REDLAND BAY DADS' GROUP HELPS GET THE BEST OUT OF FATHERING

"When we had our first child, my wife had the option of joining several mothers' groups, and I was left wondering – where are the fathers' groups in the Redlands? There weren't any, so I hunted around, got in touch with Dads Group, had a chat, and started a local group."

Samuel Hallett's initiative now sees a small group of fathers of young children gathering every week in a local park to hang out with their children and with each other, offering mutual support and advice.

"There are just a few of us so far, pretty committed dads already," says Samuel, "but we're expecting the numbers to grow as the word gets around."

The group has proved invaluable for sharing experiences of parenting, passing on handy hints and reassuring individual fathers that they're not the only ones facing challenges. Just socialising and talking with an informal peer group has its benefits.

"Sometimes conversations serve to confirm that you're doing the right thing anyway," Samuel says. "That's really supportive when you're feeling a bit overwhelmed by it all. It can be basic stuff like how to settle a baby, dealing with sleep issues, or tantrums.

"We've just had our second baby and I've turned for advice to dads of two children on how best to deal with the situation — we can tap into each other's wisdom."

The kiddles also benefit; socialising with other children is a definite plus, and seeing a group of dads cooperating provides an excellent role model.

"Just playing with your kids and observing how other dads play with theirs is really helpful," Samuel says.

The dads' group provides mums a break from childcare and also helps share the load of decision making and information gathering; dads can turn to each other for advice rather than depending almost entirely on their partners.

An unexpected benefit is the ripple effect into the mothers' networks. Being local, both dads' and mums' groups tend to use the same parks and playgrounds, which means that kiddies on an outing with mum are likely to meet friends they've made in the dads' group outings.

REDLAND HOSPITAL RESEARCH PROJECT WINS UK PUBLIC HEALTH AWARD

A research project developed at Redland Hospital has been recognised internationally, winning the 2025 Sir John Brotherston Prize from the UK's Faculty of Public Health.

The study, led by Dr Akshay Pabary in partnership with Dr Rachel Brimelow, explored cultural capability among overseas-trained doctors, following completion of an interactive e-learning module.

Dr Akshay Pabary said the win came as a welcome surprise. "I wasn't expecting it, so I'm thrilled," he said. "A large reason for my successful application to public health training was this very research project."

Dr Pabary undertook the pilot study while working as a Senior House Officer at Redland Hospital.

"My motivation for this study stemmed from my own personal experiences as a doctor, where I witnessed the challenges First Peoples often faced in accessing culturally safe care," Dr Pabary said.

"It highlighted how overseas-trained doctors, like myself, may be less familiar with the cultural practices and clinical needs of First Peoples. This really inspired me to work towards strengthening cultural understanding and ultimately improving the delivery of safe and effective care to a vulnerable demographic.

"I'm incredibly grateful for the help and guidance I received from the research team at Redland Hospital.

"This project would not have been possible without the continual support and encouragement of my supervisors, Dr Kirsten Strudwick and Dr Rachel Brimelow."

Dr Akshay has since returned to the UK and will begin an academic public health training program in Newcastle.

"The research has given me the confidence to pursue further research in a formal role at Newcastle University," he said.

"Ultimately, it has played a major part in helping me secure a place in a competitive academic public health training program."

The Faculty of Public Health has recognised his work as the best research essay submitted by a young graduate and has invited Dr Pabary to its annual awards ceremony in June.

Metro South Health's A/Executive Director of Research, Dr Salih Salih, said Bayside Health Service encouraged Senior Medical Officers (SMOs) to engage in research during their time with the service.

"Research can be an incredibly attractive and rewarding part of the journey for overseas-trained doctors," Dr Salih said.

"It builds critical thinking skills, strengthens cultural capability and contributes to better patient care.

"We encourage all SMOs training at Bayside Health Service to consider undertaking research projects while they're here."

A DIFFERENT VIEW: JUNE EXHIBITION AT OLD SCHOOLHOUSE GALLERY

FROM THE OLD SCHOOLHOUSE GALLERY

The Old SchoolHouse Gallery is excited to announce its June exhibition, A Different View.

Artists Caroline Ness and Christine Earthrowl, with invited special quest Nicole Speakman, have interpreted this theme through watercolours and clay. A different view could include a different perspective, viewpoint, standpoint, angle or interpretation of a chosen topic.

