After a longer than usual break, the Shire Clerk's Cottage Market will resume on Saturday, April 12 at 8:00am.

But first, to get to the canteen, you must pass our own cake stall, which is the first stall you will come to, loaded with homemade

cakes, biscuits, slices (and possibly other delights).

Need more motivation to come along? The cottage grounds are delightful on a fine day. Stroll around the stalls, grab a coffee from our on-site vendor and a sausage sizzle or bacon and egg sandwich from our barbecue – we think they're the best on the bayside!

Make your way up the steps of our beautiful, historic Shire Clerk's Cottage. Built in 1890, the cottage is lovingly maintained by the Waterloo Bay Leisure Centre, and proceeds from the market go towards its maintenance. The cottage is filled with lovely antique furniture and furnishings donated mainly by the community.

Round out your morning with a delicious Devonshire Tea on the cottage verandah served by the fantastic Boomerang Bag ladies. Scones are baked on-site on the morning of the market.

ANZAC DAY AT THE ARMISTICE CENTENARY WAR MEMORIAL

FROM THE QLD RIFLE ASSOCIATION

The Armistice Centenary War Memorial is sacred to the memory of the more than 500 Riflemen of the Queensland Rifle Association who gave their lives in the Great War of 1914-1918 for our freedom.

When the Great War broke out, the first men to be called up in defence of the nation were members of QRA's rifle clubs throughout Queensland. It was these Riflemen who took part in the expeditionary force which captured German New Guinea. A smaller force was committed to manning the fortifications on Thursday Island. The War effort progressed and so many more QRA Rifle Club members joined the AIF and fought in many locations including the Gallipoli Peninsula and Western Front. At the end of the Great War, some 568 of the 5,316 QRA Rifle Club members who joined the AIF, had been killed on Active Service.

As the nation approached the 100th anniversary of the Armistice that ended the Great War of 19141918, the QRA Museum Committee recognised that there was no discrete memorial established in Queensland that records the loss of the 568 Riflemen in the Great War. The ACWM was then established at Belmont to commemorate the members who served, many of whom made the ultimate sacrifice for our nation.

On ANZAC Day – the most significant day of commemoration, reflection and gratitude – we open our gates at the ACWM to the community. Family, friends, servicemen and women are invited to attend our ANZAC memorial service.



BRISBANE RACE WEEK PROMISES AN UNFORGETTABLE EXPERIENCE ON THE BAY

Brisbane Race Week will showcase its signature array of diverse sailing formats over a festive five days from 2 to 7 May 2025 in southern Moreton Bay.

Hosted for the second year and with three divisions, the regatta caters to thoroughbred racing yachts, cruising monohulls, and multihulls while opening its doors for the general public to enjoy the spectacle.

"Brisbane Race Week is a week of friendly rivalry between all sailing clubs based in South-East Queensland. It has swelled in popularity due to the unique sailing courses and active social calendar of events," says race organiser and participant Anton Prange.

"We are thrilled to see many more entries from a variety of clubs and have prepared an action-packed week on and off the water for our participants and community."

Friday kicks off the event in 2025 with Formula-1-style 'hot laps' around Green Island, with the winner completing the most laps in a three-hour window before the popular opening fiesta with Mexican fare and entertainment at the Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron.

Weekend racing sees the stakes raised with short, handcrafted courses putting crews to the test and using the newly installed recreational marks, followed by more themed evening celebrations at Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron and Wynnum Manly Yacht Club. A Texan Night on Sunday at Wynnum Manly Yacht Club reinforces the 'cross-border' sentiment and cheerful rivalry between the clubs.

A long passage race on Monday allows yachts to stretch their legs with beautiful Brisbane and Moreton Island as a backdrop,

with the day ending at a community fundraiser event of Burgers, Beer and Bingo supporting the Making Waves Foundation. Making Waves provides unique on-water experiences for young people with disabilities or young adults experiencing disadvantage and is based at Manly.

Finally, after a day of rest for Labour Day, Wednesday welcomes the mother of all pursuit races. With handicaps and start times already decided, it's a winner-takes-all battle, with the first boat across the line winning the race.



