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## SHIP CLUB SPECTACULAR: VIEWS, BREWS AND THE VERY BEST SEAFOOD!

The Little Ship Club in Dunwich began as a Volunteer Coastal Patrol (VCP) and a Naval Auxiliary Patrol (NAP) In World War 2. Nestled on Minjerribah's foreshore at Dunwich, just a minute away from the water transport jetty, over its 73 years, it has become a regular eatery for a lot of mainland visitors as well as locals.

Club Manager Tracey Rore says that visitors are welcome, club membership is open to all, and that ship ownership isn't a condition. "Our members have ships that range from six-foot rowboats to 65-footers — which I think is pretty big for a small ship!"

The club has been described as a little piece of paradise, but even an earthly paradise needs maintenance. The club's pontoon needs some serious repair work that will take some serious money, so the club is throwing its best effort into its 2025 Seafood Spectacular.

Held on January 18, the fundraiser will run from 10:30am until 8:30pm with no cover charge. Tracey says attendance for the Spectacular is usually between 400 to 600. The day will feature live music, crab races, and a sumptuous selection of local seafood, including fresh-caught prawns, oysters, calamari, fish, bugs and crabs — though Tracey is quick to point out that the racing crabs are usually released after their sprint around the track. Straddie Brewing will be there with a marquee, and the view will be exquisite, so all that will remain is for the day to provide classic Minjerribah sunshine and breezes — and there's your slice of paradise.

Are you ready, Redlands Coast?

Living on naturally wonderful Redlands Coast means many of us have bushland, creeks and coastline as a neighbour.

This also means that natural disasters are a reality. Local bushfires, storms and flooding have happened, and will happen again.



Summer has arrived, and so too has the potential for severe weather on Redlands Coast.

Recent thunderstorms and heavy rain in our city have highlighted the need for everyone to be prepared for whatever the remainder of the season may throw at us. Simple steps you can take to protect yourself and your family include preparing an evacuation plan, getting an emergency kit together, and familiarising yourself with the disaster information for your suburb or island.

The reality of Queensland's climate is that a natural disaster could strike anywhere and at any time, whether it be flash flooding, a severe thunderstorm, heavy and extended periods of rainfall, or bushfires.

Council plays an important role in the city's disaster management processes, working year-round with members of the Local Disaster Management Group (LDMG) including Queensland Police, Queensland Fire Department (QFD) and the State Emergency Service (SES) to ensure the city is adequately prepared for every scenario.

A dedicated team of disaster management officers operates within Council, managing day-to-day operations; conducting simulation exercises for cyclones, floods and bushfires; coordinating the Community Champions program across the mainland and islands and, managing the Local Disaster

Coordination Centre (LDCC) when it is stood up by the LDMG. Their work is year-round and spans not only disaster preparedness but also prevention, response and recovery.

Council also conducts planned burns in bushland areas to improve fire resilience and operates permanent and temporary sandbagging stations to help residents in the event of flooding.

As Chair of the Redland City LDMG, I have seen firsthand the time, dedication, skills and expertise that go into ensuring every corner of Redlands Coast and every community is prepared for the worst.

The message on Redlands Coast is clear: get ready, know your risk, and check in on your neighbour.

I encourage all residents to opt in for Council's free emergency messaging service, Redlands Coast Alerts, and to stay up to date with the latest emergency information on the Redlands Coast Disaster Dashboard.

Council's Disaster Management Team coordinates a year-round program of community education and disaster training and planning in conjunction with other emergency agencies.

This includes managing the Local Disaster Coordination Centre (LDCC), a team of disaster-response-trained Council officers who 'stand up' during emergencies to assist the community.

The LDCC has played a key role in local responses to events including large bushfires on our islands, and flooding from ex-tropical cyclones.

They've seen firsthand when things go wrong.

The team's key piece of advice? Don't wait for raindrops or smoke on the horizon. Disasters unfold quickly and minutes can make a difference.

Simple things like knowing where to get emergency

updates, and having an emergency plan and kit are great starting points.

If you live in a bushfire risk area, a Bushfire Survival Plan is an essential. If your home is in a flood-prone area and you think you'll need sandbags, have them on hand in advance.

## **Local champions**

Redlands Coast Community Champions are evidence that nothing beats having local connections.