Caroline was inspired on a visit to Portugal last year by the clear light and colour, and when wildfire smoke enveloped Oporto, she retired to her room to tackle the legendary Portuguese chickens from some quick photos. Back in Oz, Moreton Bay always has something new to see: the birds on the maritime markers can be relied on to produce interesting subjects, not to mention curious birds further afield. Skies, water and clouds are constant sources of inspiration, and people occasionally pop into view as well. Caroline feels watercolour gives her a great deal of freedom.

Christine tried to look at things from a different viewpoint whether it is a group of tiny finches spread up a dead tree trunk - who ends up at the top and what can they see - or the curve of a wave or the

changed view from Golden Beach where the tip of Bribie no longer is visible. Watercolour is also Christine's preferred medium to explore this intriguing topic.

Guest artist Nicole Speakman previously owned and managed a busy law firm in Manly with her husband for many years. She now enjoys quiet space at her home studio where the beauty of her local bayside area provides endless inspiration for her craft.

In 2012. Nicole was drawn to ceramics and enrolled in various courses absorbing all things clay. At present, she's keen to explore and achieve soft, gentle, curved formations adorned with sprigs. She loves the movement both in the glazes and clay forms of her pieces. This natural flow extends into her current body of work as she draws inspiration from natural objects, including coral and flora, found close

Nicole's work will add a gentle yet striking contribution to any collection, including this exhibition. Each piece is created with her ethos of unstructured soft lines, enhanced by wondrous use of hues to give it life.


RESPONSIBLE DOG WALKING — KEEPING US ALL SAFE

BY DR NICKY THOMAS, WYNNUM MANLY VETERINARY HOSPITAL

There have been some recent changes to Queensland dog laws to reduce the incidence of dog attacks. People who fail to control their dogs in public places face on-the-spot fines of \$806, while more serious attacks may result in custodial sentences (according to the Queensland government website).

APPROPRIATE RESTRAINT

Dogs should be walked on a properly fitted lead or harness by someone who can physically control them. The use of a head collar, such as a Halti or Gentle Leader, can help provide better control of strong and excitable dogs. Keep your



Only allow your dog off lead in areas designated for this purpose and ONLY if they respond to voice commands.

TRAINING IS ESSENTIAL

Good manners start in puppyhood with a dog's socialisation period falling between three and 17 weeks of age. Puppy pre-school is a great start, along with exposing your dog to different situations at a young age.

Obedience training is essential to ensure your dog is safe around others. Commands such as "leave" and "let's go" are useful to help keep your pet focused while walking.

Recall is a vitally important command to master. If your pet cannot be recalled with a voice command, they should not be off lead.





KNOW YOUR PET AND BE ALERT

Keep your eyes and ears open when walking your dog. Watch for other dogs, people, traffic, cyclists/skateboarders/scooter riders. Monitor your dog for signs of fear and aggression, and be prepared to remove them from the area before their fight or flight response is triggered.

Signs of anxiety, including lip licking, pulling ears back, yawning, tucked tail, lunging, growling or excessive barking, should prompt you to remove your dog from triggering situations.

If your dog is fearful or aggressive, it may be beneficial to seek areas to exercise where there are fewer dogs and people.

Let's all work together to keep our area a safe place to enjoy for all of the pets and people who live here.



LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT

CASSAVA — SHADY, EDIBLE AND EASY!

Are you looking for a plant that gives fast shade, is edible, is (relatively) easy to remove when you're done and easy to start again? Cassava is the plant for you.

Cassava, Manihot esculenta, is a quick-growing tropical woody shrub that produces starchy roots, a staple carbohydrate across many island countries. It's a member of the Euphorbiaceae family, which contains all sorts of poisonous plants — and really, who decides that this is the poisonous plant that will be great if we cook it? But it is so easy to grow, even in drought and poor soils; it's no wonder it has become so popular.

The tubers are eaten boiled, fried as crips (obviously my favourite) or made into flour; it is also what's used to make tapioca! The leaves are edible, but (like the roots) must be cooked first to remove the cyanogenic toxins. I must say that although I've cooked the roots before, that does put me off the leaves...I'm told they're quite good, though.

Whilst I do occasionally rip my plant up and harvest roots (mainly to shave with a peeler and deep fry), I love my cassava tree because

it shades the front of our north-facing house, and when in flower, it attracts nectar-loving birds who peck from the not-particularly-noticeable-but-actually-very-pretty flowers. It grows fast but tends to send out long branches, which makes pruning easy if required. Just lop off a branch. If the whole thing gets a bit scrappy looking — which it can when it's a few years old — I chop it off at the bottom and dig it out, then unceremoniously strip the leaves off one of the branches and stab it (right way up!) into the soil, and voila, the process starts again.

