## LAMB ISLAND'S PIONEER HALL TURNS 100 THIS YEAR

International Women's Day seemed like the perfect date to hold our first activity – a high tea – to celebrate our Lamb Island Pioneer Hall turning 100 years old!

The Pioneer Hall was built in 1924 as a family home by Cecil Hine, who donated it to the Lamb Island Community for its use. We were very fortunate to have the pleasure of our special guest at the high tea, Mrs Faith Rae (nee Hine), who is Cecil Hine's daughter, and grew up in the home until she left to work on the mainland at the age of 17.

Faith, at the wonderful age of 95-and-a-half, recalled her years and adventures on Lamb Island, and how the home went from two rooms to four to accommodate their growing family. Faith was very happy to see that her bedroom has become the Lamb Island Library, as she has always had a love of books and recalled sitting up in a tree at the front of her home, reading a book, hiding from the world.

Of the stories Faith shared with a smile was one about her younger years of primary school, which she attended on Russell Island. At that time there was a 'school boat', that would pick up children from Karragarra, Macleay and Lamb Islands, and deliver them to Russell

each morning, returning them in the afternoon. Faith said they would dare not miss the boat as they would be in the bad books, so they kept to a personal timetable and enjoyed the boat ride.

When the boat driver retired there were a few months where there was no school boat to take the children to Russell, so they had to make other arrangements. For Faith, her brother and sister and other Lamb Island children, this meant an earlier morning and adventure. They would all walk to the jetty, where they would get into a canoe and row to Karragarra Island. After securing their canoes the children would walk across the island to the opposite side and south towards the Russell Island jetty. When they arrived, a small boat would meet them and take them to Russell Island where they would walk to the school. Talk about a day's exercise before starting their day!

Tennis was a huge part of island life, with four tennis courts on Lamb Island and a friendly competition most weekends at one or another of the courts. The whole family was invited, with shared goodies; children gathering to play and explore, while the adults had time to relax and enjoy each other's company. That was not to say the rivalry was not fierce!

In 1984, fresh out of university, I began work at Main Range National Park as a Ranger. My journey continued at Lamington National Park and historic St Helena Island in Moreton Bay.

In the late 1980s I was asked to appear on national children's television. Back then, the television studios of Mount Coot-Tha Brisbane were a hive of production activity. The opportunity to educate and entertain children and adults about the wonders of nature was exciting!

I shared up-close and personal wildlife encounters on Wombat, Bushbeat, Agro's Cartoon Connection, and the iconic Totally Wild. Through these programs, a generation of children were exposed to the wild and natural world, and you know what they say about working with children and animals? Yep! It's sometimes crazy and unpredictable...but that's the appeal!

In 2021, after 29 years on air, Totally Wild was cancelled but when one door closes another opens – right? In fact, I've recently celebrated three years with the amazing Redland City Council Environment and Education Unit based at Council's IndigiScapes Environment Centre.

Nestled among 14.5 hectares of native bushland, IndigiScapes features three accessible walking trails, native botanic gardens, discovery centre, native plant nursery, theatrette, eco-friendly gift shop and popular Indigi Café.

Our Redlands Coast is a naturally wonderful region with diverse ecosystems and landscapes.

One of the coolest parts of my job as an environmental educator is to help people appreciate the environment.

Research tells us that time outdoors is great for our health, both physical and mental.

In this modern world where too much screen time is a reality, there's no greater feeling than witnessing the sense of wonder on a child's face when they connect with nature.



Forty years on, I'm as passionate as ever about sharing my love of nature, and Redlands Coast is a great place to do it!

#### \$15M FOR WEINAM CREEK CARPARK

With over 8,000 people calling the Southern Moreton Bay Islands home, we are seeing increasing parking pressures around Weinam Creek. In February, Redland City Council signed a non-binding MOU with Consolidated Properties Group as its preferred delivery partner for the Weinam Creek multi-storey carpark and retail development. I know how important a better parking solution is for the community and have been supportive of this project from the beginning. Although a Redland City Council project, I have fought to secure funding to ensure this much needed infrastructure can be delivered and fast tracked. This \$15 million will provide confidence that we are supporting Redland City Council to deliver key infrastructure for our community and visitors to our islands and revitalise our waterfront.

## LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT CAMMA CAMMA CAMELLIA

As I write, camellias are just starting to bloom. Soft petals open sporadically across plants, heralding the profusion that should be well underway by the time you're reading this!

There are hundreds of camellia species, but as with many plants, a few have taken out the top spots as our horticultural go-to's, and one is even a culinary go-to. Yep, our humble cup of tea comes from a camellia plant (Camellia sinensis). The fresh shoots are harvested, wilted, and dried. The longer the leaves are allowed to oxidize, the darker the tea (from green to black).

Camellias originally came from the Orient, particularly Japan and China, but also extend into other regions. Both Japanese and Chinese cultures hold the camellia in high regard, and they hold special places in temples and religious practices. In Yunnan Province (China), there are many ancient camellia plants (mostly C. reticulata), some dating back to the 1300s – that's over 600 years old! In

Japan, camellia oil is highly regarded and is said to have been used by geishas to maintain their perfect skin and silken hair. It's still a popular skincare product today (maybe I should look into that!).

Camellia blooms come in all shapes and sizes, ranging in colour from whites and pale yellows to pinks and reds. Flowers can be small and single or big blousy doubles. While the big doubles are the most elegant and probably my favourite, don't forget that all your pollinators prefer open flowers so they can get to the good stuff!

Our popular ornamental species, C. sasanqua and C. japonica, flower across autumn through to early spring, with the former starting first and the latter blooming later. While camellias are generally known for being shade lovers, C. sasanqua can take quite a lot of sun once established, but it's best to read the tag and get some advice from your local nursery as hybridization has blurred the boundaries a little.

## THE BENEFITS OF HOME COMPOSTING

It's International Compost Awareness Week from 5 to 11 May 2024, which is the perfect time to consider the benefits of composting.

Did you know that composting and worm farming can remove up to 50 per cent of household organic waste going to landfill, helping to reduce your ecological footprint?

In landfill, organic material breaks down and generates methane and carbon dioxide, both major greenhouse gases.

Composting and worm farming are effective ways to produce rich compost for your garden while reducing food and organic waste to landfill and greenhouse emissions.

Did you know?

- Worms only breed if there is enough food. In good conditions, the population can double in two to three months. Compost worms breed every seven to 10 days.
- Worm farms are hygienic and have no unpleasant odours unless the worms are fed too much food or the wrong food types.
- Composting creates nutrient-rich fertiliser which can enrich your garden's soil.
- Garden organic waste can be added to home garden compost bins or you can order a green bin from council.

Items you can compost include:

- Fruit scraps such as watermelon peel, banana skins, apple cores and rockmelon peel
- Vegetable scraps such as lettuce cores and broccoli stalks
- Cardboard, newspaper, leaves, hay or straw
- Coffee grounds
- Hair from your brush or comb

Items to avoid include:

- Fats and oils
- Meat products (including bones)
- Dairy products
- · Bread and cake products
- · Cat or dog faeces
- Citrus and onion (for worm farms)

If composting isn't your thing, you can share your food scraps and other organics with your neighbours who may be composting, have a worm farm or keep farm animals. Go to sharewaste.com for more information.

## CREATE EXCHANGE: ARTISTS, ARCHIVISTS AND INNOVATORS

CREATE EXCHANGE Ngumpi, an all-embracing arts event on Quandamooka country, offers a visitor experience that is breathtaking, beautiful and educational.

Mother and daughter artists Sonja and Elisa Jane Carmichael, proud Ngugi women, have combined their formidable artistic talents to present art pieces and installations that tell the 60,000-year old story of their Quandamooka country. Their art works focus mainly on the weaving that is a central part of Quandamooka culture, an art form that, like their language, was nearly erased after white settlement.

"There are gaps in our knowledge," Sonja says. "When the missionaries came we had to speak English – Elders have memories of our women hiding behind trees to converse in language. Our weaving traditions were interrupted in favour of crafts like knitting - there's nothing wrong with knitting but the only way that they could keep the weaving practice alive was to make more ornate, decorated bags that could be sold to tourists."

Ironically, it was through viewing a collection of Quandamooka woven bags at the University of Queensland that Sonja's interest in local fibre weaving was sparked.