Set up after the 2016 Russell Island bushfires, this program sees community volunteers receive comprehensive training to provide support in times of disaster.

Often first in place, particularly on the islands, the Champions can quickly set up evacuation centres, as well as being 'local eyes' and a source of knowledge for emergency agencies.

In between activations, they are also out and about educating the community on how to be prepared.

Coordinated by Council, this dedicated bunch of volunteers are an invaluable addition to disaster management efforts, working hard to ensure the safety of all on Redlands Coast.

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

## WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT PARVOVIRUS IN DOGS AND CATS

There have a been a number of reports in the last couple of months of increased cases of both canine and feline parvovirus (also known as panleucopaenia in cats). Puppies and kittens are most at risk of contracting these diseases, and the treatment can be expensive. Infection with these serious diseases may result in



death. Prevention is the best approach – it is time to make sure that your dogs and cats are up to date with their vaccinations.

#### **VACCINATION PROTOCOLS**

Your vet can advise you on the appropriate vaccination protocol for your pets. A course of vaccinations administered to puppies and kittens is essential to provide the best possible protection. Young animals are born with maternal antibodies - these are antibodies that pass from mother to offspring in the uterus, which provide them with some protection from diseases while their own body matures to a stage where it can mount an immune response. Vaccination after the period of maternal antibody protection is essential to ensure ongoing immunity - puppies and kittens then develop their own protective antibodies to disease, which provides ongoing protection.

Adult dogs and cats should be vaccinated regularly (yearly to three yearly) as advised by your veterinarian to maintain immunity.

#### **SIGNS OF PARVOVIRUS**

The most common symptoms of parvovirus include:

- Fever
- Lethargy
- Vomiting
- Diarrhoea, often bloody
- · Loss of appetite
- Dehydration
- · Abdominal pain

If your pet is demonstrating any of these signs it is important to seek veterinary attention.

#### PREVENTING DISEASE

- Vaccination is the most effective means of protecting your pet from these deadly diseases.
- · Parvovirus is extremely contagious and can persist in the environment for extended periods. Avoid areas where large numbers of animals congregate (off-lead parks, beaches etc.) and prevent your pets coming in contact with other animals' faeces.
- · Puppies and kittens should not be in contact with unvaccinated
- · Disinfection of environments where diseased animals have lived is essential - contact your vet for advice on the best options.

## **LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT**

# **KEEP CALM AND STAY SHADY!**

I'm writing this in early December, although it will be January now you're reading it, and I'm sure it hasn't gotten any cooler! The humidity levels are so high I expect I wouldn't look significantly different had I just climbed out of the pool (except perhaps less red in the face). If you can find a breeze and a shady spot to sit (very still) though, summer days are rather enjoyable. The best shady spot to sit, in my opinion, is under a tree. Although cliché, trees really are nature's air conditioners, and if your garden lacks any greenery over two feet tall, then I have a tree for you!

Native gardenias, *Atractocarpus fitzalanii*, are loosely related to gardenias (same family, Rubiaceae) and grow naturally in coastal and dry rainforest regions of northern Queensland. They boast big glossy leaves, fragrant white star-shaped flowers, and (in theory) edible fruit — at the very least, they're decorative when they turn yellow.

The trees are reasonably speedy growers if you want to grow some shade quickly and are a good size for a suburban block. They can grow to around six metres tall and three metres wide but are easily pruned to keep them more compact. They naturally have a bushy habit, so I find removing some of the lower branches improves their shape and 'shade tree' qualities.

I have yet to see one suffer any pests or diseases, and once established, they will grow quite happily unattended. Brisbane City Council also have them listed on their 'approved street tree' list – so if your house doesn't have a street tree, consider asking the council for one!

P.S.: If you are keen to get one for your garden, it's best to wait a few months until it's slightly cooler before planting. If not, make sure you keep the water up to your new baby until the heat has gone!

## WHAT CAUSES SKIN CANCERS AND MELANOMAS?

Last month, we discovered we all need our skin and sun exposure for a healthy life.

There is nothing wrong with a gradually acquired tan in Queensland, especially in summer, with no more than 15 to 20 minutes exposure at a time without ultraviolet protection. Do NOT sunbake or get sunburnt.