If you do plan on growing cassava for the roots, just beware that once harvested, they will last a maximum of 24 hours before they start to turn black. To prevent this, chop them up straight away and freeze. You can par-boil first, but I've also been told you can just bung 'em straight in. Bigger is not necessarily better — roots that get too big are woody and dry, so don't leave your tree for five years and hope for a better crop. Restart often!

I don't often see cassava in nurseries, but it's usually easy to get hold of through permaculture groups or on Marketplace (or give me

a call!). It's another great option to keep you in food for the next pandemic, provide quick shade, or to give you something a little different to snack on next time you have the neighbours around for a drink!

JUNE 15 IS WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY

In an ideal society our elders, after a lifetime of contribution, should be entitled to spend their later years feeling valued, in safety and comfort. Sadly, for many over 60, the reverse is true. According to the World Health Organization, 1 in 6 people over the age of 60 experience some form of abuse each year.

June 15 marks World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, a time for communities around the world to come together and shed light on the mistreatment many older adults face – often behind closed doors.

Elder abuse can include physical harm, emotional distress, neglect, or financial exploitation. Cases of abuse often continue because the victim is afraid, isolated or dependent on the abuser and the only way of breaking the pattern is for someone — a family member, neighbour, caregiver or community member — to notice the warning signs and take action.

Unexplained injuries, withdrawal from social activities, poor hygiene, or sudden financial problems can be warning signs. If something doesn't seem right, it's okay to ask questions or reach out to local support services. It may be necessary to notify your local MP or contact the Police.

NEW APP AIMS TO DISCOVER THE NEXT GENERATION OF SPORTS STARS

The Queensland Academy of Sport (QAS), in conjunction with the State Government, has launched a world-leading Al-powered app to help discover our next sporting champions.

The YouFor2032 App, supported by a new partnership with RACQ, uses artificial intelligence and computer vision to assess the abilities of Queensland's aspiring athletes from the comfort of their own homes.

The app is the first known talent search technology in the world to include Para sports, ensuring athletes of all abilities will have the chance to be discovered.

Young Queenslanders aged 13 to 23 years for Olympic sports and 13 to 30 years for Para sports can now complete virtual tests through the app. Results are reviewed by the QAS YouFor2032 Talent Team.

Athletes who show strong potential will be invited to take part in face-to-face YouFor2032 testing sessions and may then have the opportunity to be put on a pathway to elite sport.

Minister for Sport and Racing and Minister for Olympic and Paralympic Games Tim Mander said the app is a gamechanger for young Queenslanders with big dreams.

"We want Brisbane 2032 to be our most successful Olympic and Paralympic Games ever, and that begins with identifying and supporting the next generation of talent," Minister Mander said.

"This world-leading app removes geographic barriers, giving every young Queenslander, no matter where they live, the chance to be discovered.

"It's also a terrific resource for the QAS Para Sport Unit, which launched earlier this year, to start finding athletes with a disability who have flown under the radar until now."

The YouFor2032 Talent Search has partnered with 17 sports to identify their future elite and para sport needs and maximise Queensland's potential success on the world stage.

The QAS has so far tested young athletes across 40 locations, including 26 regional centres from Warwick to Emerald, and the Gold Coast to Yarrabah.

More than 2000 athletes have been identified and progressed into the three-month trial phase, with 422 invited to a 12-month targeted development program and 40 selected for high-performance state or national programs.

SEVENTEEN SUMMERS – SEVENTEEN DOLLS

Two canecutters from Queensland on their annual five-month layoff; two women in Melbourne waiting for them to arrive; the girl next door who's been entwined in their lives since she was a child, and the crotchety mother of one of the women, who runs a boarding house. A seventeen-year tradition.

But this year, some things are different. One woman has married, and her replacement doesn't have the same free-wheeling approach to life. The girl next door has grown into a young woman, and there's another player down from the cane fields, a young fellow who's making his mark. Two elements are little changed: the crotchety landlady and the annual gift to her daughter from her suitor — a frilled and spangled kewpie doll on a cane. Other changes have also been at work, subtle and unremarked.

