HOLDEN A PLACE IN YOUR HEART: FX-FJ NATIONALS COME TO CLEVELAND

The Holden is the car that was part of Australia, that featured in films and TV sitcoms and countless posters in suburban men's dens; its demise as an Australian product was greeted with anger and sorrow, not just for the lost jobs but for the loss of something we'd come to regard as irreplaceably ours. The tenderness still lingers, especially for the iconic FJ and FX models, the snub-nosed, chrome-enhanced, instantly recognisable beauties of the years from 1948 to 1956.

The tenderness has spawned an almost cult-like following, and aficionados will have a chance to feast their eyes – and their memories – on a national gathering of the clan at the 26th biennial FX-FJ Nationals, to be held at the Cleveland Showgrounds from December 28 to 31. The display is supported by the not-for-profit Australian Early Holden Federation Inc. and hosted by the FX-FJ Holden Club of Queensland Inc. and the national secretary, Shane Krueger, is expecting a great turnout.

"It's going to be a great weekend," he says. "We're expecting more than a hundred FJs and FXs and in addition, we've invited more than 50 other car clubs in Southeast Queensland to display their classic, vintage and muscle cars on the adjoining field. The Show & Shine on Sunday December 29 will provide some breathtaking moments for those who love classic cars."

For those who do, \$10 will give entry to the whole day, from 9:30am to 3:30pm. Special attractions will be Lloyd's auction of a no-reserve price Holden and a chance to admire the FX Holden that belonged to Rock 'n Roll George, a well-loved Brisbane character until his death in 2009. Don't forget your cameras!

The 26th biennial FX-FJ Nationals will be held at the Cleveland Showgrounds from December 28 to 31, 2024.



While on the island, they experienced sandboarding, kayaking, Traditional Owners cultural tours, four-wheel driving, sailing and surfing.


It will be great exposure for Minjerribah with *Adventure All Stars* screening in 195 countries to an audience approaching 200 million people.


SUN SAFETY IN PETS

Living in Queensland, we all grow up knowing the risks of sun exposure – sunburn and the development of skin cancers are very common. Did you know that our pets are also at risk of damage from the sun? Animals may develop a skin condition called actinic (solar) dermatitis or skin cancers.

ANIMALS AT RISK

A good fur coat usually provides good protection from the sun. Dogs and cats with a lighter-coloured coat and short fur are more at risk from sun exposure. Bull terriers, Staffordshire bull terriers, Dalmatians and Greyhounds and white



WHAT DOES SUN DAMAGE LOOK LIKE?

Actinic dermatitis starts on white fur, which may become patchy, and the underlying skin becomes red and irritated. A secondary bacterial infection may occur, which results in a pimply, red rash.

Haemangiomas and haemangiosarcomas are blood vessel tumours that can develop on the less furred areas – the belly and inside of the back legs are common sites.

The ear tips and noses of white cats are common sites for the development of squamous cell carcinomas – an aggressive skin cancer. Lesions may initially appear as a non-healing scab but can progress to become very destructive, resulting in loss of underlying tissue.

TREATMENT

Skin cancer requires surgical treatment – it can be difficult as there are often multiple tumours spread across a large area. Cats with squamous cell carcinoma may be treated with a combination of surgery, radiation and chemotherapy.





Antibiotics and topical steroids may be used to control infection and inflammation associated with actinic dermatitis.

PREVENTION

The key to prevention is reducing sun exposure. If possible, pets should be kept inside through the hottest part of the day when UV rays are at their most dangerous. There are specific pet sunscreens available which may be applied to the less furred areas of the body. Sunsuits are like wet suits and are designed to protect the whole body. These products may all be sourced online.

BIG AND BRASSY CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION COMES TO RPAC

In classic Christmas iconography, angels are playing trumpets, so a big, brassy Christmas celebration seems quite in order for RPAC - courtesy of the Excelsior Brass Band.