Races with pigmented skin are protected to a high degree from skin cancer. Skin cancer is uncommon in Africa and India. Skin pigment is a God-given protection against skin cancer, which is why people living in equatorial regions have pigmented skin.

Genetics play a major role in outcomes from sun exposure.

- The strawberry blonde complexion or albinos are much more prone to skin cancer than other Caucasians as they do not have

   or are unable to – pigment their skin with gradual exposure to the sun. They need to cover up with clothing.
- People with a family history of skin cancers, especially basal cell cancers, are more prone to develop them.

 A family history of melanoma is the major risk factor for the development of melanoma. Melanoma is not primarily a sun cancer. Why? Sixty-five per cent occur in areas of the body where 'the sun doesn't shine', either due to position or clothing. They can even occur in the gut.



If you have a family history of melanoma, we advise regular skin checks at least every six months from the age of 14 years! A dermoscopy of every pigmented lesion during a thorough skin check is essential. I have found early melanomas as small as 1mm in size.

It is not a cancer of old age. I have a family in which the mother and three teenage siblings were found to have — unbeknown to them — multiple melanomas and/or dysplastic naevi (pre-melanomas). Melanoma is a potentially lethal disease, but most are curable when found early. Level 1 melanomas are 100% curable, but continued surveillance for life is necessary.

An exciting \$3 million transformation of the Redland Performing Arts Centre (RPAC) forecourt is underway.

Redland City Mayor Jos Mitchell said RPAC continued to deliver on its commitment to a better experience for visitors with work starting this month on the front of the Cleveland facility.

Funded as part of the 2024-2025 Redland City Council budget, the forecourt facelift includes a revitalised entrance, covered alfresco area, permanent seating, a small outdoor performance deck, improved accessibility, increased lighting, new ramp and stair access and beautiful garden areas.

"RPAC provides a much-loved home for Redlands Coast's thriving local arts sector, as well as for artist development, school productions and events," the Mayor said.

"Once completed, this project will provide a wonderful community space and a new gateway to the home of performing arts on Redlands Coast."

Local engineering firm Baroque Group has been engaged to deliver the project that will dramatically improve the customer and visitor experiences for the 60,000-plus people who attend performances and events at RPAC each year. Detailed designs for this project were prepared by local project management and engineering consultancy company xburo and Anna O'Gorman Architects.

"While the building works take place, our rich program of performances and events will continue," said Bradley Rush, Redland City Council Service Manager, Creative Arts.

"With our front entrance expected to be out of action during some phases of the project, we look forward to offering visitors a glance behind the curtain with a series of intimate 'Stage Door Sessions', giving loyal guests a completely different view of RPAC and the opportunity to enter the building, like a performer, through the stage door."

Division 2 Councillor Peter Mitchell said the project would provide a more accessible link to Cleveland CBD.

"It will also ensure RPAC remains a valued asset for our Redlands Coast community for many years to come," he said.

During the redevelopment work, from 23 December 2024, the RPAC Box Office will operate from the Redland City Council Customer Service Centre, in the main Council building on Bloomfield Street, Cleveland.

## WHO'S AFRAID OF THE SCAREDY HOUSE?

It's a dark and stormy night...and in the Redland Performing Arts Centre strange things are stirring... the audience is creating the ghosts that are hidden in the crevices, nooks and crannies, ghosts that will be brought to life by the Counterpilot host of the haunting.

Once through the secret tunnel and into the giant pillow fort, the ghost wrangling – and the fun – really begin. Nathan Sibthorpe, Counterpilot's techno-troublemaker, conceived the idea of *Scaredy House* when commissioned by Metro Arts to make a work for young people. Company-in-Residence at the time, Counterpilot decided on an interactive horror show along the lines of *Escape from Monotony*, which they'd developed and produced at the Museum of Brisbane.

"It's an intergenerational play based on deconstructing a house that scares us and inhabiting it with ghosts so that we scare the house," says Nathan. "It's liberating for adults to be asked to play, and for families to collaborate in that shared space, hands-on together, when we talk about things we're scared of — but everything's OK because we've got each other."

