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SAVE THE DATE FOR ADVENTUREFEST ON REDLANDS COAST!

FROM REDLAND CITY COUNCIL

Visitors to Redlands Coast will be able to choose their own adventures during the inaugural Redlands Coast AdventureFest being held over 10 days from 16 to 25 May 2025.

AdventureFest will be delivered by Redland City Council to showcase Redlands Coast as an adventure destination.

Mayor Jos Mitchell said activities would include Council-organised events along with city-wide activations, community events and offers from tourism operators.

"AdventureFest will be a wonderful showcase for our city as we aim to attract participants and spectators from across the country," the Mayor said.

"It will include active and outdoors events showcasing the bay, islands, mountains and conservation reserves, including the annual Straddie Salute Triathlon Festival, a tree climbing competition for arborists, trail run, mountain biking event and State hillclimbing championship.

"For those seeking more relaxed adventures there will be a water lantern festival, culinary tastings, art workshops, museum tours, feature talks, night sky viewing and guided walks exploring naturally wonderful Redlands Coast.

"There will be something for everyone, whether you're seeking events to get your heart racing, unleash your creativity, create family memories, immerse yourself in nature or indulge your tastebuds.

"This is a great opportunity for Council to position Redlands Coast as a nature-based and adventure destination."

The Mayor said Council's main event would be an AdventureFest Fun Day to be held at Raby Bay Harbour Park on Saturday 17 May.

"The Fun Day will be hosted by Ranger Stacey and promises a full day of adventure, entertainment and rides celebrating the festival's key themes: active, family, artistic, nature, culinary and wellness adventures.

"There are also events being held at Council libraries, Redland Performing Arts Centre, IndigiScapes and Redland Art Gallery."

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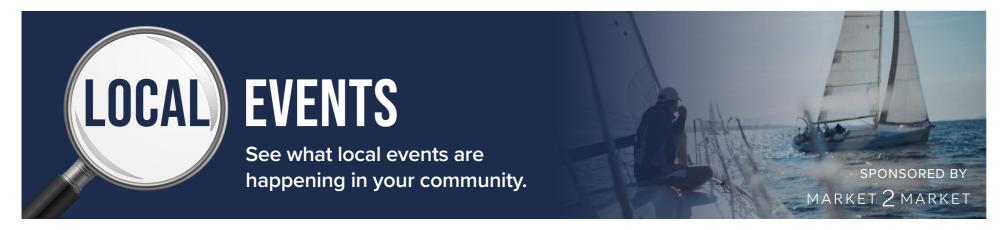

BAYVIEW BLAST TO ATTRACT KEEN MOUNTAIN BIKERS

Keen mountain bikers from across Queensland will converge on Bayview Conservation Park, Redland Bay, on Sunday, May 25, to race the Bayview Blast.

The annual Bayview Blast, run by RATS Cycling Club, was changed in 2024 to a single-day event, reflecting the increased demand on riders' time, and the increased supply of racing in the region.

"We found in 2024 that compacting the event to one day not only enabled families to enjoy the racing – for all ages – in a more efficient way, but it lessened the load on volunteers," RATS Cycling Club race director Keegan Barns said.

"This year, we'll be offering the same format: junior races, a 25km loop, and a 50km race, using a significant amount of Bayview's amazing singletrack.

"The event will include a burger and drink in the entry price, provided by the RATS Café."

Trails to be used have been published on the club's website, but there's always a possibility of change.

"Last year, we had to make a last-minute course adjustment due to the intense rain in the days leading up," Mr Barns said.

"This year, we're dealing with the cyclonic weather creating challenges with getting the course ready, and who knows what the next few months will bring. But a general guide to trails to be used is available on our website, and the course can be ridden using your own navigation as soon as the park is reopened."

The Bayview Blast offers racing for not just the top end of riders (the elites heading off to national and international competitions), but also to juniors, from those on balance bikes up to an 8km event for the older kids. There is a women's only race, for newcomers to the sport to feel more comfortable, and an e-bike category in the 25km race.

"Junior racing is a vital part of building the mountain biking community," RATS Cycling Club president Aaron Mackinlay said.

"Bayview Blast is an event that fits neatly into all four of our pillars – racing, advocacy, trailcare, social – as we work to grow the sport and improve the opportunities for riding in the region."