"It was sad to see our traditional bags made in the eighteenth century coming out of a dark place like museum storage, so far from Country," Sonja says, "but I revisited them and studied them. There was a complicated diagonal knot that gave the weave real strength - even anthropologists had commented on it – and it seemed to be connected

"I went home and sat with one of our Elders who had helped the grannies gather reeds back when weaving was part of daily life – then I trusted my Ancestral hands and started experimenting."

The result is a revival of the almost lost art of weaving, incorporated by Sonja and Elisa Jane into exquisite and imaginative art pieces. Serendipitously, through their community workshops they have also been drawing on traditional language words related to weaving inevitable when a group of people sit and work and talk together.

They have mastered the main technique – including ways of attaching reeds for increased fibre length – but both artists say that the process is still a work in progress.

"I have experimented with knotting methods and reed preparation," Sonja says. "I've tried holding the string on my feet and I've tried wrapping it around my legs – but I'm not as supple as I used to be! Some accounts say that the reeds should be fire-dried to make them more pliable, others say that they should be kept moist. Leecee and I have found techniques that work for us but we'll keep experimenting

The women take great care to guard the precious source of their main materials, protecting the main growth areas from exploitation and harvesting only the mature, pink-bottomed reeds.

"We can't deplete the crop by overharvesting; if a reed doesn't slide easily out of its sheath it's not ready to be picked," says Sonja.

Weaving is not an exclusively women's practice. The things that they make can be for ritual purposes and ceremony or purely utilitarian, for carrying everything from babies to food. Similarly, men weave nets for hunting and fishing and bags for ceremony. Elisa Jane points out that the choice of fibre depends on the use that the article will be put to; ungaire reeds are best for gulayi (dillybags) but are unsuitable for fishing nets because they are a freshwater swamp reed whereas talwalpin (cotton tree) fibre can be used in fresh or salt water. Ngumpi includes Elisa Jane's first woven gulayi with ungaire and mastering the diagonal knot, heart-warming evidence that the old traditions are still alive and being passed down through the generations.

Natural fibres are not the only components of the artworks on display. Shells, nuts and string are worked into the pieces and in one exquisite installation miniature woven copper wire bags, each holding a treasure from the sea or the land, hang in a magical suspended forest of shifting light and birdsong. There are prints Sonja and Elisa Jane have created from some of the weavings that they have made and delicate, minimalist impressions of ungaire on white, hand-made paper. A gunyah – complete with sandy floor – commands the centre of the gallery.



And in a stand to protect the precious waters and marine life of Quandamooka, the two artists have repurposed a problem into an art

form by incorporating fishing line and ghost nets into some of their work.

"We've been going to the Cairns Indigenous Arts Festival for more than a decade and that's where we became aware of Ghost Net Art," says Elisa Jane. abandoned "Incorporating ghost nets, ropes and fishing lines that are retrieved from the shore and the rocks helps protect our marine life and raises consciousness about the impact they're having on dugong and turtles and other sea creatures."

## **ALL ABOUT DENTAL DISEASE IN CATS**

Diseases of the teeth and gums are common in cats with some studies suggesting that as many as 90% of cats over four years of age suffer from some degree of dental disease.

#### **SIGNS OF DENTAL DISEASE**

The clinical signs of dental disease vary depending on the severity of the condition but can include:

- Swelling, redness and oral pain
- Bleeding gums
- Increased salivation
- Bad breath
- Avoiding hard foods
- Turning the head to one side when chewing
- Rubbing the mouth/face
- Inappetence

#### TYPES OF DENTAL DISEASE

There are three common types of dental disease in cats:

#### 1. Gingivitis

Gingivitis is inflammation of the gums as a result of plaque and bacteria accumulating on the teeth.

#### 2. Periodontitis

Untreated gingivitis can progress to periodontitis which is when the tissues attaching the tooth to the gums and bone become weakened. This can lead to tooth loss.

#### 3. Tooth resorption

Tooth resorption occurs when the structure of the tooth breaks down - this begins with the tissues inside the tooth and progresses to the loss of enamel. Teeth may fracture, resulting in large enamel defects which can be very painful.

#### PREVENTING DENTAL DISEASE

Good dental hygiene is important for maintaining your cat's health.