The process involves cameras, projections, light boxes and high-tech shadow puppetry. "While the avatars are ghosts and spiders, our real fears are the ones we don't talk about; fear of what people will think of us, of

"We don't often do plays with young folk in them, but serendipitously, we'd decided on a double bill production for January 2025. Ray Noonan is directing *The Eulogy*, a perceptive and edgy gem of a play, a two-hander, and I'm tackling another premiere, about a family's life in a Queensland railway construction camp. There are children in the family the same age as Dylan and Erin, so it couldn't have worked out better – and Jill's absolutely right about their talent!"

So for the two — and possibly for their mum Elaine, who's been roped in as a third child — it's been unpack, get over jet lag, fluff their feathers and jump straight in at the deep end of a drama style they've never tackled before, a radio play.

## LET'S GET IT SORTED PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM TO BENEFIT REDLANDS

FROM REDLAND CITY COUNCIL

Redland City Council has been awarded more than \$480,000 in Queensland Government funding through the Let's Get it Sorted Partnership Program to improve waste management practices in the community.

Mayor Jos Mitchell said the funding would go towards a citywide behaviour change initiative aimed at improving household recycling rates and lowering the amount of waste being sent to landfill.

"To reach the statewide target of establishing a zero-waste society by 2050, we need households and workplaces across the city to be disposing of their waste responsibly," the Mayor said.

"At the moment, about 16 per cent of what is being sent to landfill through kerbside general waste bins could be recycled, with the most common culprits being paper, cardboard and hard plastics.

"We also have seen a rise in non-recyclable items such as soft plastics, bagged waste, bagged recyclables and green waste ending up in yellow-lid bins, which lowers the quality of recycled materials and adds to the costs of processing these goods for re-use.

"By improving education around the importance of residents separating out their household waste, which will be one of the main aims of the initiative, we can not only keep these costs down but also work towards creating a more sustainable future for the city.

"Council is already running a range of waste management programs in the community and the state-funded initiative will be beneficial to the ongoing success of this work, particularly when it comes to boosting recycling and decreasing contamination rates."

Lowering the amount of waste being sent to landfill on Redlands Coast is a critical issue for Council, with an increase in the statewide waste levy estimated to add \$170 per year to the average household bill by 2030.

The initiative, and more specifically the ongoing education around the importance of making sure the right items are going in the right bins, will assist with mitigating the impacts of these rising costs.

Key activities will include audits of Council's yellow-lid bins to assess the level of contamination. Council will then review this data and

provide targeted feedback to the community through bin tags, letters and educational material.

Redland City Council was one of 26 Queensland councils and two Regional Organisations of Councils to benefit from the first tranche of the program, receiving \$486,855.













## Queensland real estate set to 'spring'

FROM THE REAL ESTATE INSTITUTE OF QLD

Queensland's rapidly rising residential property prices stabilised over the September 2024 quarter (July – September 2024), as a wave of spring sales began settling.

The latest median sales results released by the Real Estate Institute of Queensland (REIQ) today, reveals a modest 0.26% increase in Queensland's median house prices for the quarter, lifting to \$772,000.

While annual house price growth remains impressive across the state, some regions saw slight quarter-on-quarter dips, suggesting a slowdown rather than a halt in price growth.

The Gold Coast, Brisbane, and Cairns were among the house markets showing signs of stabilisation, while regional areas like Mackay (8.83%), Noosa (7.37%), Townsville (6%) and Gladstone (4.93%) experienced the most significant quarterly gains.

Noosa held onto the crown for Queensland's most expensive market, with a remarkable quarterly median house price of \$1.42 million, surpassing Brisbane (\$1.187m), the Gold Coast (\$1.092m) and the Sunshine Coast (\$1.049m), which also posted million-

dollar-medians

In Greater Brisbane (\$870K), prices continued their steady ascent, with Redlands reaching a median of \$900,000, Moreton Bay at \$820,000, and Ipswich maintaining its reputation for value for money at \$695,000.

Median days on market continue to drop, with Queensland houses now selling in 21 days. The longest annual median days on market were Bundaberg (47 days), Moreton Bay (38) and Rockhampton (29). The fastest were Townsville (13), Mackay (13), and Fraser Coast (14.5).

Meanwhile, units continue to perform strongly while remaining comparatively much more affordable, rising 2.79% over the quarter across Queensland to \$627,000.

