.

"We also have an exhibit about the island's heritage-listed Emerald Fringe that skirts the island between the high-water mark and property boundaries. That's very impressive for such a little place – but my favourite exhibit is the artwork of Rosemary Opala, her line drawings and paintings of the local flora," Jan says. "Her favourite flowers were the banksias, and they're still very much a part of our bush environment."

The landscape of the Emerald Fringe embraces a significant and endangered coastal environment that includes a variety of ecosystems, including littoral forest, tidal mangroves and foreshores. There are low-impact recreational facilities, meeting areas, and some modest community monuments in the Fringe, but no private residences.

There are public amenities and shops on the island, a café, restaurant and beach bar, but Jan recommends having a backup plan for large groups.

"Coochie's only a small place, so a sudden surge of visitors could be a bit overwhelming," she says. "As well as bringing the standard water bottle, sunscreen – and insect repellent, just in case – if you're coming with a swarm of hungry children, packing a few sandwiches might be a wise move!"

The museum, in conjunction with the library, is open to the public on selected Saturday mornings.

### **ROCKING THE REDLANDS: MAMA JUJU & THE JAM TARTS**

Band nostalgia has been the flavour of recent years; the *Silver Chair* memoir, *Midnight Oil's* final concert, the Beatles' *Now and Then* release – but on a somewhat smaller stage a local women's quartet is celebrating its tenth anniversary year.

*Mama Juju & the Jam Tarts* have been rocking the Redlands since 2014 with their encyclopaedic mix of Celtic, rock, blues, folk and country. Even more impressive than their musical repertoire is the range of instruments these women can play. The setup, which could be an eclectic tour of the orchestra, includes guitars, bass, drums, harmonica, a genuine 1980s keytar, ukuleles, flute and piccolo. All four band members sing so four-part harmonies are a natural and everyone gets a chance to shine with lead vocals. Front woman Julie Minto – Mama Juju – jokes that playing in a group of multi-instrumentalists has its moments.

"Sometimes we forget who's playing which instrument and one of us has to do a quick swap. Having lots of instruments on stage means that quick access to them can sometimes be a challenge. I've found the best place to store my harmonicas is to stuff them down my bra and just rummage around for the right one as needed."

Julie and Vicky Macdonald, who write the group's original songs, started playing together 24 years ago in Irish band Thornlands which took them to many local and interstate festivals.

In 2014 Cath McCourt, was recruited by Julie from BUMs (*Brisbane Ukulele Musicians*), and along with Vicky, the trio Mama Juju & The Jam Tarts was born. (Mama Juju is a name Julie carried over from a jazz duo she played in.) Another group Julie jammed with introduced her to Trish Rodwell who became the Jam Tarts drummer. The newly-formed quartet did local gigs with no real plans for continuing as an entity, but growing popularity – and increasing demand as a party dance band since the addition of Trish's driving drum rhythms – saw *Mama Juju & The Jam Tarts* become an established part of the bayside music scene.

There were a few changes to the line-up; Cath McCourt moved on but still comes back for the occasional guest spot and Connie Di Dato joined the permanent lineup in 2016.

Each of the band members has a long association with music. Julie grew up in a musical family.

"My three older sisters all sang and played instruments, Mum was into musical theatre and played piano, so we all grew up listening to Gilbert and Sullivan, The Sound of Music and stuff like that," she says. "Dad played bag pipes. He'd given that up by the time I came along but I remember him singing the occasional Scottish folk song."

Julie progressed to choir and musical theatre in high school, wrote songs and performed in various bands playing guitar, bass guitar, harmonica and ukulele.

Vicky, with classical training in guitar, flute, voice and music arrangement, has played and sung in community orchestras, theatre productions, jazz ensembles, bush bands and folk groups and is Music Director for the Coral Chorale on Macleay Island. Vicky is also a teacher and composer, writing for such varied genres as experimental theatre music and fun songs for children.

"I am lucky to have so many musical influences – when song-writing, I find ideas often burst full-blown into my mind, and can be any genre – traditional, country, ballad, swing, jazz, blues, music theatre, silly kids' songs or quirky pieces." Vicki plays flute, piccolo, keytar, guitar, bass and ukulele – it's been said that given time, she could probably get a decent tune out of a brick.