Bayview Blast is offered as part of the Redlands Coast AdventureFest.

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PHYSICAL THERAPY FOR ARTHRITIS IN DOGS

Arthritis is a common disease causing inflammation of the joints. The cartilages, which normally protect joints, break down, and the bones rub together — this is very painful and leads to limping,



stiffness, an inability to jump and difficulty climbing stairs.

Arthritis is a degenerative disease and is unfortunately not reversible. Your vet can help you to determine the most effective treatment plan for your pet – a combination of anti-inflammatory and pain-relieving medications, joint supplements and newer injectable medications that target nerve growth factors may be recommended. The inclusion of physical therapy may assist your dog to have an improved quality of life.

The goal of physical therapy is to strengthen

the muscles that support the damaged joints, improving joint mobility and range of motion, and promoting joint health to reduce pain and inflammation. Therapies include:

- Hands-on techniques massage, stretching
 of muscles and joint manipulation can be
 performed by trained veterinarians or animal
 physiotherapists. You may be able to learn
 some techniques to use at home to help keep
 your pet's muscles relaxed and improve the
 mobility of the joints.
- Therapeutic exercise regular, gentle exercise
 can be extremely beneficial for animals with
 arthritis. Exercise can help reduce weight
 gain which is essential in ensuring that
 degenerating joints are not overloaded. Lowimpact activities such as swimming, gentle
 leash walks and the use of an underwater
 treadmill are all useful forms of exercise.

- Cold and heat treatment an ice pack wrapped in a towel can help to reduce inflammation in joints after exercise, while a warm heat pack (again wrapped in a towel) can improve the flexibility of joints and can be utilised before exercise.
- Laser treatment, electrical stimulation and ultrasound treatment — these forms of treatment may be recommended and administered by a trained veterinarian or animal rehabilitation provider.

If your pet is suffering from arthritis have a consultation with your veterinarian to help formulate a treatment plan. There are a number of great pet rehabilitation providers in and around Brisbane who may be able to improve your pet's comfort — ask your vet for a referral.





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CLIMBERS WILL BE SWINGIN' IN THE TREETOPS AT CAPALABA THIS MONTH!

Since Cyclone Alfred's rampage through the region, many of us have needed the services of arborists – those gravity-defying tradies who seem as at home high in the branches as most of us do on terra firma. Redlanders will have the opportunity to witness trade-qualified arborists compete at international level in May as part of AdventureFest.

International tree climbing competitions showcase the skills needed to do the job safely and efficiently as well as providing professional arborists an opportunity to keep up-to-date with the latest innovations in techniques and equipment. The competitors supply their own climbing gear, which is checked to make sure it conforms with the standard.

"If you're an arborist you need to be fit and focussed," says Bec Dalton, Business Manager of the Queensland Arboricultural Association. "When you're up in a tree with a chainsaw, it can be quite dangerous, so you need to establish good teamwork and be able to communicate clearly. A lot of climbers these days have headsets that help overcome the noise of trucks and chainsaws. You also need to be able to tie reliable knots!"

Preliminary rounds require the individual arborists, male and female, to perform regular tasks related to tree care and more complicated undertakings, such as rescue work in a tree — and some bell-ringing and accurate wood-throwing. Competitors are judged on their ability to manoeuvre safely and accomplish the tasks professionally and in good time.

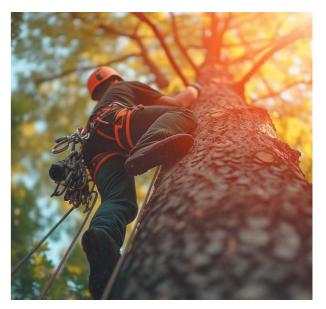
While the excitement and spectacle is in the climbing and pruning, Bec points out that arboriculture offers a range of career streams.

"As well as the climbing and pruning, you can follow the consultancy stream, which involves more tree risk assessment and plant health care, how best to deal with the tree, the science involved with trees' growth patterns, its nutrient needs and the requirements of the Australian Standards. Those studies can take you from a Level Three up to a Level Five. To make things easier for consumers who need an arborist the Association has an approved register of trade qualified members."