Queensland units are now selling in a rapid 18 days. The longest annual days on market for units were in Bundaberg (45 days), Townsville and Fraser Coast (both 29 days). The fastest were ties between Sunshine Coast, Noosa and Cairns (all 13 days), and Brisbane and Toowoomba (both 14 days).



REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said while prices may not be soaring as high as they have in recent years, the steady market reflects sustained demand and resilience in the state.

"The September quarter results demonstrate a stabilisation in Queensland's residential property market, which is a positive sign of the market finding its rhythm after a period of rapid price escalation," Ms Mercorella said.

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## SPARKLING SUMMER RASPBERRY AND PINEAPPLE PUNCH RECIPE

Sunny, warm January days call for cool drinks, and this non-alcoholic punch starring fresh fruit with a fizzy twist is refreshing, making it a perfect summer treat for the whole family.

#### **INGREDIENTS (SERVES 2-3)**

- 1 orange, freshly juiced (about ½ cup)

- 1/4 cup fresh raspberry puree (about 1 cup raspberries blended and strained)
- 1 lime, freshly juiced (about 2 tablespoons)
- 1 teaspoon of honey or agave syrup (optional, for extra sweetness)
- 1 cup of chilled sparkling water or ginger beer
- Ice cubes
- a sprig of rosemary and extra whole raspberries to garnish each drink (optional)

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Blend the fresh raspberries until they are smooth in a food processor, then strain through a fine-mesh sieve to remove the seeds. Set the puree aside.
- 2. In a large jug, combine orange juice, pineapple juice, lime juice, and honey/agave syrup (if using) and stir to mix.
- 3. Fill glasses with ice cubes and pour the juice mixture evenly into each glass, filling the glass to about two-thirds full. Slowly add the sparkling water or ginger beer to top off the drink.
- 4. Garnish each glass with rosemary sprigs and extra whole raspberries, and serve immediately to enjoy the fizz!





## A REMARKABLE LIFE: CELEBRATING WENDY TIDBOLD

## (3 OCTOBER 1942 - 12 OCTOBER 2024)

Wendy Tidbold's extraordinary life is a story of resilience, ingenuity, and an enduring love for horses. Born in Hobart in 1942, Wendy moved to Brisbane at age six and settled in the Redlands, where she lived for nearly 68 years. Despite leaving school after Grade 7, Wendy's determination made her a trailblazer in multiple fields.



Her lifelong passion for horses began with Loppy, her first horse, and grew into a legacy spanning over 65 years. Wendy became a life member and 11-year president of the Redlands & Southern Districts Equestrian Group and exhibited at the Royal Queensland Show (EKKA) for 13 years. She rode side saddle in period costume to open Ladies Oaks Day at Eagle Farm Racecourse for three consecutive years.

Beyond riding, Wendy's contributions to saddlery were groundbreaking. Her first experience in the trade began at age 18 in Barcaldine, and by the 1960s, she had started her own saddlery business from her family home in Capalaba. Over the next 50 years, she operated 'The Sheldon Saddler', which included a boutique side saddle museum. Renowned for her custom-made side saddles, Wendy catered to riders and horses across Australia and New Zealand, becoming one of a handful of side saddle makers worldwide.

Wendy's expertise earned her membership in the Saddlers & Harness Makers Association of Australia. She further honed her skills with a course at the UK Saddlery Training Centre in 2005, earning a UK Instructor's Certificate for Side Saddle. Her work and dedication were featured in media including Australian Women's Weekly, Discovery Channel, and Totally Wild.

Wendy also showcased her skills on the international stage, participating in Brisbane's first Equitana horse show, where she performed a Pas de Deux riding side saddle over four nights. She judged equestrian events across Australia and New Zealand, solidifying her reputation as a respected figure in the field.

While her professional achievements are remarkable, Wendy's personal life was just as fulfilling. She married Mike in 1968 and together they raised three sons. She was also a proud grandmother and great-grandmother, and cherished her large and loving family.

Wendy's philosophy of life is summed up in her three favourite sayings:

- "You can do anything you want if you really TRY!"
- "If you haven't got a DREAM, how can you have a dream come true!"
- "Never, never GIVE UP!"