Trish's burning desire to play drums in her primary school marching band was initially blocked by prevailing gender attitudes. "I was told 'boys play the drums, girls play the fife,' she says. But you can't keep a born drummer down and at fifteen Trish got her first drum kit. Two years later she got her first car – a two-door Toyota Corolla – and the bass drum took pride of place in the passenger seat; "That's the only place that it would fit!"

As well as singing and playing tenor guitar, harmonica and ukulele, Trish can play pretty well any percussion instrument she's presented with, including washboard, lagerphone, cajon, congas, bongos, djembe, shakers – and tin kettles. (She could probably get a rhythm out of Vicky's brick.)

Connie is a rock'n'roll devotee who took up guitar as a teenager. "I went to TAFE as a mature age student in 1999 and met other musicians, gained confidence in my musical ability and started a duo," she says. "Later I joined a few bands, including originals band Cosmic Honey which is when I met Julie. I got hooked on performing live and joined The Jam Tarts in 2016. I love the musical versatility and the friendship in the band, it's really good fun."

Connie sings and plays guitar, bass guitar, drums, harmonica and solid body electric ukulele (all the band members play ukulele) and is currently exploring the potential of the violin as well as recording a CD of her original songs.

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### **MORE PLATINUM FOUND IN THE REDLANDS**

While they don't get the same international coverage as the Cannes *Palme d'Or* cinema awards, the Gold Coast's Gold Palm Theatre Awards are eagerly awaited every December by theatre groups all over south-east Queensland and northern NSW. Inaugurated in 2009 (originally as the Gold Coast Area Theatre Awards) the "Palmies" are now regarded as an annual highlight by community theatre groups, high schools and colleges.

The brain-child of actor/producer Kate Peters, the awards were initiated in 2009 as a way of publicly acknowledging the contribution made by community and non-professional performers, celebrating the essential part that theatre plays in our society, providing a network of connection and resource sharing and encouraging the pursuit of theatrical excellence.

Kate says that people are transported to another time and place by theatre.

"They're taken away from the problems of their daily lives... performers create magic, and historically live performance has been embraced even in the darkest of times."

Plays presented by participants (50 groups in 2023) are assessed by three judges (from a full panel of 12), all of whom have a long history in theatre as actors, educators, and administrators. Thirty-two awards, covering every aspect of production and stagecraft, are presented at the end-of-year celebration. The pick of the crop is the Platinum Palm Award, presented to the individual or company deemed to have presented/supplied/ staged or appeared in a production or given a service to the Theatrical Community which is considered outstanding; this year it will be coming to a home with Theatre Redlands in the Redlands Museum.

Jan Nary, one of the principals of Museum-auspiced Theatre Redlands, was the awarded the trophy for her play about the Australian Women's Land Army, *The Other Diggers,* which premiered in June. A thoroughly researched re-creation of a group of Land Army women, the play was inspired by a talk given by Redland Councillor Paul Bishop.

"Researching, formatting and writing the play was a big task but the results were intensely gratifying," Jan says. "I managed to find two women who had been in the Land Army; their stories were priceless additions

to what I could glean from family members and limited records. I had support from RADF to create a stage presentation – an Australian first, I think – that pays homage to those wonderful women and their vital wartime role, a role that has been largely overlooked by history."

The new trophy will join a Special Platinum Award and a Judges' Discretionary Award, presented for the Theatre Redlands' 2020 Hallowe'en show *When the Darkness Moves*, on the Museum's "Skite Site" display shelf.

### KISSING, BREAKING AND POTTING - IT'S ALL IN THE GAME

January. Most of the holiday money is spent, the festivities are over, all the new movies have been seen and the young folk still have another month off school. In the hunt for something new and different to entertain them, it might be worth introducing them to the gentlemanly pastime of Cue Sports. Redlands RSL Snooker Club has a dedicated billiards room with three tables, coaching is available and juniors are welcome.