It's quite likely—and appropriate—that arborist climbing competitions will reach the level of public popularity that wood chopping contests have traditionally held for Australians; rumour has it that wood

chopping and tree climbing competitions have a shared history. And the crowds love them — so bring on the adrenalin!

The 2025 Asia Pacific Tree Climbing Championship (APTCC) will be held on May 23 – 25 at Capalaba Regional Park.

















LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT

THE RAINS ARE COMING! — MURRAYA PANICULATA

As I write this, the mock orange (Murraya paniculata) around me are in bloom, shedding dense white carpets of petals under more 'mature' trees and dotting hedges with fragrant white bursts on more maintained hedges. A friend once told me that when the murraya are in bloom, rain is coming. Well, they've been in bloom for over a week, and it is most definitely showery for the next few days so that could be true!*

Although listed as an environmental weed. M. paniculata, also known as orange jessamine/jasmine and commonly just 'murraya', is an all-time favourite hedge plant. Not to be confused with the 'other' mock orange (Philadelphus sp.), murraya is a member of the Rutaceae or citrus family - giving their simple white flowers that heady orange blossom scent.

They are hardy, fast growers with soft glossy green leaves and ideal as screening and hedging plants. Handily, keeping them regularly pruned also prevents the formation of the small red berries and seeds that birds devour and then poop through our bushland. Whilst they are a lovely plant, please do keep this in

mind, and protect our environment. There are sterile varieties on the market that are well worth looking out for if you are a lazy hedger, but if hedging is your thing though, you can also try the dwarf cultivar 'Mina-Min'. These have smaller leaves and make excellent topiary shapes or alternatives for small box hedges. All murrayas grow best in full sun but will tolerate partial shade - they just get a bit leggy, and it's harder to keep them dense.

M. paniculata has been shown to have a host of different medicinal properties and is reported to have been used to treat a variety of ailments, from diarrhea to snake bites. My guess is that it's not high enough in said properties to be of much use because reports seem to be restricted to scientific papers and claims of 'traditional use'. I shall continue with gastro-stop and pressure bandages, thanks.

*A week later (because it took me a while to actually send in my article) it's POURING! It adds cred to the 'rain coming theory', I think!

A stage show in production has stumbled into a happy serendipity, where unexpected pieces click together. Raymond Noonan, who is directing Ray Lawler's Australian theatre classic *Summer of the Seventeenth Doll*, had asked a museum volunteer about photocopying a script and they got to chatting. On hearing the name of the production the volunteer, Judith Ryan, disclosed that she was familiar with the play.

Her late grandmother, actor Eve Wynne, was managing Magnolia Court, a Melbourne boarding house popular with visiting actors. Lawler, who was an emerging playwright and in the process of writing *Summer of the Seventeenth Doll*, was a regular visitor. He decided to enter the play in a competition and Eve, a mother hen for many of her residents, offered to type up the reams of handwritten script for him. The play was entered,

shared first prize and immediately went into production and touring, becoming an iconic contribution to Australian theatre.

Eve and Ray followed their individual careers but Ray, remembering Eve's organisational skills, hired her as a household manager when he was based in Copenhagen. He presented her with a first publication copy of the play with the inscription, "Dear Eve, without whose encouragement I feel there wouldn't have been any summer, or seventeenth doll either. Love and thanks, Ray."

Eve's career continued in Australia in TV series and commercials. Judith remembers the celebrity status that her grandmother retained.

"She was a beautiful woman, always immaculately dressed. We weren't allowed to sit on her lap for fear we'd leave finger marks on her beautiful clothes."

WILDFLOWERING BY DESIGN COMES TO REDLAND ART GALLERY



"When we do know our own flowers we find the love for them within us and very often the song to express it already in our poetry. And perhaps only then is there that aching desire to see them preserved from meaningless destruction." Kathleen McArthur 1953.

Kathleen McArthur and her contemporaries, poets Judith Wright and activist Oodgeroo Noonuccal, were three women who used their artistry to inspire a popular love for our native flowers and plants. *Wildflowering by Design* is a celebration of the ongoing work of artistic women in creating a consciousness of native flora through a wide range of media. The touring exhibition is supplemented by work from local artists in the region it visits. For the Redlands exhibition, local Redlands artists shared a RADF-supported four-day retreat on Canaipa (Russell Island) with the curators and exhibiting artists of the Wildflower/Women collective.