Ray Lawler's iconic play, *Summer of the Seventeenth Doll*, was a ground-breaker that helped put Australian theatre on the global map. Theatre Redlands and the Redlands Coast Museum will present Lawler's masterpiece, directed by Ray Noonan, with Sunday matinee performances supplemented by a brief introductory talk by museum volunteer Judith Ryan, whose grandmother, actress Eve Wynn, knew and worked with Ray Lawler and typed up the original script of the Doll.

SOME OF THE NICEST PEOPLE WRITE HORROR...

Her mother reading to her as a child instilled a love of stories in author-editor Geneve Flynn.

"English was my favourite subject at high school, and I was always in trouble at home for reading at the table. I started writing when I was very young and I was a daydreamer; Mum would say that I'd forget my head if it weren't screwed on," she says.

Reading at the table included Greek mythology and the bible, both larded with generous serves of horror, and horror is the genre that Geneve excels at as a professional writer.

"Horror isn't so much a genre as a tone," she says. "In thrillers or crime stories, it's usually life or death stakes; in horror, you're looking beyond that to eternal damnation, a fate worse than death — horror can invoke a real sense of dread or terror.

"Horror is having a bit of a renaissance and it's a very broad church now, incorporating a lot of themes — gender and race issues, the intersection with science fiction, the moral question of whether we should be doing all that we can do with science, despite the outcome — it's gone beyond the slashers and the cheap thrills."

So, how does a budding writer find the genre that suits them? Geneve recommends reading everything.

"Read across a lot of different genres, find what resonates with you - you could be drawn naturally to a specific genre, but you

can learn from them all. Reading crime or thrillers will teach you about pacing and plotting. Reading romance will teach you about emotional tension, how to create different stories, characters and scenarios to engender joy and tension for readers when you know that what they're looking for is 'happily ever after' or 'happily ever after – for now'."

Geneve says that the old dictum of an instant-grab opening (remember "It was a dark and stormy night. Suddenly a shot rang out."?) still holds but the ending is just as important.

"Catchy openings are even more important now because our reading habits and our attention spans have changed," she says. "Writers can't take time to introduce the character through a very slow build-up; there has to be some hook, whether that's a question or a strong authorial voice. The opening is what will draw them in, but the ending is what they'll remember. You want something that will stay with the reader.

"Cliff hangers can run the risk of frustrating your reader; double endings can come across as a bit like cheating. Famous writers may get away with it, but as an unknown author, it's probably safer to resolve some of the main story questions."

Many of the questions will be resolved as Geneve, a multi-award-winning author and editor, shares the secrets of writing conflict and suspense in a free three-hour workshop at the Cleveland Library on 7 June. Bookings are required.

REDLANDS SPINNERS AND WEAVERS: WEAVING MAGIC IN THE REDLANDS

Spinning wheels have their own special magic; as the subject of softly rhythmic folk songs, in the Japanese folk story of the bird/ woman who spun silk from her own feathers and the spinning wheel that fulfilled the fate of the Sleeping Beauty. A more down-to-earth magic is enjoyed by the Redlands Spinners and Weavers; archivist Sandra Davis says that there's a real joy in creating yarn and garments using age-old techniques and tools.

"It's very satisfying to be involved in the whole process – if you have time for it," she says. "Some members not only spin the wool from rolags – sausage-like rolls of fibre – but also dye the wool before knitting or crocheting the yarn into garments. Many of us heckle and card the wool before spinning, and some of our past members even did their own shearing."

Sandra points out that there's an alternative to the wheel for spinning.

"The drop spindle is much slower, and while it's a simple process, it requires quite a deal of skill. It's essentially a circular disc on a spindle dropped from a cord, and the rotation twists the fibres of the yarn."

Sandra, enjoying free time afforded by retirement from teaching, was drawn into the group by a friend. It was love at first treadle. The group currently has 30 members, all women at present, though there have been male members in the past, and there's always a cohort of helpful husbands on call. As well as being a welcome visitor to schools and retirement villages, members support heritage events at Redlands Coast Museum and produce an annual Beanie Tree, which 'fruits' from June to August.



So, what does one need to successfully operate a spinning wheel?

"You need to be able to coordinate three things," Sandra says, "your feet, your hands and your mind. That can be quite a big ask for a beginner – but once you've got it, you don't lose it!"