Remembering the old aphorism that skill at snooker is the sign of a misspent youth, and knowing that most classic gangland crime movies feature at least one shoot-'em-up brawl in a pool room, why would you send your child to a cue sports school?

Lots of reasons, according to former Redlands RSL Snooker Club President Belinda Dinga. Her son Jayden started learning snooker 12 years ago at the age of six; he's now the Australian Junior Champion and will be travelling to Albania next year to try for the title of World Junior Champion in the World Snooker Federation World Championships.

"Involvement in snooker has given Jayden so many wonderful opportunities and young players learn more than just how to play the game," she says.

"It teaches them respect, self-control, discipline and sportsmanship. Jayden has a job that he loves at a snooker centre in Calamvale, he's travelled all around Australia and to New Zealand playing and competing and he's had residential invitations to China and England. It's had such a good impact on his life. The Redlands club has always been a main feeder into the game; it's the strongest junior club in Australia."

Jayden's 16-year-old younger brother Lucas is showing a stirring of interest in the game and six-year-old Lachlan, the family junior, already wields the cue; on his tip-toes at the family pool table and on a step at the higher snooker table. That their dad, Ed, is an accredited coach has no doubt helped their interest but Belinda gives most of the credit to Bob Turpin, the RSL Juniors' coach who trained the boys and put Ed though his coaching exam.

"Bob's a wonderful person; he's been coaching Redlands kids, gratis, for more than 25 years and his juniors have won more than a hundred state titles and over 50 national titles," Belinda says.

"He's still a great player. Unlike many high-impact sports that have a physical age limit, snooker travels into your later years with you very comfortably."

Bob started playing pool when he was an apprentice at an engineering firm. The firm set up a snooker team; Bob joined and the flame was lit for a lifetime passion. He started coaching at the Redlands RSL thirty years ago and still plays – successfully – in the Golden Oldies comps. Bob has coached many of the players he competes with; his oldest pupil was ninety. His favourite game is now billiards, rather than snooker; "It's a more technical game, you have fewer options so you need more control."

Bob says a positive approach is essential when coaching, especially with young players.

"You need to be able to impart information in a few simple instructions; just give them a few words and let them play the shot. Always find the positive part, the thing that they're doing right and give them praise for it."

Bob has stepped back into the role of assistant coach to Club President Paul Talbot, who attributes much of the Club's strength and success to in-house and community support.

"The RSL is a godsend; they really look after us," Paul says. "We're one of three clubs in south-east Queensland that have a dedicated snooker room that's separate from the gaming room, which means there are no poker machines there and that makes the room accessible for young players. The membership and management of the club can see the value in cue sports and Bob and I are more than happy to commit our time as coaches. That's a recipe for success."

Paul says that membership is open to all genders, abilities and ages from six up. He has fond memories of learning to play billiards as a 13-year-old with family friends on his father's fold-out table "in a shed down the back". Paul went on to become a regular 8-ball pool player and committee member in various clubs and holds high hopes for the coming generations of players.

### Body corporate reforms strike the right balance

The Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ) is commending changes to a number of contentious body corporate matters that were previously placed in the "too hard basket", and have now been bought into line with modern community expectations.

The Body Corporate and Community Management and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2023 was passed by the Queensland Government, overhauling several Acts that regulate community title schemes in Queensland.

In summary, the body corporate changes will:

- Allow body corporates to make by-laws to prohibit smoking (including vapes) in outdoor areas and communal areas of strata communities,
- Prevent body corporates from making bylaws with blanket pet bans in community title schemes, and introduce a mechanism for pet approvals,
- Clarify and enhance the ability for body corporates to tow vehicles from common property in a timely manner, and
- Reduce consensus for scheme termination from unanimous to 75% of lot owners in limited circumstances.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said the reforms would help modernise apartment and unit living.

"The REIQ certainly supports the viewpoint that quiet enjoyment of people's homes is a right that should be upheld and not restricted as much as possible," Ms Mercorella said.

"However, we recognise that due to the nature of sharing a title and being in close quarters, there needs to be laws that govern communities with clarity and necessary protections to keep everyone within them safe.