Australia's reigning National Champions and winners of 10 Australian and three New Zealand National Championships. Excelsior offers a smoroasbord of vuletide classics that range from Silent Night. Jingle Bells, and Sleigh Ride to the Nutcracker Suite á la Duke Ellington.

Ross Moloney, president of the band and baritone horn player, says that flexibility is part of the magic of a brass band.

"A brass band's unique ability is being able to turn on any genre of music - orchestral, jazz, pop, choral music – its instruments offer so many tones and colours and pitches, from bass to soprano."

The band, based on the traditional British brass band, includes trombones (essential for a brass band), cornets (smaller, darker and mellower than trumpets), flugelhorn, tenor and baritone horns, euphoniums and tubas (basses, which provide the foundation of the sound).

Ross says that the opportunity for such variety has resulted in brass band music that is frequently

technically challenging, and the musicians can become 'chopped', which is essentially suffering embouchure fatigue. The embouchure is the way that the mouth must be applied to the instrument's mouthpiece, and it can become demanding when competitive events are at their peak, and extra rehearsals keep the musicians 'match fit'.

Special guest conductor for the RPAC concert is world-acclaimed David Bremner, Principal Trombone of the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, who led the band to success as conductor at the Nationals in Adelaide earlier this year.

Audiences will have a chance to enjoy the exquisite sound and join in sing-alongs at Excelsior Brass Band's big brassy Christmas at RPAC. To book or for more information, call 3829 8131 or visit rpac.com.au.

WHY IS SKIN SO IMPORTANT?

Skin care is at the epicentre of beauty all over the world. But why? Skin is the first thing we all see, making each of us so special and unique.

Many myths about skin have evolved in our culture, including:

- The sun is bad for your skin;
- All skin cancers are due to UV and sun exposure;
- Skin cancers only occur when you are old.

Yes, we need to care about our skin as much as we do our diet. Without our skin, we would not survive.

The skin has several major functions:

- It 'wraps us in' to prevent water loss; after all, we are 85 per cent water!
- It is the major controller to keep our body temperature between 36.5 to 37 degrees Celsius.
- It is the major source of Vitamin D with sun exposure.

- It is covered with friendly symbiotic bacteria to protect us from disease – no need for antiseptics/sanitisers, which would kill the good bugs and leave us vulnerable to attack.
- It produces natural moisturisers to keep itself healthy.
- When skin is penetrated (as occurs with a wound), it rapidly heals itself to become impervious to external bugs within two to four hours

So, let's look after our skin. It's simple; here are a few tips:

- Only wash with soap and water occasionally, not antiseptics or sanitisers
- Get regular intermittent, short doses of sunshine.
- If injured, only use a dressing that breathes for the first day.
 Occlusive dressings trap sweating and encourage infection.

LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT

ONE DAY ONLY!

The daylily season has well and truly commenced and is set to continue all summer long! A fabulous, hardy ornamental plant, daylilies are actually edible* (though apparently not by cats) and not related to lilies at all. They are, however, in the same subfamily as Dianella (fun fact) and in the same family as grass trees (*Xanthorrhoea*)! Who knew?

Daylilies (*Hemerocallis sp.*) originated in Asia, where they have been cultivated for thousands of years for ornamental and medicinal purposes and since being introduced to Europe and eventually America, they have been hybridized to produce the thousands (and thousands) of different colours, shapes and styles we have today – from the simple orange and lemon through to darkest of maroons, multicoloured and ruffled petals.

The genus name *Hemerocallis* is derived from the Greek words 'Hemera' for day and 'Kallos' for beauty – typically because each (beautiful) bloom only lasts a day – but each stem has multiple flowers to keep the beauty coming.

When they aren't flowering, daylilies are a somewhat unassuming grassy plant that can take the place of many a strappy-leaved plant in your garden design. They are unfussy in their growing conditions and fairly resistant to pests and diseases, although I do fight rust on them in one garden I manage. Depending on the severity, I either remove the affected leaves or chop the whole plant back. You can also spray with a fungicide if you so desire. As always, prevention is better than cure, so make sure they are healthy, and as with growing many plants in our humid summers — keep good airflow! My husband complains that once summer hits, I never turn off our ceiling fans because I like to keep the air moving. Maybe I should get one installed in the garden for the sticky mornings before the sea breeze kicks in!