- Supply of new listings has increased, and sales have also increased as we see a more balanced property market within Redland City suburbs.
- The median price is just over \$1 million dollars putting Redland City in the top suburbs of Brisbane for growth over the past two years.
- Buyer sentiment is one of caution now though, which has become evident in the way buyers approach making offers.
- Multiple offers are still common depending on the type of property and the supply of similar properties.
- Up-sizers are a welcome addition to the market, probably due to higher listing numbers and stable interest rates.
- Down-sizers on the other hand are still limited for options, with retirement style property and aged care homes being in short supply, or well out of reach financially for some local residents.
- Investors, both local and interstate, are looking for good properties with good returns.
- Developer buyers are in high numbers looking for good deals.

3 Tactics Standard Agents Use That You Need to Know and Avoid

Excess upfront expenses to home sellers

Agents want a 'motivated seller'. One of the most common and easiest ways for agents to get the seller motivated is have the seller spend huge amounts of money upfront. Print advertising, social media, expensive internet advertising, renovations on the house, stylists, move the tenants out, video tours, you name it. Agents will recommend these things, provided the seller is paying. This way the seller is financially invested. One local agent recently told a colleague, "The seller needs some skin in the game, and then it will be an easier sell".

Solution – Tell the agent at the outset that you will only pay for the marketing at settlement. If the property does not sell for any reason, or you remove it from market, the agent wears the expenses. Suddenly, the agent may produce an economical campaign that gets the job done just as effectively, with less financial risk to you.

Overquoting to sellers

Real estate agents have been overquoting the expected sale price in order to win listings since the beginning of time. In a rising market, overquoting does minimal damage to the seller, as the buoyant conditions patch the gap between the agent's quote and the true market price. In a falling market, the gap between the agent's quote and the true market price can widen. Every percentage point the market declines is the seller's lost equity. Even in the current balanced market, agents are making outlandish price promises to secure a listing.

Solution – Select an agent on their selling strategy, not the price they quote. The right strategy will deliver the right price. Ask the agent to insert a clause into the agency agreement that the agent accepts a reduced commission or no commission if they fail to achieve the price they quoted you. Remember, you would not pay a tradesperson more than the quote after they finished the job.

Conditioning seller's price expectations

Conditioning is a tactic where the agent praises a home to gain the listing and then systematically bombards the owner with negative feedback to get the price down to market value, once listed on market. Owners are often shocked and disheartened to find their smiley positive agent is suddenly negative about everything from the size of the bedrooms, the renovation standard, the market conditions to the aircraft noise. Don't fall for it. Fire an agent that conditions you with systematic negative feedback.

 $\textbf{\textit{Solution}} - \text{Only sign short exclusive agency agreements. If the agent is conditioning you with manufactured negatives, fire them.}$

Creating fictitious buyers and/or offers during negotiations

another property which is the ultimate backfire on the agent.

There are increasing examples of agents telling interested buyers they have a strong offer at \$x and the seller is close to accepting it. 'You will need to beat that if you want to buy this home.' When the property fails to sell or sells for less than the buyers were told they needed to pay, the jig is up.

Buyers that fall for the 'there is another buyer at a higher price' tactic can find themselves bidding against a ghost buyer. believing they are in a competitive shoot out. This tactic is being slowly exposed, in different ways in different circumstances. Many buyers these days are just walking away and searching for

ONE POT SLOW-COOKED LAMB SHANKS RECIPE

Don't be fooled — this recipe's ingredients are few, but slow-cooking the lamb shanks in so much red wine gives this dish a robust flavour, creating a rich sauce that is absolutely delicious on a cold evening!

INGREDIENTS (SERVES 4)

- 4 large lamb shanks
- 1 x 700g jar of tomato passata
- 1 x 400g can of whole tomatoes
- 500ml of red wine use a bold version, like a cabernet sauvignon or merlot
- 4 cups of chicken stock

- · A large sprig of fresh rosemary
- 4 tbsp of tomato paste
- 3 cloves of garlic, crushed
- 2 tbsp of olive oil
- · Salt and black pepper to season
- Grated parmesan and parsley to garnish optional



METHOD

- 1. Preheat your oven to 150 °C (fan forced).
- 2. Generously sprinkle salt and pepper all over the lamb shanks.
- 3. In a heavy, oven-proof pot with a lid, heat the olive oil over a high heat.
- Add the lamb shanks to the pot, turning to brown all over.
 You may need to do this in batches, depending on the size of your pot.
- 5. Once the lamb is browned, add all the other ingredients to the pot. The liquid should cover the shanks (if not, add some water).
- Bring to a simmer. Once simmering, cover with the lid and turn off the heat.
- Pop the pot in the oven and cook for about 3 hours, or until the meat is tender and falling off the bone.
- 7. Remove the pot from the oven, then, using tongs, carefully take out the lamb shanks and keep them warm on a plate covered with tin foil.
- Put the pot with the sauce on the stovetop and simmer over a medium heat until it has thickened and reduced slightly – about 15 minutes.