"As our population grows, living in apartments and units is becoming more common place, and it's important to ensure our laws keep pace with changing community standards and expectations, and are balanced so that this lifestyle remains attractive in our state."

Ms Mercorella said the ability for body corporates to self-regulate and potentially prohibit smoking in outdoor areas such as balconies, courtyards, patios and verandas had attracted a high level of debate.

"When moving into a unit or apartment complex, people generally go in eyes-wideopen and understand that there are certain limits that apply to common use areas," she said.

"However, many of us agree that 'my home is my castle' and that you should be able to live the life you want to live when you're in the boundaries of your own home.

"Of course, the challenge comes with the fact that when you live in an apartment or a unit, your activity can also have an impact on others who live very close by – which is the case with smoke drift and second-hand smoke risk."

She said legislative reform to prevent body corporates from banning pets, except in specific circumstances, had been another controversial topic in body corporate schemes.

"Historically it's not uncommon to see body corporate bylaws with a blanket pet prohibition that says 'no pets allowed', and time and time again we have seen those bans being overturned," Ms Mercorella said.

"We know pets are an extension of our families

in many cases and the mental health benefits of having pets has been widely reported, so this reform will come as welcome news to many.

"However, it's the REIQ's view that there's a missed opportunity to align this legislation to the Residential Tenancies and Rooming Accommodation Act regarding the timeframe for a decision in relation to a pet request – any inconsistency will likely impact lot owners that rent their properties on the residential rental housing market."

In relation to allowing body corporates to tow motor vehicles if parked in contravention of a by-law, she said the REIQ expects this will be welcomed if there's sufficient notice.

"This reform addresses situations such as visitor parking being monopolised by the same lot owners or their guests, when the benefit is meant to be enjoyed by all," she said.

"Our view is that stakeholders should be educated about what signage should be erected and what information should be provided to lot owners about parking and towing by-laws, liability for the cost of same and particularly, with respect to third party guests."

She said the most controversial change was to allow the termination of a community titles scheme for economic reasons, after providing a termination plan and following a prescribed timeframe, with 75% of lot owners voting for the motion.

"This scheme termination reform, which was raised at the Housing Summit, is limited to specific circumstances with ageing or rundown buildings that will become unviable within five years, and there are rigorous statutory hoops to jump through to satisfy this," she said.

"From our perspective, it was particularly important to see adequate consumer protection measures included for vulnerable people, such as options for recourse, and compensation for lot owners as well as for parties with contractual interests in the scheme."

In addition, changes have also been made to the Land Sales Act 1984 impacting the operation of sunset clauses in off-the-plan land sale contracts to:

• Limit when property developers can invoke sunset clauses in contracts for the sale of land to specific situations, including requiring buyer's consent.

"It is our view that the proposed provisions, albeit offering strong consumer protection, may lack consideration for the commercial challenges faced by developers in providing housing," Ms Mercorella said.

"We appreciate that in what has been an unprecedented, extraordinary market period, that there have been some reports of developers pulling the pin on developments and leaving buyers to start again.

"However, our concern is that this now legislates an outlier issue which is not prevalent or evident in today's market now that we've returned to 'normality', and under normal circumstances these clauses are needed for developers to avoid bankruptcy on unfeasible projects."

She added, "As peak body, the REIQ is committed to developing resources and training for the real estate sector to ensure they are supported and prepared for the changes."

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
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### Apartment buyers flock to easy, breezy living at Redland Bay

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
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### **AUSTRALIAN YOUTH WATER POLO CHAMPIONSHIPS RETURN TO BRISBANE**

As well as providing young competitors with the opportunity to compete across a wide peer group, AYWPC brings to light some first-class talent.





The bay has so many fishing options, from the fun of catching whiting to the tiger squid. Prime fishing spots in January will be around the shallows from the Chain Banks, the Rous Channel, the western side of Moreton Island, and Amity Banks.