*Once again, I have not eaten them and probably don't intend to, but I'll keep it in mind for the next pandemic, or should I be in one of those fanciful situations where I am stuck on an island and only allowed to bring one plant...

That letter from earlier days simply expresses what it says, a friendship that stands always.


Was there ever a chance for more?

Christine Earthrawl, Secretary of the Old Schoolhouse Gallery, is a watercolourist and teacher – and until the 22nd of December, one of the participants in the

gallery's pop-up Christmas shop.

"Some members have created their own little popup areas with an extended range of gifts to help with gift shopping," she says. "It's not always easy to find individual hand-crafted gifts at an affordable price, so our artists have brought new ideas to the table. As well as the usual art – which is still on display – visitors can buy hand-made serviettes, table runners, placemats, mugs printed with their artworks, lavender bags, umbrellas, prints, Christmas decorations and cards that are lovely enough to be a gift in themselves."

As well as gently satisfying the retail therapy urge, visitors can chat to the artists, enjoy the ambience, and perhaps sign on for an upcoming workshop or class.

Food is one of my favourite things, especially on December 25. But all the hard work and hours of prepping, cooking and preening to make everything special can be daunting. In a way, it reminds me of the tenacity and hard legwork of our very own native mound-building brush turkey. What the male of this species does to prepare the humungous nest for eggs is extraordinary! He'll adjust the amount of leaf litter to set the incubation temperature

between 33 and 38 degrees Celsius. To test that it's just right, he pops his trusty bill into the mound, like an inbuilt thermometer. After 49 days, when the chicks hatch and emerge, they are totally wild and independent, ready to face the big wide world!

As we round out 2024 it's also a good time to reflect on our own achievements, gained through tenacity and hard work.

I'm lucky to be part of Redland City Council's Environment and Education team based at IndigiScapes. Once again, it's been a busy year of nature-based activity. Collectively, we've achieved a lot with native plant propagation and plantings, environment workshops, support and advice for private landowners to enhance native habitat, wildlife protection and research, school programs that engaged more than 3,000 students, koala survey walks and talks, special events, school

holiday fun and eco markets. The Indigi café team served thousands of plates of food created with love and a bush-flavoured twist, including around 2,000 slices of signature Indigi cake!

Thanks to a dedicated bunch of volunteers, the Redlands 24-hour Wildlife Rescue Service responded to almost 10,000 calls for help. Many more volunteer hours were spent at community bushcare events and IndigiScapes native plant nursery.

I'm grateful to work with like-minded people who strive to make a difference every day, encouraging others to tread more lightly on the planet. The recycling station at IndigiScapes received items totalling 1,500 kilograms, everything from old thongs to blister packs, proving small actions by individuals can add up to big results.

TWO FOR ONE: PERFORMANCE DOUBLE-HEADER FOR AUSTRALIA DAY

Theatre has been a feature of Australia Day at Redland Museum since 2008 when Theatre Genesis staged the popular classic Dick Diamond's Reedy River. If only you knew what goes on behind the scenes in real estate, you would be a lot safer, have a lot less stress, and have a lot more money in your pocket.

What agents say about sellers.

Preparing for storm season: essential tips for landlords and tenants

4. Know the Evacuation Plan

 Familiarise yourself with local emergency evacuation zones and routes. Have a plan for pets if evacuation becomes necessary.

5. Unplug Electronics

 To avoid damage from power surges, unplug appliances and electronic devices during a storm.

Make recycling part of your Christmas tradition

Redlands Coast residents are encouraged to ensure they make the nice list this year when it comes to recycling and reducing waste during the festive season.

The December to January period is traditionally the peak time for household waste generation, particularly with packaging materials and food scraps.