As we continue to repair homes, streets and communities, it's heartening to see so many locals stepping out of their usual routines and


conveniences to help one another.

Jonathon, awarded an MA for his ground-breaking social justice work, combined with his decades of professional arts experience, knowledge and passion for music, has created choirs that address social issues, involving local communities, the homeless and disadvantaged, choirs that include the Choir of Hard Knocks, Peace Choir Project and No More Excuses. His work at RPAC over the years has included the Rock Choir, Pop Choir and this year — the Greatest Show Choir!

Grown in the Redlands and performing at RPAC, this multigenerational community choir features nearly 200 performers, special guest artists Queenie van de Zandt and Jan van de Stool, with Jonathon Welsh conducting. Jonathon says the show's format, presenting iconic Broadway hits, will strike a chord with most music lovers.

"Musicals are very popular at present. The songs draw people in then I have twelve weeks to teach them fifteen arrangements — competence builds confidence. There are no auditions, everyone can sing. Our choirs are based on access and inclusion and giving a sense of connection.





Cats can suffer from many different dental problems — periodontal disease, fractured teeth, and oral tumours are all common. Tooth resorption is another common condition seen in over half of cats over the age of three years.



WHAT ARE THE SIGNS OF TOOTH RESORPTION?

Cats with resorptive lesions may show signs including excessive salivation, blood in the mouth, decreased appetite, and difficulty eating. Cats are very good at hiding pain so it may not be obvious that there is dental disease occurring until it is quite advanced. Your veterinarian will likely recommend dental X-rays to diagnose the presence of these lesions.

HOW ARE FORLS TREATED?

Treatment of tooth resorption requires extraction of the affected tooth. This is performed under general anaesthesia. Removal of damaged teeth often results in immediate relief.



Regular dental check-ups throughout your cat's life are advised in order to diagnose and treat dental disease and prevent painful conditions developing unnoticed.

WHAT IS TOOTH RESORPTION?

Tooth resorption (also known as FORLs or feline oral resorptive lesions) occurs when tooth roots erode and are replaced by bone. The erosion begins at the outside of the tooth where the gum meets the dental hard tissue and most commonly occurs in the lower premolars. Resorption starts at the gumline and progresses to erode the dentin, leaving the sensitive inner tissues of the tooth exposed. Bacterial infection of the pulp of the tooth may then occur as the

If you have recently moved into our Bayside community, please make sure you update your enrolment details at www.ecq.qld.gov.au. Voting is compulsory for all Australian citizens over the age of 18. If you don't vote, you may receive a fine. If you are aged 16 or 17, you can provisionally enrol and this means you can vote as soon as you turn 18. Once you have enrolled, your name and address will be added to the electoral roll.



SPORTS CLUBS RECOVERY GRANTS

Funding is now available for eligible sport and recreational organisations impacted by Ex-Tropical Cyclone Alfred. Applications for grants have now opened. To apply go www.qld.gov. au/recreation/sports/funding/disaster-recovery. A grant of up to \$5000 is available for eligible items. To be eligible, organisations must be an incorporated not-for-profit organisation with a primary objective relating to the delivery of local sport and active recreation, demonstrate tenure over the infrastructure and have the legal right to conduct works on the site to request repair damaged infrastructure.



HEALTH BOOST WELCOME

Good news for local health services. The Federal Government has made the single largest investment in Medicare since its creation, with \$8.5 billion to deliver an additional 18 million bulk billed GP visits each year, hundreds of nursing scholarships, and thousands more doctors in the largest GP training program ever. Australian patients and families will save hundreds of dollars a year in out-of-pocket costs, with patient savings of \$859 million a year by 2030. It will mean 9 out of 10 GP visits will be bulk billed by 2030, boosting the number of fully bulk billed practices to around 4,800 nationally – triple the current number.

WHAT IS AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDER?

BY DR DALE GARRED, MANLY VILLAGE MEDICAL

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a lifelong neurodevelopmental condition. Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is NOT the same as Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), but the two conditions can coexist. The word 'spectrum' highlights that people with autism experience varying types of difficulties to varying degrees. The term Autism has replaced outdated terms such as Asperger Syndrome.