The pieces produced for the exhibition include printmaking, weaving, fabric, cyanotype, photo-media biochrome, tapestry, digital images, handmade ink, paper, natural fibres and dyes, stoneware, clay, modelling compound, earthenware, leather, metals, pencil and acrylic — a range nearly as wide as the selection of native flowers.

Tricia Dobson, an initiator of the retreat, says that the enthusiasm generated could see a local wildflower art exhibition being established in the future. Tricia chose to make a pottery piece for her contribution.

"The artists stretched and challenged themselves to do something special outside their usual practice. I hadn't done any pottery for many years, but I had made a vase- which I realised didn't look right without any flowers in it — so I made a bunch of pottery wildflowers. There were a lot of broken pieces in the process, and my five-year-old grandson remarked, 'Grandma, you're really not very good at making things, are you?' "

Tricia says that she loved the process of learning and observing flowers in the bush, creating individual pieces and collaborating on others. "We made a cyanotype together that was so big we had to make it on the side of the road – that got us some funny looks!

Sara Za Enback, from Sweden's Arctic Circle, says that it took her a while after coming to Queensland to even notice native Australian flowers.

"Unlike the stereotypical look of petals in a circle, which you come to expect, Australian wildflowers look so wonderfully different. My boyfriend - now my husband - bought me a bunch of Australian flowers and I thought they were very strange. It's nice now to be able to look with different eyes and actually see and appreciate the flowers that surround me - and I see them everywhere."

Sara had started a wildflower art project called *Island Whispers*, through an RPAC Passages development program, so *Wildflowering by Design* was a natural fit for her work. Sara wanted to push boundaries and try something new; recycled frames, canvases, and flower-patterned fabric appealed, with drawings of native flower images dominating the cultivated garden varieties.

"It was an experiment but it worked quite well – lots of layers, some of them hidden. My method is experiment, explore, play – when I try to control too much it doesn't work, I'm not trying for super-realistic images, I like the quirky stuff!"

Wildflowering by Design has 'quirky' by the truckload, and it's an inspirational collection of interpretations of our beautiful bush plants. See the exhibition at Redland Art Gallery until June 3.

One of these is a stronger circular economy, which will reduce the reliance on our finite natural resources and unlock more jobs in recycling.

It pays to be mindful that landfill sites have a range of impacts on our environment, from emitting harmful greenhouse gasses to putting waste materials in the ground that take a significant amount of time to break down.

Our society is also quickly running out of land to accommodate these facilities and the cost of their long-term maintenance after they close comes at a significant cost to local governments, and therefore the community.

A range of resources are available online to help you rethink your waste. This includes an A-Z Recycling Guide on Council's website, and the downloadable Recycle Mate app for your smartphone.

Council also has a flexible bin menu available that allows you to downsize your general waste bin or upgrade your recycling waste bin for a one-off establishment fee, helping you increase your recycling output.

Let's make that extra effort to reduce our waste and everyone will benefit.

SUPER DUPER DELICIOUSLY EASY CHICKEN PIE RECIPE

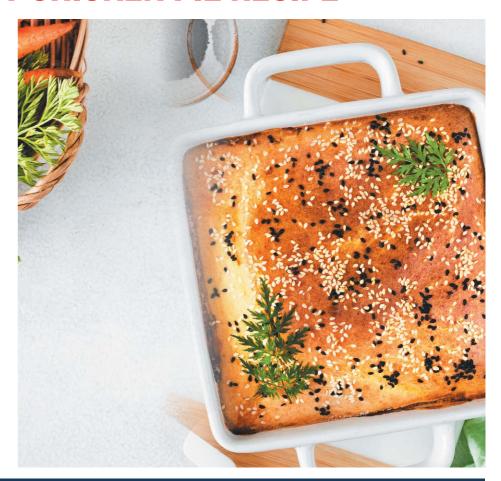
Here's an easy chicken pie recipe that makes a quick dinner when you're short on time, and need comfort food! Serves: 4-6