More than 4551 tonnes of household waste went to landfill from kerbside waste bins and Council's recycling and waste centres in December 2023, and a further 5353 tonnes of household waste went into landfill in January this year. That means each person on Redlands Coast generated an average of 31 kg waste to landfill each month over this period.

This is 15 per cent more than the average monthly amount over the rest of the year.

Recent audits show that more than half of what

ends up in landfill from household red-lid waste bins can be recycled or composted, so Council also encourages residents to ensure they place their waste in the correct kerbside bins.

Recycling can start before Christmas by choosing items that have less packaging, meal planning, using alternatives to single-use wrapping paper and not over-buying. Households can also reduce garden organics going to landfill by getting a green waste bin and composting food waste at home.

There are a number of resources available to help residents manage waste and recycling, so it becomes just another tradition to follow each Christmas

Visit Council's online 'A-Z guide of waste and recycling' on Council's website or download the Recycle Mate app (from the Apple App or Google Play store) for a handy pocket guide on how to recycle right.

Twelve tips for festive season recycling:

- Stock up on rechargeable batteries and remember – batteries don't belong in any bin; they only belong in a B-cycle battery recycling bin
- Compost food scraps from Christmas lunch Council offers a subsidy for a wide variety of compost bins.
- Wrapping paper (excluding tissue paper and cellophane) can go in the yellow recycling bin, or keep it and reuse next year or for craft activities.
- Use Santa sacks or practise the art of furoshiki to reduce the amount of wrapping paper.
- Cardboard boxes and hard plastic packaging go in the recycling bin.
- Put Christmas cards in the recycling bin or cut up to make gift cards for next year.



- Tinsel, twine, ribbon and string can't be recycled and need to go in your red-lid bin or reuse for future gifts.
- Polystyrene can't be recycled in your yellow lid recycling bin and needs to go in your red-lid bin.
- Cellophane and other soft plastics like bubble wrap cannot be recycled.
- Scrunch up aluminium foil covering leftovers to the size of your fist and put in your recycling bin.
- Empty bottles and cans go in the recycling bin, or take them to a Containers for Change refund point.
- Consider buying a real tree this year instead of a plastic one.

PRAWN, MANGO AND AVOCADO CREAM BRUSCHETTA RECIPE

Christmas brunch can be simple, yet fancy - just add the freshest Queensland prawns, juicy mango and ripe avocado!

INGREDIENTS

- 15-20 Queensland prawns, peeled and deveined (allow two to three per serve, depending on the size of your bread)
- · 2 ripe avocados
- · 1 small mango, diced
- 1 handful of cherry tomatoes, chopped or halved
- · 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice
- · Salt and pepper, to taste

- Sliced baguette rounds or sliced sourdough loaf (for larger serves, use sliced sourdough, for smaller serves, use baguette rounds)
- Cream cheese (for spreading on bread)
- Olive oil for toasting the bread
- A handful of mixed micro herbs for garnish or whatever in-season herbs you have on hand, e.g. chives, watercress, chopped basil.




METHOD

- 1. In a bowl, mash the avocado flesh with a fork until it's smooth. Add a squeeze of lime juice, and a pinch of salt and pepper to taste. Mix until it's creamy.
- 2. Lightly brush the baguette slices with olive oil and toast them in a frying pan over medium heat until they're golden. Remove from heat. Spread with cream cheese.
- Spread the avocado cream on each piece of toast, then top with a fresh prawn/s, diced mango and a few cherry tomato pieces. Garnish with herbs and add an extra squeeze of lime juice if you'd like more 'zing'.





THE INTERTWINED WORLD OF STRESS AND SLEEP

Our sleep health can be greatly affected by the stress our body and mind can be under. Likewise, when we don't get adequate or quality sleep, it can add excess stress to our nervous system. It's an intertwined world that we can rebalance and nurture with lifestyle tweaks, calming herbs and nutrition.