## A GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY CURTAIN CALL

Possibly the first permanent theatrical troupe in the Redlands, Mount Cotton Drama Group's home was Mt Cotton Community Hall, built with timber from settler Daniel Benfer's property and opened by Adolf Benfer in 1930. This year, the group will celebrate the 50th anniversary of its foundation with an exhibition at Redland Museum.

Started by a group of teachers in 1974, the group proved highly popular with performers and audiences alike and after 16 years its numbers had swelled to the point where it gave birth to a breakaway musical-focussed group, MATES. Mt Cotton presented 142 productions over its 43 years, but nothing lasts forever and in 2017 it rang down the curtain for the time last and merged its properties, members and cash with MATES (which had now become Mates Theatre Genesis after a merger with a group based in the Redland Museum).

Jean Spencer (pictured above left), now a regular actor with Theatre Redlands, joined the Mount Cotton Group with her late husband Ben in 2005.

"We'd both been involved with theatre so when we moved up from Sydney it didn't take long to get involved with the Mt Cotton group," she says. "Ben was an electrical engineer, so as well as his acting talents, he was in demand for his technical skills. It was a great group with a wonderful atmosphere."

Jean's first role was in a short play in The Quickies short-play series.

"I played a dying woman who escaped from hospital to see the New Year's Eve fireworks. My character dies on stage at the end – but the show was quite amusing in parts!"

She and Ben went on to act, direct and work as backstage crew and Jean continues as one of Theatre Redland's most popular and well-known members, along with other former Mt Cotton members Barbara Collyer and Kathy Manning.

The 50th Anniversary Exhibition will include videos, programs, posters, old stage sets, props, costumes and some original plays written for the group. It will run at the Redland Museum throughout May.

## JONATHAN BIGGINS BRINGS THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO PAUL TO RPAC

One of Australia's most accomplished satirists is coming to Brisbane with one of his favourite politicians. Jonathan Biggins, co-creator with Drew Forsythe and Phillip Scott of *The Wharf Review*, is presenting a one-night stand at RPAC of *The Gospel According to Paul*, a portrayal of one of Australia's most compelling Prime Ministers.

"Revere him or loathe him, Paul Keating's opinions are still sought, even 27 years after his leaving office — he can't be dismissed, and even those people who loathe him respect him," says Jonathan. Keating's ongoing appeal is evident in the fact that the show, launched in 2019, is still pulling in enthusiastic audiences.

Jonathan, who has satirised more than a fair share of leading public figures, credits Gerry Connolly with igniting his initial interest in playing Keating and finds him a fascinating character.

"He's a self-taught polymath, grew up in Bankstown and left school at 14, so it's quite extraordinary that he got to where he did. It's that historical narrative that gets the momentum going, that drives the show and the character.

"He could be very crushing on a personal level, but it was always really about the policy and the job at hand. He realised that in public life you don't get much time to make a difference; there's just one shot at the big picture so he was fortunate to have been in one of the most talented ministries that this country's ever seen."

For all his serious politics, Jonathan says that Keating is a natural character to write for because he is incredibly entertaining.

"It's 'throw the switch to vaudeville'! The putdowns are a fun thing and he relished the whole theatricality of question time. He used to manage a rock band and would often get up and sing with them.

"With Keating, his voice is characteristic — though not his pace, or the show would take five hours — his speech patterns, repeating certain phrases. A real challenge was avoiding hagiography, but it's difficult to criticise someone who's not given to self-criticism. And he could behave like the most intelligent person in the room — but basically he was kind of right and that gets very hard to argue with."

Jonathan says that writing satire is similar to political cartooning.

"Drew describes our work as creating three-dimensional political cartoons that move – and that's the secret for impersonating these people," Jonathan says. "It's finding the hooks and characteristics

that people will immediately recognise. Review is an abbreviated way of performing; you have so little time that you have to establish the character within a few minutes of getting on stage."

Precise, economic writing is particularly important, and Jonathan says that an editor's pen is a review satirist's best friend ("keep it brief and keep it tight") and relates a story of the late, great John Clarke's advice to a tyro satirist who resisted having his work edited; "There are two types of writers who don't want their work cut; amateurs and geniuses. Which are you?"

On a sad note for aficionados of political theatre, the 2025 *Wharf Review* will be the last.

"Like politics, it's knowing when to leave, and we think it's time to get out before we start repeating ourselves. We're trying to say it as often as possible so that we'll stick to it, just in case we're tempted to keep going. And it'll be nice to do something else, have fun writing something that isn't just politics."