The tiger squid season will get better as the water clears after storms and heavy rains, and in large tides, they should also front up at Green Island. At the moment, they're in the weed banks at the Small Boat Channel and all through the Rous and Amity Banks. The weed banks at Moreton Island will produce plenty of squid, especially an hour

each side of the tide and at dawn and dusk.

sweetlip will be around this time of year at Mud Island and the Lazaret Gutter at Peel Island, St Helena and Green Island, but for me, the best thing will be getting plenty of whitebait at Peel and Green Islands at night. Whitebait is one of our favourite foods to eat, and all you need to catch these tasty critters is a butterfly net and a light at the back of the boat at night. If you need a good bait net on a long cane, you can order or get one from Water Tower Bait and Tackle.

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### **BBQ LAMB CHOPS WITH A MINTY MARINADE RECIPE**

Fire up the barbecue for this simple grilled lamb chop recipe packed with flavour, thanks to the generous amounts of fresh herbs in the marinade. Add some crusty bread and your favourite salads, and you've got a gourmet feast that makes a backyard barbecue something special

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 8 -10 lamb chops
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup fresh mint leaves, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup fresh rosemary leaves, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup olive oil

**METHOD** 

- · 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- · Lemon wedges and rosemary sprigs to serve

#### 5. Take a break

Your lamb chops are now done, but they need to rest for a few minutes. Take them off the grill and cover them with tin foil.

6. It's time to eat

A squeeze of lemon over your chops will add an extra zing, and you can even garnish with more freshly chopped mint and rosemary.

#### In a small bowl, whisk together the garlic, mint, rosemary, olive oil,

red wine vinegar, and Dijon mustard. Season with salt and pepper, and your marinade is ready for the lamb.

#### 2. Massage your chops!

1. Whip up your marinade

Place the lamb chops in a shallow dish or a ziplock bag. Pour the marinade over the lamb and massage it into the meat so it's coated all over. Cover the dish with plastic wrap or seal the bag and refrigerate for at least two hours (or overnight if you're organised) to let the flavours infuse.

#### 3. Fire up the barbie

Preheat your BBQ to a medium-high heat.

#### 4. Get ready to grill

Remove your lamb chops from the marinade and shake off any excess (keep the marinade for basting while your lamb is cooking). Place the chops on the barbecue and grill for around four to five minutes, turning halfway if you like your meat medium-rare (recommended) or longer if you want it well done. During the last minute of grilling, brush the lamb chops with the leftover marinade, giving the meat a delicious glaze.

### **Finances after Christmas**

Happy New Year. Congratulations, you made it. Most people will take time through the Christmas and New Year period to relax or visit family members. Some may look on the holiday period as an opportunity to get a home project or two done. It is also a fantastic time of year to conduct a financial health check for yourself to take stock of what has happened in the last year, and prepare for what you hope to happen next year.

The easiest place to start is a personal balance sheet. Put simply, this is a list of everything that you own, and all of your debts. I find it simple and logical to divide assets into categories, starting with personal, then investment, then business, and finally superannuation. The internet can provide some help with valuations for cars and property. When in doubt, put down a reasonable estimate of value, and try to resist the temptation to inflate the value of personal collectable assets like classic cars or art.

Once you know the value of everything you own, put down the value of everything that you owe. I normally do this in order from the longest-term debt (like property mortgages) down to the shortest term debts like credit cards. If you have succumbed to post-Christmas sales, this may also be where you record "buy now pay later" schemes.

Subtracting your total debts from your total assets will give you a measure of your personal net worth.

Now that you know more about what you're worth, you can look at your income and expenses. There are some excellent tools for this, including free budget templates that can be downloaded and prompt you with ideas on what to enter. Be sure to try and account for all regular sources of income. If you're unsure of your expenses, download and print bank and credit card statements for the last three months to give you an indication of your major expenses. When planning out for the year to come, you can also look at planning out larger items for the next year, like a holiday or a new car.

By doing this exercise each year, you can gain visibility over your personal financial position, create direction for the next year, and motivate yourself to set achievable goals. You can identify potential savings and think about the best use of those savings. You may also look at this information as a catalyst to think about whether you hold the right level of personal insurances (for example, consider what the world would look like for your dependents if both you and your income were suddenly no longer here).

This whole exercise may take you an hour or two, but it's well worth it if it sets you up for success for a whole year. If you find that it's challenging,