Through her faith in God and a tireless work ethic, Wendy Tidbold has created a legacy that continues to inspire all who knew her - a remarkable life lived with purpose, passion, and grace.







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## TIPS FOR CROSSING THE SOUTH PASSAGE BAR

The three big things to consider when crossing a coastal bar are wind, swell, and tide.

For most trailer boats, a wind speed up to about 10 knots is very comfortable for fishing offshore, especially if it is a typical summer easterly.

In winter, the dominant breeze is from the south-west, making coastal bars more pleasant and fishing conditions more enjoyable.

After Christmas is typically the start of the swell season, and anyone considering crossing the bar should take into account swell height and its direction. A challenging day would be an easterly swell coming straight in on to the bar of around 1.5 metres or more. Swells travel at 12 knots around coastal bars and faster when they are off an intense weather system, so be wary on the bigger swell days.

An incoming tide is preferable as the sea is more passive when swells and tidal flow are travelling from the same direction. Higher in the tide cycle gives more depth under the boat and minimises risk.

Conversely, crossing a coastal bar on the outgoing tide is where incoming swells and the outgoing tide oppose each other, increasing the level of risk during crossing, particularly in a small boat.

Lifejackets are now compulsory when crossing all designated coastal bars in Queensland. Make sure yours is suited to the size and weight of the person wearing it and if inflatable, it is within its service date.

It is also a good idea to log on with VMR Raby Bay on VHF channel 83 before and after crossing. The radio room is open from 5:00am to 8:00pm every day.

Keeping the engine trimmed in and maintaining a low planing speed is a good approach heading out, aiming for the deepest water or the area of least surf break.



Don't forget to mark some waypoints as a guide for the run home later.

Coming home, the engine should be slightly trimmed up. Aim for the safest entry point and maintain a speed slightly higher than the swell speed so you don't get caught by a wave travelling behind.

Remember: if in doubt, don't go out.

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## How to eat an elephant

One of the privileges of being a financial planner is the opportunity to listen to people share their goals, fears, and aspirations. Lately, a common concern has emerged: "I'm worried whether my kids will ever be able to buy a home." The dream of home ownership seems increasingly out of reach due to the many hurdles that first-time buyers face.

A lesser-known strategy that can help is the First Home Super Saver Scheme (FHSS). This provision allows individuals to use certain superannuation contributions to help purchase their first home.

The concept is simple: you make extra contributions to your superannuation, and then, when you're ready to buy a home, you can access those contributions. The amount you can withdraw depends on the contributions made and the length of time they've been in the super system. Under the scheme, you can access up to \$15,000 of eligible contributions per year, and a total of up to \$50,000. While the funds are in super, they are also deemed to earn interest, which is calculated at the Australian Tax Office's Shortfall Interest Charge (SIC) rate — the rate applied to late tax payments. There are conditions and fine print, but that's the gist of it.

There are three key benefits to using this scheme as part of a first home deposit strategy:

- It's easy to get started: Eligible contributions include personal contributions and salary sacrifice contributions. Starting is as simple as arranging with your employer to salary sacrifice part of your income¹.
- It helps protect you from temptation: Moving money into superannuation makes it less accessible, so it's harder to dip into your savings for impulse purchases. The funds are not readily available through your online banking app.

3. It reduces tax paid personally: Interest or earnings on savings in a non-superannuation account are taxed at your marginal tax rate plus Medicare levy. For someone earning between \$45,000 and \$135,000, that rate is 30% plus the 2% Medicare Levy. For example, \$5,000 in a savings account earning 3.5% interest will generate about \$175 in interest per year, which would be taxed at approximately \$56 including Medicare levy. After tax, the effective interest rate drops to about 2.38% per annum. In comparison, contributing the same \$5,000 to super and claiming it as a tax deduction could reduce your annual tax bill by about \$1,600[2]. Allowing for the contributions tax of \$750 that will be applied to the contribution, the net tax savings are estimated to be \$850.

While this strategy offers some clear advantages, saving for a home deposit is still a challenging task. It remains an 'elephant' that can only be eaten one bite at a time. Time, patience, and discipline are still required to reach this goal. However, using strategies like the FHSS can make the journey a little easier by taking advantage of available opportunities.