If you have difficulty falling asleep, staying asleep or wake up feeling unrested and exhausted, there's a high chance your body and mind could be functioning in a stressed state. DID YOU KNOW THERE ARE NEW LIFEJACKET REGULATIONS FOR QUEENSLAND?

FROM REBECCA MITCHELL, VMR RABY BAY

On 1 December 2024 new lifejacket laws came into effect*. Lifejackets must be worn when:

- Boating alone or only with children under 12 years on an open boat less than 4.8 metres in length whilst underway.
- People boating between sunset and sunrise on an open boat less than 4.8 metres in length whilst underway.
- People crossing a designated coastal bar on an open boat and on an open area (the deck) of a ship of any length.
- Children one year or more and under 12 years on an open boat or an open area (the deck) of a ship of any length whilst underway.

The current standard for lifejackets is AS4758. Lifejackets/PFDs manufactured to AS1512, AS1499 and AS2260 are now outdated. The cut-off date for replacement is 1 September 2025. For more information go to https://www.msg.gld.gov.au/safety/life-jackets

Do you know the VHF channels commonly used in Moreton Bay? The most commonly used are listed below.



LOCAL FISHING WITH SPERO

DROP A LINE — HERE'S WHERE YOU'LL FIND THE BEST FISH THIS CHRISTMAS

Christmas is getting very close, and the festive season is approaching, which means school holidays and family days out on the bay, so please keep an eye on the weather warnings and predictions. It's safer to say, "We are not going out on the bay today" than having an accident on the water in bad weather. BOM forecasts are fantastic most of the time for the bay, and they are the ones that I follow.

Fishing is pretty good this time of year, even with all the extra traffic on the water. There should be whiting and squid over the banks in the bay, and hopefully, the spotty mackerel will make an appearance. My favourite thing this time of year is fishing for Moreton Bay squire/snapper, and you don't have to go far to catch really nice fish (one of the best-tasting fish in the ocean). They don't have to be giants; to me, a 35cm to 40cm squire is as good as it gets! Yes, catching the 65cm and 80cm fish is fun, but I prefer the 40 to 60cm squire for a good table-eating fish.

The fun is also catching these fish on fairly light lines, and as for baits, I have never mastered the plastics for squire. I use a 5.0 to 6.0 red snapper hook on a running rig with a ball sinker (just to get to the bottom), which for me is heaven, and my preferred bait is whole small whiting, garfish, and any small fish and whiting heads. Grinner, mullet and bonito fillets are always worth a try, too — I suggest you burley while fishing for squire, it always helps.

I have always used Alvey reels in the past, but my fingers and thumb always got a pounding, so these days I find bait runner reels fantastic. Penn, Shimano and Daiwa are my favourites; the best size for the bay is the 4000 to 5000 range, with 15lb to 20lb lines, and I prefer any green colour for bay fishing. Tortue and Penn are my favourites. As for mono lines, I don't like the new rope lines at all – there's no stretch.

The areas I tend to fish close to home are near Green Island on the eastern side in around 18 to

20-ft depth, St Helena on the eastern side (just out from the dredging zones of the past and Mud Island outside the sunken reef), and Peel



Island of course — especially when the weather forecasters can't make up their minds. So then you can fish the Lazaret Gutter side, the hole in the wall on the eastern corner at south-west rocks, or the western side on the sunken rock wall — and you can easily get out of any kind of wind. You just need a run in the tide, and I prefer the run out, but I have also caught plenty of fish with the incoming tide. The incoming tide tends to make the water a little clearer, which saves you catching catfish and sharks when the water is on the dirty side, and there are plenty of sharks in the bay this time of year.

I hope you all get a fresh fish for dinner over the holidays! Enjoy the holidays, keep safe, and thank you for all the feedback throughout the year. Merry Christmas to you all, and a safe New Year.

NEW WEINAM CREEK BOAT RAMP OPENS TO COMMUNITY

Access to the bay at Weinam Creek has been improved with the opening of a new recreational boat ramp boasting three lanes and a floating pontoon.