Whatever the team turns their hand to there will be a breathless Australia-wide theatre audience waiting for the results.

## MOTHER AND SON...AND THE REST OF THE FAMILY!

"I've always been a fan of the TV series, and as soon as I read the script, I knew I just had to do the play. It just grabbed me."

Tackling the stage play of Mother and Son was an immediate decision for Theatre Redlands director Raymond Noonan, despite knowing that there would be audience temptations to compare a stage production with the well-loved TV series based on a dutiful, long-suffering son who lives with his increasingly forgetful mother.

"It's inevitable that some people will think back to the original productions, but my vision has always been to create our own characters. That's how I've guided the cast, and it's working beautifully; they're zinging along, bouncing off each other and creating something refreshingly new. If we, as a collective, have done our job properly the audience will roll along with us."

The play will be presented as Theatre Redland's Queensland Day offering, and Raymond sees it as a perfect fit.

"It's an iconic Australian creation; the characters are earthy and real – they could be the folk next door. It's a fun script, and while much of the comedy hangs on Maggie's confused concepts, it's not cruel; we're never laughing at her, we're laughing at the situations that all of us get into at times. It's classic sit-com material."

Casting the show was demanding; Ray says that Libby Harrison, who

plays Maggie, is in such high demand that it was necessary to engage her twelve months in advance. The next challenge was to find an actor of equal strength to play opposite her in the role of Arthur — and an appropriate actor to play Arthur's brother Robert.

"It was a bit of a juggle," Raymond says, "but it's come together beautifully. I'd originally expected Maggie to be the star, but as rehearsals progressed, it became clear that she and Arthur rate equal billing.

"I was also fortunate in casting Arthur's brother — the two actors have worked in shows together, and the naturalness of their relationship makes my job as a director so much easier — except for occasional confusion at rehearsals; ironically, they're both called Trevor."

The stage play, written by the author of the TV series, Geoffrey Atherden, is classic Mother and Son fare. Arthur has fallen in love and is off for three weeks of stolen bliss with Anita, having shamed his opportunistic brother and super-snob sister-in-law into looking after Maggie while he's away. What could go wrong? What, indeed...



## Redlands Coast Property Market Update

Elsie Baining, President of the ENBCQ, and her members cooked a traditional meal and entertained everyone with dancing and singing. Within the next month, they and other volunteers at RARE (Rotary Australia Repurposing Equipment) at Alexandra Hills will pack a container with equipment to be shipped to Kokopo.

The Rotary Club of Cleveland and ENBCQ thank the Redlands United Football Club for hosting this event for the second year. We also had the opportunity to interview Lee Faunt, a member of the PNG national team currently playing with the RUFC. Ishbel Taylor said it was a great night and looks forward to a bigger and better night in 2025.

## WALKING FOOTBALL: LOW-IMPACT EXERCISE WITH HIGH-LEVEL SOCIALISING!

FROM REDLANDS UNITED FOOTBALL CLUB

Every Wednesday evening at 7:00pm, a group of mums, dads, and grandparents gather at Redlands United Football Club fields in Cleveland for a kick of the round ball.

Spectators will easily identify what they see as a version of football or soccer played on a small field. But there is no running or tackling allowed, and the ball cannot go over head high. It's called "walking football", and it's one of the fastest-growing team sports in the world (for older folk).

Although the term evokes images such as sedentary, slow-moving, old and inactive, the reality is quite different. Sweating, puffing and heavy breathing are the norm.

Walking football was introduced some years ago in the UK to coax older adults who may have mobility issues or health concerns to have a kick. It allows individuals to enjoy the game, stay active, and socialise in a more suitable, low-impact environment. The standard football/soccer rules have been modified to ensure a high level of safety, which helps reduce the risk of injuries and ensures that people of varying fitness levels can participate. Gauging from the giggles and laughter coming from participants at Redland, they all obviously find the game very enjoyable.

"I'm hooked," says Robyn Hodges. Robyn has been playing walking football here in Cleveland for a few months and will gladly tell you its advantages.