Autism affects the way people communicate, process information and interact with the world. Children with Autism have difficulties in two main areas:



1. Social Communication – for example:

- a. Limited ability to interact or engage in play with others.
- b. Slow to learn to speak.
- c. Less use of nonverbal ways of communicating such as eye contact, pointing and gestures e.g. waving.
- d. Struggling to share information or join in conversations.
- e. Unusual sensitivity or lack of sensitivity to sounds, textures, pain or light.
- f. Difficulty making lasting friendships.

2. Repetitive behavior – for example:

- a. Rocking
- b. Finger flicking.

The main support for a child with ASD is to enhance their existing skills (strengths) and help them develop strategies to overcome their difficulties.

 Psychology – helps with managing emotions and challenging behaviours as well as helps develop social understanding.



- Speech Pathology helps to develop good communication skills and explore how language can be used for social engagement.
- Occupational Therapy helps with sensory sensitivities and helps develop joint play skills.

Medication is NOT recommended for the core features of ASD, but may be used for co-existing conditions such as Anxiety.

If you are concerned that a loved one may have features of Autism, speak with your doctor about what support services might be most appropriate. It is important to get support early (Psychology, Speech, OT) to try and improve long term outcomes and reduce the overall amount of support an individual will need over their lifetime.

HISTORY ON WHEELS AND WINGS – NATIONAL MOTORING HERITAGE DAY

The early humans who developed the wheel probably had no idea of the pleasure they'd bequeath to later aficionados of historic vehicles – trains, planes, trucks, boats, cars and buses, all forms of transport that come under the loving wings of the Queensland Historic Motoring Council (QHMC). The QHMC will soon celebrate National Motoring Heritage Day, supported by the Bayside Vehicle Restorers Club, with combined displays of historic cars and bikes and scale models that would make a collector's knees go weak.

President of the QHMC, Carle Gregory, says that people are usually attracted to historic cars and bikes because of the nostalgia factor.

"They're reminded of things they saw when they were children or teenagers, and there's curiosity about how things were back in the 'olden days'. The old vehicles are works of art; they had real style compared to new cars and you could easily identify the different makes," he says.

"Another attraction with pre-computerised cars is that you could work on them yourself; if something went wrong you could look at it, identify the problem and probably do something about it."

There will be a wide range of cars and bikes in the display, which

will hopefully include a 1976 Ford Falcon police car, a replica early MG and a three-way hearse*. When asked, Carle admitted that he couldn't say what his favourite make and model car is, "I love them all!"

A special entrant will be the 'Gooney Bird' Dakota DC3, one of the WW2 'Biscuit Bombers' that among many other tasks, dropped food supplies to troops engaged in war zones.

Proceeds of the day will go to the Robert Shannon Foundation and Farm Angels. The Foundation encourages people under the age of thirty to become involved in the restoration and preservation of historic vehicles, by assisting with costs and education fees; Farm Angels supports primary producers impacted by all natural disasters. The Cancer Council will run food stalls in the hall.

Originally founded in 1968, QHMC represents over 100 member clubs, with a total of 13,000 club members and 21,000 historic (more than 30 years old) vehicles. That's a lot of enthusiasm and love. Those early wheel developers didn't know what they'd started...

ESCAPING TO ST HELENA ISLAND FOR A HISTORY LESSON

LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT

A PASSION FOR FLOWERS

Ah, the ubiquitous passionfruit. Just like mulberries and lemon trees, they have been a staple backyard addition for forever. Apart from a tendency to smother anything in their path, they take relatively little effort and soon produce so much fruit that you can't make enough pavlovas. Assuming the rats don't eat them first. Or the possums.

But, in my opinion, there is more to the passionfruit than the fruit. The flowers are stunning, and in a climate where we can't grow delicate clematis and perhaps struggle with climbing roses, Passiflora vines are here for you.