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups of cooked chicken (shredded or chopped; use a roast chook from the supermarket to save time)
- 1 cup frozen mixed vegetables (peas, corn, carrots)
- 1 can (420g) of condensed cream of chicken soup
- ½ cup full cream milk
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tsp dried herbs (thyme or parsley work well)
- 1 sheet of puff pastry (slightly thawed, but not soggy)
- 1 egg for egg wash

METHOD

- 1. Preheat your oven to 200°C (180°C fan-forced).
- 2. In a large bowl, combine chicken, frozen veggies, cream of chicken soup, milk, herbs, salt and pepper.
- 3. Spoon the mixture into a medium-sized baking or pie dish.
- 4. Lay the puff pastry over the top of the baking dish and trim the edges, then press gently around the edges with a fork to seal. Cut a small cross in the middle to let steam escape.
- 5. Beat the egg in a small bowl and brush it over the pastry. This will make it extra crispy and golden!
- 6. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until the pastry is puffed and golden brown.
- 7. Allow your pie to cool slightly, then dig in! Serve with a side of steamed veggies or a big green salad.

The whiting will be in good numbers in the Maroon Gutter into Maroon Hole and out the other side to Amity Banks. It won't be long until they return to the Rous

and the Chain Banks, while the Sand Hills and the Blue Hole should also have plenty. Also, in these areas where there are weed banks, the tiger squid will be fighting each other to get to the jigs. The cuttlefish and arrows will be starting to appear in the deeper water, and I'll bet there are some cuttlefish in the weed banks as well.

The sand crabs will be in plentiful supply, and you'll find some big muddies in the river outlets and Lazaret Gutter. The prawns should still be around for the net throwers.

School mackerel will be in the usual haunts from King Island all the way to the Hope Banks and across to Peel Island as the water clears. Tailor should start to show up throughout the bay this month as well, and the fishing for them should get better as the weather cools.

Long-tail tuna and bonito should also be showing up in the bay, and they'll soon be smashing the bait all over the place, so a spoon or a chrome slug should get you a couple (if you can get to them when they are feeding).

So, spit and polish the fishing gear because May is a good month to get a feed for the table. My friend Seb has been getting plenty of prawns, and it has been fun watching him get a good catch in the net - and they taste yummy!

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WHY MUMS NEED HUMAN CONNECTION FOR MOTHER'S DAY

As Mother's Day approaches, many of us will be thinking about the usual gestures – flowers, breakfast in bed, maybe a handmade card from the kids. But behind the celebrations lies a much deeper truth: many mums crave something far less tangible and more essential – human connection.

Kirsty Foster, founder of Social Mums Club, believes this time of year is the perfect reminder to put connection back on the table. "We're wired to connect," she says. "Just like we need food and water, we need to feel a sense of belonging."

It's a simple truth backed by science. In fact, the long-running Harvard Study of Adult Development found that close relationships — not money or fame — are the biggest predictor of long-term happiness and health. And yet, despite being more digitally 'connected' than ever, many mums report feeling lonelier than ever before.

Foster says this growing loneliness, particularly among women and mothers, is a quiet crisis. "We're juggling work, home, and family, often in isolation," she explains. "Working from home, busy schedules and modern life have all chipped away at the natural community interactions we used to rely on."

The result? More stress, less sleep, and a sense of disconnection that affects both mental and physical health. Research shows that in-person connection reduces anxiety, improves sleep, lowers blood pressure, and even supports heart health.

That's where Social Mums Club comes in. Started in Wynnum in 2020, the club has grown into a vibrant community connecting over 21,000 mums across Brisbane through local meetups and events. From coffee catch-ups, social dinners and walking and running groups, the club helps women rebuild the social support that modern life often takes away.

This May, in celebration of Mother's Day, the club is going even further by hosting an extra 10 events as part of their *Mother's Day May* initiative.

"We know mums are built to put everyone else first," says Foster. "But this month, we want to encourage them to prioritise their wellbeing too — starting with connection."

So maybe this year, the most meaningful Mother's Day gift isn't a bouquet of flowers - it's something much simpler: shared time, a friendly chat, a walk with a neighbour. The kind of connection that fills the heart, not just the calendar.