"I love the game. It's made me get off the couch and start moving. You don't even know you are exercising. The last time I played football, I had a few niggling injuries and felt it was time to stop playing. Then, late last year, I heard about walking football, so I came along to have a peek. It didn't take much to coax me in for a kick, and the rest is history. I reckon many people like myself would quickly get to love the game like I did. I now really look forward to Wednesday nights — the football, the exercise and the lovely people you meet."

Almost 12 months ago, an offer to provide a venue for walking football for the 50+ age group (mainly parents) came from Carina Crockford, general manager of Redlands United Football Club. Seasoned walking footballers Robbie Duncanson and Siggy Nowak decided to start up a walking football session in Cleveland. Football Queensland came to the party through Alan Templeton, Walking Football Development Officer, who provided balls, field markers, bibs, and pop-up goals. Invitations and flyers were sent around the town, and gradually, more and more participants turned up. Walking football is now a regular feature on a Wednesday night.

Siggy, captain of Australia's Walking Football Over 70s representative team, is passionate about the game. "Our participants here in Cleveland come from all walks of life. Some have not played football since their youth, while others have transitioned to the game after finishing with veterans football or futsal," says Siggy.

"We have a number of ladies playing at our sessions, and they are certainly mixing it with the gents and having fun. The ages range from 50 to 75, and the skill levels vary, but we are able to cater to anyone. The game promotes physical activity, mental wellbeing, and community inclusion for older individuals."

"The whole idea behind the sport is to provide an avenue for exercise using a ball. The rules are quite simple, and they provide a high level of safety because we have participants with health issues, physical disabilities and different skill levels."

Siggy uses a simple description: "Walking football is a non-contact sport where the ball does all the running."

The walking football session in Cleveland is replicated in many venues around Brisbane, Queensland and

Australia. There are even competitive regional and state tournaments held around Australia and international competitions in Europe and Asia.

Carina is very upbeat about the game. "Football never stops in Redlands. Juniors, seniors, over 45s, veterans, futsal, and now walking football. We cater to every age group."

"Any member of the community can come along and have a kick on the Wednesday night. It's free, it's enjoyable and you will definitely meet lots of like-minded people. We welcome you all."

If you want to have a go, just turn up on a Wednesday evening at 7:00pm. Look out for a happy group having a leisurely kick around

on a small field marked out at the Redland United Football Club grounds at 76 Waterloo Street Cleveland.

## WOMEN'S MOUNTAIN BIKE COURSE PROMOTES SPORT IN NATURE

RATS Cycling Club's women's subcommittee is again offering a mountain biking ladies' beginners' course to promote the joy of riding bikes in nature, exploring bushland, and improving health.

Partly subsidised by profit from the club's annual Chicks in the Sticks race, the course – on May 19 and 26 – is delivered by professional coaches in a supportive and encouraging environment.

The two by two-hour sessions, at Underwood Park, Priestdale, are held on a grass oval and the beginner riding trails at Daisy Hill Conservation Park, where riders are guided through the basics, from proper technique to navigating more challenging terrain.

"These popular courses flow into our RATS Chicks Ride program, which offers weekly social rides for women and a monthly beginner social ride," coordinator Christine McKay says.

"After five years of running the program, we know the system works in encouraging more women on more bikes, more often. This fits well as the participants begin joining into the club's areas of Racing, Advocacy, Trailcare, Social – the RATS in our name."

Hazel has difficulty in group sessions and gets quite anxious and requires time and patience to separate from her Mum and engage in our Kindergym activities. Miss Lou, the Kindergym leader, and Miss Laura, assistant coach, have been amazing with her. Hazel will now hold Lou and Laura's hands and say goodbye to Mum at the gate, participating in the class independently.

The commitment and patience that our Kindergym coaches have demonstrated with Hazel is really what we celebrate – their

dedication to making our Kindergym program all-inclusive is remarkable.

Children living with ASD have fixations and hyperfocus, and Hazel's (would you believe) are unicorns and horses, and Hazel wants to be a farmer when she grows up.

Upon the arrival of the ponies, Hazel was excited and keen to pat and engage with them. She climbed up and enjoyed her pony rides. The most amazing shift came over Hazel — she was calm, independent and happy to be guided around by the pony handler, without even a thought of Mum needing to be close by.