If you have yet to pay attention to the common Passiflora edulis (or regular edible passionfruit) flowers, they are works of beauty. The base ring of petals with the frilly 'corona filaments' sitting on top, stick out at right angles like a tutu. Look at the flower from the side, and you will notice the anther and stigma (boy and girl bits) sticking up, looking, at least to me, quite alien-like. And if you thought the regular passionfruit flowers were something special, you need to investigate some of the other species.

Another variety that produces edible fruit is P. quadrangularis or the giant granadilla. These fruit grow to the size of a football, and I've heard they taste like sweet tropical melon, although I wouldn't know because the few fruit my vine has managed to produce have been eaten by rats. We all know rats always take the good stuff, though, so I assume they're delicious. Nevertheless, I persist because the flowers are out of this world! A similar structure to P. edulis, they are much bigger, have even more squiggly (technical term there) filaments and are the most brilliant shade of purple.

Another stunner, not grown for fruit, is P. racemosa. The filaments are smaller, but the longer coral-coloured petals are reflexed (bent backwards), and as the species name suggests, flowers are born in racemes or clusters that hang down from a slightly less boisterous vine, making it the perfect climber for an obelisk or graceful archway.

Regular passionfruit vines are available everywhere. The other two I mentioned should be able to be sourced through local nurseries or online.



Queensland rentals – listed one week, leased the next

FROM THE REAL ESTATE INSTITUTE OF QLD

Queensland's rental market in 2024 was characterised by quarter after quarter of tight vacancy rates, with the strain on rental supply continuing in the December quarter.

The Real Estate Institute of Queensland's (REIQ) residential vacancy rate report for the final quarter of 2024 shows a statewide vacancy rate of 1.0% — mirroring the rate of the previous two quarters and only slightly increasing from 0.9% in the first quarter.

Of the 50 local government areas and sub-regions covered in the report, vacancy rates tightened in 18, remained stable in 15, and relaxed in 17 this guarter.

Cook (0.0%) retained the unenviable position as the tightest region in the state, with Goondiwindi and Charters Towers only just moving the dial at 0.1%.

At the other end of the spectrum, the Bay Islands (3.5%), including North Stradbroke, Russell, Macleay, Karragarra, Lamb, and Coochiemudlo, held a healthy vacancy, along with Isaac at 3.2% – the only other healthy rental market in the report.

The December quarter delivered some strong seasonal swings, with holiday hotspot Noosa's vacancy rate halving compared to the previous quarter from 2.4% to 1.2%.

REIQ CEO Antonia Mercorella said reporting on 'little to no vacancies' had begun to feel like a broken record, with nearly every region recording a vacancy rate in the tight range and well below a healthy rating of 2.6-3.5%.

"Despite the movements over the quarter and over the year, 48 out of the 50 regions in the report have landed in what we classify as a tight rental market." Ms Mercorella said.


"A tight vacancy figure tells a story of fewer properties becoming available for rent, and for those that do, they are not considered 'vacant' until they've been listed for over three weeks.

"The ugly reality is that when you have a prolonged tight rental market like this, everyone feels it. We know that the most vulnerable in our community are the hardest hit; however, its impact is felt at all levels, including amongst those with higher or double incomes."



Regarding the biggest falls and rises in vacancy rates in the December quarter, Ms Mercorella explained some seasonal factors could be at play. However, it was difficult to pinpoint the cause.

"It's not uncommon to see people relocating at the end of the year, and we suspect in the case of Noosa it could be attributed to people taking a 'try before you buy' approach — renting and enjoying the summer holidays while waiting for the right property," she said.



OZFISH CHAPTER SAVES OVER 1,000 TONNES OF SHELLS FROM LANDFILLS

OzFish is Australia's only fishing conservation charity dedicated to empowering and supporting recreational anglers and their communities to take control of the health of their rivers, lakes and estuaries. We operate nationwide and, through our network of members and volunteers, are organised into local chapters. OzFish has delivered dozens of impactful habitat restoration projects that benefit fish.

The OzFish Central Moreton Bay Chapter collections team deserves immense recognition and congratulations for reaching an extraordinary milestone. They have successfully collected and diverted over 1,000 tonnes of oyster shell material from landfills, marking a significant achievement with far-reaching benefits for both the environment and marine ecosystems. This accomplishment is not just a numerical

feat but a testament to their dedication to sustainability and environmental stewardship.