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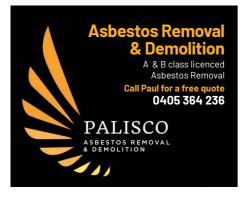
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LOCAL PERSONALITY PROFILE: JONATHON WELCH

PROPHET SONG BY PAUL LYNCH

WHAT THE EXPERTS SAID:

"This 2023 Booker winner is 'A fearless portrait of a society on the brink as a mother faces a terrible choice'.

"On a dark, wet evening in Dublin, scientist and mother-of-four Eilish Stack answers her front door to find the GNSB on her step. Two officers from Ireland's newly formed secret police are here to interrogate her husband, a trade unionist.

"Ireland is falling apart. The country is in the grip of a government turning towards tyranny and Eilish can only watch helplessly as the world she knew disappears. When first her husband and then her eldest son vanish, Eilish finds herself caught within the nightmare logic of a collapsing society.

"How far will she go to save her family? And what – or who – is she willing to leave behind?

"Exhilarating, terrifying and propulsive, Prophet Song is a work of breathtaking originality, offering a devastating vision of a country at war and a deeply human portrait of a mother's fight to hold her family together." (goodreads.com)

MY THOUGHTS:

While set in Ireland, this story could be set anywhere, and in fact could be unfolding right now in one of several places where extremist views and political parties seem to be gaining the upper hand. And it wouldn't be the first time – human history is evidence that this scenario is a real possibility.

As the adage goes, 'Power corrupts, and absolute power corrupts absolutely'. In this story, a newly elected party introduced a law it justified on the basis of the need to 'restore security' – the Emergency Powers Act. It then proceeded to

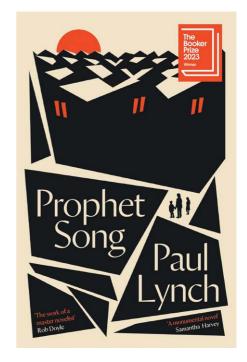
dismantle the laws and protections inherent in the fabric of society.

"If you change ownership of the institutions you can change ownership of the facts, you can alter the structure of belief, of what is agreed upon ... that is what they are doing."

My quandary was with the main character Eilish, with whom I could sympathise, but whose reactions to unfolding events I found exasperating. It's interesting to reflect on what choices we may each make in similar circumstances — though I hope we never encounter them!

The narrative is woven with a deep sense of foreboding, of threat, of fear and disintegration. As such, I found it gripping.

It is also strangely constructed with a lack of punctuation and paragraphs, making it a little harder to follow conversations and thoughts —



which one reader I know found very frustrating.

This is not an uplifting book! But it is hard to put down, and unforgettable long after you've finished it. I'd recommend it.

CREATIVITY-DIVERSITY EXHIBITION SHOWCASES TRANSFORMED TEXTILES

Textiles perform an amazing variety of functions in our lives; we use them to wear, decorate our homes, protect ourselves and our belongings, communicate our status and affluence, fabric powered the sailing ships that opened the world to explorers – its uses and its potential as a creative art form are vast.

An inspiring exhibition of textile-based hand-crafted art is on display at the Redlands Coast Museum until 6 June 2025. *Creativity-Diversity* is a presentation by 15 members of the Queensland Branch of ATASDA (The Australian Textile Art and Surface Design Association), displaying their talents in embroidery, collage, upcycling, felting, patchwork, mixed media, surface design, stitching, lettering, stencilling, eco-dyeing and fabric manipulation.

Kathryn lliff, President of ATASDA's Queensland branch, says that textile work is a pleasingly tactile art form that many artists are drawn to through sewing, knitting and crochet skills learned as a child.

"They rediscover their practical skills as an art form rather than a function," she says. "Even darning and patching have progressed from classic women's work – make and mend – to become recognised art forms. There's even an international online group for swapping clothes patches between group members."

Kathryn says artists have different ways of working; some plan carefully and journal the piece's design and development and some just envisage a project and go for it. "That's my favourite way of working," she says. "The result isn't always exactly as I'd envisaged it, but it's an art piece; I can't control it too much."

In some places, textile art has also functioned as a form of activism and social comment, reminiscent of the HIV memorial patchwork quilts of the 1980s.