The pony visit continues to have a remarkable effect on Hazel's progress at her Kindergym class, with her return to her Gym Kids class on Tuesday morning. For the first time, Mum watched with pride as Hazel ran to another little girl, Georgia, in her class and said, "I saw the ponies. Did you see the ponies?". It is difficult to

explain how important this interaction with her new little friend is and how much this meant to our Kindergym coaches and Hazel's Mum; one of the most difficult things Hazel struggles with is engaging and socialising with children without adult assistance.

We often have meetings with our Y leaders to discuss and evaluate the importance of what we do every day, and I believe it is moments like this that we need to celebrate. The most important part of our Victoria Point team meetings is reminding each other to "be stubborn about your goals and be flexible about your methods," and this is definitely what our coaches have done. I could not be more proud of both ladies.

The Y at Victoria Point will continue to think outside the box with holiday activities, the goal being to create memories and experiences for all of our students.

## RECONCILIATION WEEK 2024 — NOW, MORE THAN EVER

National Reconciliation Week, which started as the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation in 1993 (the International Year of the World's Indigenous Peoples) was launched in 1996. In 2001, Reconciliation Australia was established to continue to provide national leadership on Reconciliation and approximately 300,000 people walked across Sydney Harbour Bridge to show their support.

The dates – 27 May to 3 June – remain the same every year, commemorating two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey; the 1967 referendum, in which Australians voted to remove references in the Australian Constitution that discriminated against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and the High Court

Mabo decision, which established the principle of native title rights in Australian common law.

Now, More than Ever is the theme for National Reconciliation Week 2024; the chevron artwork, by Gubbi Gubbi artist Maggie Douglas, is a universal symbol for pointing the way. Today, National Reconciliation Week is celebrated in workplaces, schools and early learning services, community organisations and groups, and by individuals Australia-wide.

A Reconciliation Australia spokesperson says that we all have a role to play when it comes to reconciliation by being engaged, calling out racism and staying hopeful.

"We all know racism is never okay. It diminishes those who practice it and disempowers, undermines and damages those who are subjected to it. Racism is ultimately about power.

"We need to listen well; listening works. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices are crucial for the wellbeing of their communities."

Capalaba Football Club president Shaun McAney said it was an example of the club's community focus.

"Our Under 10s manager is a firey, so we heard through him that they were looking for a venue, and we were happy to help," he said.

"In return they've offered to bring some trucks down for our Pink Day charity fundraiser later this year; the kids will love it."



### **LOCAL FISHING WITH SPERO:**

## MACKEREL SEASON IS HERE AND THE PRAWNS HAVE ARRIVED

Finally, cooler weather is here, and I'm hoping like crazy that the rain is gone as well! I could not handle a wet autumn/winter this year after all the rain, but it made it one of the best ever mud crab and sand crab seasons, and the prawns finally started to appear in big numbers at the end of last month. My prawn friends tell me this month will be good for prawns.

The school mackerel season is really fired up, and everyone targeting them is catching some. I've heard some reports that even fishermen who usually catch plenty of whiting and don't normally fish for mackerel in Fisherman's Gutter are getting plenty of school mackerel on floating pillies behind the boat. So, floating pillies anywhere through the Small Boat Channel all the way to opposite Fisherman's Gutter will most likely get you a few mackerel.

The deeper waters off Green Island and King Island, and around the Hope Banks and towards the Naval reserves, have an abundance of school mackerel, Bonito and long-tail tuna. Wherever

you see the tuna species smashing bait this time of the year, you will find schoolies under them. From



my experience, there were so many early last week fishermen were catching and releasing, so as mentioned, the season will get better as the cooler weeks approach. It's interesting to note we are still picking up the odd big spotty mackerel, but after a cold snap, they will be hard to find until next year. Again, 2024 was not as good for spotties as last year.

The whiting are in good numbers further up in the Rous Channel, Fisherman's Gutter, and opposite Hope Banks. The deeper water around Amity Banks will also have plenty, and the Maroon Gutter and sandhills at Moreton Island are always good for whiting this time of year.

Squid fishing is fantastic now, with plenty of tiger squid on the weed banks all the way through to the Rous, Amity Banks, and Green Island. The



cuttlefish and arrow squid will start showing up in the deeper water all around Green Island and Victoria Point, just off the bottom in 26 to 28 feet of water.