The shells collected by the team will be repurposed to construct new shellfish reefs, which play a critical role in supporting marine life. These reefs serve

as essential habitats for a variety of species, offering shelter, breeding grounds, and feeding areas. Beyond providing ecological homes, shellfish reefs also contribute to improving water quality by filtering pollutants and excess nutrients from the water. This natural filtration process enhances the overall health of marine environments and


MY THOUGHTS:

Jim led a double life, feigning ignorance and illiteracy to stay under the radar rather than attract the wrath of his white slave owners. In fact, he was a well-read philosophically and strategically-thinking man, living by his values including honour and kindness — and he had a great sense of humour.

Jim is a likeable character, through whose eyes we gain an insight into the experience of slaves in

the southern states of America — generally appalling, often outrageous, and at times hilarious. My favourite quote comes after a bizarre situation where Jim was enlisted as a member of a travelling minstrel group and was required to use black face (as did the white members of the group) so people would think he was white pretending to be black — he could not be discovered to actually be black. He says: "Never had a situation felt so absurd, surreal and ridiculous. And I had spent my life as a slave!"

We see Jim, after many dangerous encounters, eventually claim his truth proudly and become James. I believe there was a turning point where, having numerous times been 'damned if I do and damned if I don't' he finally chose DO.



I really enjoyed the book – far more than *Huckleberry Finn*, which I read after *James* and found impenetrable in terms of the slave lingo and really annoying in the depiction of the so gullible and ignorant Jim.

Almost all my book club friends also really enjoyed it – bar one, who found it contrived and unbelievable. Life would be dull if we all thought the same way! I'd recommend it.

EASTER BUNNY CUPCAKES



Hop to it! These fluffy vanilla cupcakes topped with creamy buttercream and adorable bunny decorations are fun to prepare and delicious to eat!

INGREDIENTS

CUPCAKES

- 1 ½ cups (190g) all-purpose flour
- 1 ½ tsp baking powder
- ¼ tsp salt
- ½ cup (115g) unsalted butter, softened
- ¾ cup (150g) sugar
- 2 large eggs
- · 2 tsp vanilla extract
- ½ cup (120ml) milk

ICING

- 1/2 cup (230g) unsalted butter, softened
- 2 cups (375g) caster sugar
- 2 tbsp milk
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- A dash of food colouring (you choose the colour, we love pastels!)

TO DECORATE (choose a few, or all of these and be creative!)

- · Mini chocolate or candy eggs
- Mini marshmallows (for bunny ears)
- · Mini chocolate chips (for bunny eyes)
- Pink jelly beans (for the nose)



METHOD

- 1. Preheat your oven to 175°C. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with cupcake liners.
- 2. In a bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, and salt. In a separate bowl, beat the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, then mix in the vanilla. Alternate between adding the flour mixture and milk, starting and ending with the dry ingredients.
- 3. Divide the batter evenly among the liners and bake for 18-20 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Let cool completely.
- 4. Beat butter for the icing until smooth, then gradually add in the sugar. Mix in vanilla and milk, beating until fluffy, then add food colouring to the icing.
- 5. Pipe a swirl of frosting on each cupcake, then you're ready to decorate. You might like to cut mini marshmallows diagonally to create bunny ears, then add mini chocolate chips for eyes and a pink jelly bean for the nose. Or you could create a nest of chocolate or candy eggs on your cupcake.

LIVING LIFE AT THE POINTY END – THIS IS THE SES

If you've needed the help of the SES during Ex-Tropical Cyclone Alfred's rampage through the bayside, the smiling face, the reassuring words and the capable assistance may well have been from SES member Cindel Richardson or one of her team.

Cindel, group leader of the Cleveland State Emergency Service, has been a member of the SES for 24 years, joining as a teenager in Yeppoon to gain the experience necessary to join the police service. Mission accomplished; Cindel has been a police officer for 17 years and is now an Acting Inspector within the Multicultural Affairs Unit of the Queensland police service. "I just like getting out into the community and helping out where I can," she says.