Mayor Jos Mitchell said the new ramp, connected to the Moores Road car park, was another welcome piece to the Weinam Creek project.

"The ramp was delivered by Redland Investment Corporation (RIC) and Redland City Council as part of the phased redevelopment of the Weinam Creek Priority Development Area (PDA)," the Mayor said.

"One of the groups that will benefit from the new ramp is the Redlands Sea Dragons, who moved into a new clubhouse on Moores Road last year and will use the ramp for their activities.

"The repositioning of the boat ramp to the southern end of Weinam Creek, away from the ferry terminal, is designed to alleviate parking pressures and assist with the flow of traffic.

"There will also be lifestyle benefits for locals and visitors to Redlands Coast, with the new ramp making it easier to access the islands and experience the city's expansive coastline and diverse marine life."

The new ramp has been built with recreational boaties front of mind, featuring three dedicated launching bays and a pontoon designed for smoother and more efficient queuing.

"The works also included 40 new 72-hour trailer parking bays and the construction of a rock seawall on the shoulders of the ramp to protect users as they launch their vessels," the Mayor said.

"A further 45 trailer parks will be delivered in the Moores Road parking area when the multi-level car park opens during a future stage of the project, unlocking more space for boaties.

"One of the key considerations for building the new ramp was freeing up space for emergency services, with first-responder vessels being given exclusive access to the old ramp off Banana Street.

"This move is intended to improve emergency response times for residents on the Southern Moreton Bay Islands (SMBI) and will also help Redland Bay Coast Guard respond swiftly to incidents on the

Division 5 Councillor Shane Rendalls said the ramp had been built to suit the needs of local boaties and would be a valued community asset for many years to come.

"I've no doubt users will appreciate having access to three dedicated lanes and a pontoon, while SMBI residents will benefit from less congestion near the ferry terminal," Cr Rendalls said.

"Giving emergency vessels exclusive use of the old ramp will also

ensure our first responders have streamlined and priority access to the bay in emergency situations.

"This ramp is just one step in the redevelopment of the Weinam Creek precinct, which is an exciting, intergenerational project that will turn the site into a major community hub.

"Being led by RIC, the plans for Marina Redland Bay include more car parks for SMBI commuters, an activated foreshore with more open space, and a range of retail and cafe amenities."

More money, please – how to ask for that pay rise

Do you feel like you're putting in your best effort at work but not receiving the financial rewards you deserve? Asking for a pay rise can be intimidating, but with the right approach, you can make a compelling case for your value to the company. Here's your guide to articulating your worth, asking for a pay rise, and what to do if you get a big, fat "no".

Know Your Worth: First things first, you need to know your value. Start by evaluating your specific contributions and achievements over the past year. Did you lead a project that saved the company money? Maybe you streamlined a process or boosted team morale. Quantifiable achievements are your best friends here.

Do Your Homework: Research is key. Resources such as Payscale and Seek offer salary research and comparison tools that can help you understand the typical pay range for your position.

Confidence is Everything: If you don't believe in your worth, it will be hard to convince others of it. Confident body language helps to reinforce your message, so make sure to prepare thoroughly, practice your pitch and be positive. Maintain eye contact, sit up straight and use open gestures.

The Big Ask: Let your intentions be known by requesting a meeting with your manager specifically to discuss your salary. Timing your request can make all the difference. Ideal times to ask for a raise

include your work anniversary, after a successful project, or during budget planning periods.

During the Meeting: Thank your manager for their time and highlight what you enjoy about your role and the company. Then, lay out your achievements and explain how they've benefited the organisation. Keep emotions out of it. Approach the conversation with a business-like demeanour and avoid discussing personal reasons for needing a raise. Plan Your Next Steps: If there's no room for negotiation, it might be time to evaluate if your current job aligns with your financial goals. Use this as an opportunity to explore other job options where your skills and contributions might be better valued.

And if the answer is no, don't lose heart. There are always other ways to move forward and achieve your financial goals. So, go on — take charge and ask for that raise. After all, you're worth it!