Try reef fishing along the island drop offs, and the artificial reefs have plenty of fish to keep everyone happy.

## NON-PROFIT ORGANISATION PROFILE: GREYS 2ND CHANCE

Greys 2nd Chance is a greyhound rescue group with a difference. Like other rescue groups, G2C rescues and rehomes greyhounds in need of loving, forever homes. However, this not-for-profit organisation also focuses on education, outreach, and advocacy for a breed of dog that often suffers from a lack of genuine welfare in a poorly regulated industry.

Greys 2nd Chance runs a free program called 'Chat and Pat', in which members of the group and their 'ambassador greyhounds' visit workplaces, schools and other communities to raise awareness of the plight of these beautiful and largely misunderstood dogs.

"People meeting a greyhound for the first time are often surprised at just how sweet and friendly they really are," says G2C Chat and Pat volunteer Evie Tavio.

"In the public's perception, greyhounds are bred to be racers. Because they are muzzled at the track and trained to chase, people often assume the breed is aggressive, but nothing could be further from the truth. In reality, they are gentle and affectionate dogs who just want a comfy couch and to be loved as part of a family."

As many as 18,000 greyhounds are injured annually on Australian racetracks, while still more are discarded once their racing days end. Rescue groups have difficulty keeping pace with the rate dogs need rehoming.

"The gorgeous dogs are definitely the stars of the show," says Evie. "And if we can change just one mind and win just one heart, then our Chat and Pat visit was definitely worthwhile."



## LOADED GOURMET HOT DOGS RECIPE

One of our favourite May events is Pups in the Park, so in honour of that, we're giving you some inspiration to create your hot dog this month. You probably don't need a recipe for this, but use it as inspiration to create your perfect hot dog! It's easy and fun, and you can add any of your favourite toppings and be as creative as you like.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- A hot dog bun for each person (or two)
- A dash of olive oil
- Butter
- · A beef or pork hot dog for each person
- Shredded cheddar cheese the more the merrier!
- Onion cut into fine rings fresh or fried
- Chopped tomatoes
- Jalapeños
- Chopped and cooked crispy bacon
- Lettuce
- Tomato sauce, mustard, and any other tangy dressings you like
- Optional extras: sauerkraut, relish, pickles, avocado, finely sliced spring onion, parsley.

#### **METHOD**

- First, cook your hot dogs. Preheat a frypan with the olive oil
  to medium-high heat. Fry the hot dogs until they are nicely
  browned and cooked through (about five to seven minutes),
  turning occasionally. You can also gently boil your hot dogs
  on the stovetop to cook through if you prefer.
- While the hot dogs are cooking, prepare your toppings.
   Letting everyone add their toppings is fun, so assemble each ingredient in small bowls.
- 3. Butter your bun. Place each hot dog in a bun, and while it's hot, add a generous amount of shredded cheese on top of each hot dog. Then, layer the onions, lettuce, tomatoes, jalapeños and crispy bacon. Finish with a drizzle of tomato sauce, mustard, and any of your must-have condiments.





## Tax – forward planning reaps rewards

Tax planning is often viewed in a contradictory way – a last minute dash to arrange a reduction of the year's tax bill or maximise the refund.

Two of the simpler ways of managing tax include:

- Deferring income until the following tax year

   such as arranging a fixed deposit or other investment so that the income from the investment is paid after the end of this tax period; or
- 2. Bringing forward expenses that won't accrue until the next tax year by paying them this tax year, such as interest on an investment loan.

Alternatives for reducing tax are available and may result in an overall better return in the long term. Different options are available depending upon your employment status, i.e. if you are self-employed as opposed to being an employee.

Broadly speaking, some of the options include converting part of your income into

superannuation contributions (salary sacrificing or making personal deductible contributions). This has the added advantage of building a valuable asset and an income for your retirement. In addition, don't forget the tax incentive for making a contribution toward a superannuation fund in your spouse's name.

If you are a small business owner, you could consider bringing forward the purchase of business assets. Whilst the instant asset write-off eligibility criteria and threshold have changed over time, there are currently three temporary tax depreciation incentives available to eligible businesses; temporary full expensing, increased instant asset write-off, and backing business investment.

The strategy you choose will depend upon your personal situation and needs, but one thing that's common to everyone is the longer you leave these plans, the less benefit you receive.