"Women's craft groups in New South Wales create artworks on cleaning cloths that address women's equality and societal roles – they call it 'craftivism'," Kathryn says. "There's also a woman in America who has a project of embroidering ladies' handkerchiefs with Trumpisms. It's called *Tiny Pricks*."

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RISKS OF RETIREMENT

Making the decision to plunge into retirement can be nerve-wracking. It's a weird idea. After spending 40 years (or sometimes longer) working and earning money to support a life, to step away and need to draw your income from your own savings and investments or from a social security benefit might sound scary. Like all major decisions, there are risks, and there are ways to deal with those risks.

Here are some common concerns that I've heard from clients over the years.

1. Market risk. For many Australians, superannuation is the biggest asset they will own through their lives, with the exception of the family home. Most superannuation interests in retirement are held through assets that are to some degree linked to the markets. When there is volatility in share markets (in particular), retirees get nervous about whether they can afford to recover from a reduction in the value of their assets.

What you can do: Take a long-term view of your investments, diversify, and speak with a financial planner to make sure that your investments are appropriate to both your retirement goals and your

investment attitudes.

2. Legislative risk. It takes a significant length of time to prepare for retirement. This requires looking at income and expenditure, finding surplus savings, allocating them to the right investments to grow and accumulate and, holding nerve through volatile market periods. Ultimately though, it takes placing a degree of trust in regulatory bodies to hold some in their rules. For example, superannuation is very tax effective. Using this vehicle as a long-term retirement investment means trusting that it will remain a tax effective vehicle when it's time to retire.

What you can do: Stay aware of changes that are announced to the relevant tax and superannuation rules, and keep a flexible mindset, or use the services of a financial planner who will consider not just the regulations, but what actions should be taken to deal with them.

3. Longevity risk. Australians are living longer. The latest Intergenerational Report (published in 2023) notes that while average life expectancies in 2022-2023 are 81.3 for men and 85.2 for women, they are expected to increase by 2062-2063 to be 87 for men and 89.5 for women. This has huge

implications for how to plan a retirement. More years lived in full health and more years lived in ill health, means money needs to last longer. It also presents an additional risk to planned legacy or inheritances.

What you can do: Consider what it costs (on average) to achieve a "comfortable" lifestyle and use this when planning out retirement finances, consider the use of lifetime income accounts that guarantee income while offsetting market risk, and consider using a financial adviser to assist in assessing the best strategy to help you achieve this.

4. Left field (unexpected) risks. Life will occasionally bowl you a googly. Despite your carefully laid plans, the unexpected — such as a medical event — could throw carefully laid retirement plans into turmoil. This could impact more than one household. For example, a retirement could be thrown off the rails if an adult child suffered a severe illness or accident and was left with no alternative but to move back into a retired parent's home.

What you can do: Make sure your plans aren't left too lean (allow for some "emergency" funds) and talk to children about important financial matters like savings and personal insurances. If you're

unsure how to go about thinking through some of these problems, a financial adviser is again well placed to assist. Consider including children in these conversations sooner rather than later.

These are just a few of the areas that need consideration when planning your retirement. There are others that will be of greater or lesser importance depending on personal preferences and circumstances (such as legacy preferences or future intergenerational wealth transfers).

One of the advantages of financial planning is to have a trained professional assist you in understanding not just each individual area of advice, but also how they fit together to help you achieve your goals. Regardless of where the starting point is, planning earlier will lead to more options, and a better overall outcome.

WHY YOU SHOULD NOT PAY A REAL ESTATE AGENT UPFRONT BEFORE THEY SELL YOUR PROPERTY!

In my 30+ years in the real estate industry, I've always believed that the key to success lies in honesty, transparency, and putting the interests of Tidbold's clients first. Be mindful that you are not duped into agreeing to pay for advertising costs if your home does not sell.

BEFORE YOU SIGN ANYTHING!, check that document thoroughly. Make sure there is no sneaky clause that says something like: "If your home does not sell, you are still liable to pay us advertising and marketing costs."

You hire an agent with one purpose in mind - to get your property sold. No result by the agent should equal no cost payable by you, the seller. And that must be non-negotiable. The agent may pitch to you how much advertising they did on your property, and you should let

You should not pay hundreds or thousands of dollars up front, to then see your home not sold, while the agent receives lots of free promotion at your expense.