Her skills at getting out and helping are evidenced by Cindel's awards, including the RCC's Australia Day 2025 achievement award, the Spirit of Suncorp Award, and various other regional awards and police awards — though she's quick to refer to the importance of the team.

"Knowing who you are and knowing where your limits are and knowing your team is vital," she says. "Team members need to support each other as well as the community and you have to draw on your reserves of empathy and emotional intelligence while keeping a resilient space for yourself. There's a real sense of camaraderie in this team, they're close and they're passionate."

Are there any frustrations?

"The main frustration for all of us is being obliged to go home and rest when there's still work to be done," she grins.

There's no doubt of the high esteem and regard that the community feels for the SES and it finds expression in small but sincere ways.

"There's nothing like feeling the relief that people experience when you turn up in their hour of need — members of the team just give it all they can — even if their own properties are damaged they just put their orange on and get out there to help," Cindel says.

"A really good thing happened during Alfred — a couple of the women on the team were chucking on their chainsaw chaps and getting out the big chainsaws to clear a tree and a little girl came out of the house with a note saying that them showing up gave the family an understanding that women can do anything. A lot of individuals and charity groups turn up with food and support — it means a lot."

So, what else keeps the commitment and the energy going?

"My biggest concern is being there to do my bit for my three families — my kids, my 'orange' SES family and my 'blue' police family; they're my worlds," she says. "It can become challenging to balance the three and


sometimes there are overlaps, such as police searches for missing persons that may involve the SES so it's good to be interoperable across the boundaries, guidelines and rules of both organisations — but my main concern will always be for my kids."

Cindel is on first-name terms with several of eastern Australia's historic disasters, including Marcia, Yasi and Larry, as well as bushfires in NSW but she says that you don't have to be super-fit to be a SES volunteer.

"We have members of various abilities and ages — some of our volunteers are in their mid-eighties — and they give what they can, through the peer support program, administration, logistics, organising supplies. You don't always have to climb on roofs and cut trees or get out the flood boat. If you're interested, get onto our website and see how we work."

In the meantime, Cindel and her team are there at the pointy end - just getting out into the community and helping.

ICONIC 'EYESORE' GONE, YET IMMORTALISED AS PART OF QR UPGRADE

Commuters from bayside suburbs travelling to and from the CBD have been curiously watching the upgrade of Morningside train station on their commutes.

Now, the final piece of an infamous Morningside 'eyesore' has come down as part of the station upgrade. But the iconic footbridge, famed for its brutalist style, isn't gone forever – it's immortalised in a local artwork displayed at the station.

It's been a feature of the Morningside suburb for decades, dividing residents over whether it was a brutalist masterpiece or just plain brute — but now the iconic steel footbridge is, well, nothing at all. A stalwart feature of the station since 1992, the final pieces of the iconic steel bridge were removed during a weekend track closure in February 2025.

Two cranes completed the removal, pulling 51 tonnes of steel from the structure, adding to the 274 metres of concrete linear ramp already demolished early in 2024.

True to the saying that beauty is in the eye of the beholder, the structure will be immortalised in a stunning artwork, *Bright Night* by local artist Patricia Woods, which will be mounted on the station, so

locals can enjoy it for decades more.

The modernised station reopened in December 2024, with bike enclosure and carpark works continuing.

"Whether you liked or loathed the old steel footbridge at Morningside station it was certainly a picture of brutalism which was iconic to the suburb and train station," said Queensland Rail Head of South East Queensland Neil Backer.

"It might be gone, but it is also immortalised in Patricia Woods' artwork *Bright Night*, which will grace the Wynnum Road entry side of the station.

"Our crews and contractors did a stellar job of completing its removal safely and efficiently during recent planned track closures.

"It was time for an accessible upgrade, and so the new footbridge, complete with lifts, maintains the connection between the station platforms, Waminda Street and Wynnum Road at Morningside station.

"We thank our customers for their patience while the final accessibility improvements at Morningside station continue."