- 9. Return the lamb shanks to the sauce, and they're ready to serve.
- 10. Once plated, garnish with grated parmesan and chopped fresh parslev.

Serve with mashed potatoes, creamy polenta, or cooked pasta.

TIPS: For best results, use a cast iron dutch oven, and don't skip the wine – it's essential!



LOCAL FISHING WITH SPERO

COLD MORNINGS, WARM DAYS — JUNE FISHING IS WORTH THE EARLY START

Well, the cold weather looks like it has arrived, with freezing mornings but glorious, warm days – and the fish are waiting to be caught!

Whiting are moving back towards the Chain Banks and the Darcy Light areas, but the bigger fish are still at Fisherman's Gutter (and they're not always easy to find), the Maroon Gutter and Hole. Amity Banks is also worth a look, especially in the shallows with a good run in the tide.

School mackerel will be in good numbers, but in particular, the babies should be in big numbers, and they normally infiltrate the bay this time of year. The bigger ones are harder to get, and the bonito and small tailor are not giving the bigger mackerel a chance. I've found floating pillies will help get a few bigger fish, especially around Ormiston and Wellington Point, and even between Green and King Islands.

Squire and snapper should also be in good numbers throughout the bay, with the spoiled grounds north of Harry's



artificial reef, Mt Cotton Reach and the Bay Islands drop-offs producing plenty of good fish.

You can also have plenty of fun with the cuttlefish in June. They taste great, and there will be plenty in the deeper water off Wellington Point (a tip: 30 Seconds cleaner from Bunnings is your best friend in removing black ink off the boat — it works instantly; spray and watch it disappear).

So, there are plenty of fish around in June, but rug up for the initial hit in the morning, and please be careful with small boats in winter – the westerly winds look calm going out, but remember on the way back, it gets very lumpy.







Winter is a wonderful time of year, especially when the sky is blue, the sun is shining, and the air is crisp. It's a fantastic time to get outdoors!

It's also the season to witness spectacular animal behaviours. June is the official start of whale season, and what better place to watch these magnificent migratory marine mammals than from Minjerribah, or North Stradbroke Island.

Around 40,000 humpback whales will cruise north past Redlands Coast from Antarctica to the warmer waters of the southern Great Barrier Reef to rest, play, and give birth.

Point Lookout is an excellent place to perch high on the grassy headland and watch whales breaching, tail slapping and spy hopping. In fact, it's one of the best land-based vantage points on the eastern coast of Australia. By around November, they're gone, as they embark on the long journey back to Antarctica.

I also recommend the Gorge Walk for the perfect bird's eye view to spot turtles, manta rays and dolphins.

Back on the mainland, life for our native animals continues as usual throughout the winter — except for reptiles, which literally chill out.

Winter is breeding season for echidnas. And while animal courtship in the wild comes in various forms, this egg-laying mammal or monotreme relies on patience and persistence. The mating ritual known as the echidna love train involves several males trailing behind a female, hoping to be the last man standing. At this time of year, these creatures will travel far and wide, in pursuit of some spikey romance.

Other animals like wallabies and possums are moving about the landscape too. Many Aussie species are nocturnal or crepuscular – by the way, crepuscular is one of my favourite words! It's a term used for animals that are active primarily at dawn and dusk.

Coincidentally, that's also when our roads are busy, and with low light and poor visibility in winter, it can be dangerous for wildlife. So please SLOW DOWN and be extra aware when driving.

Hopefully, this winter you can discover something magical in nature, like the humpback highway or an echidna love train.



TMR COMMENCES TRIAL OF NEW TECHNOLOGY TO TARGET TAILGATING

The Department of Transport and Main Roads has commenced a trial of new cutting-edge technology to discourage drivers following too close to the vehicle in front of them - also known as tailgating

When an instance of tailgating is detected, a variable message sign (VMS), installed in close proximity to the detection site, will provide real-time feedback to drivers and encourage them to follow at a safe distance

The VMS sign will alert drivers if they are 'Too Close' or if they're maintaining a 'Safe Gap' from the vehicle in front.

Drivers will not be penalised if they are indicated to have been tailgating by the new roadside Behaviour Awareness Monitoring (BAM) detection systems.

This Australian-first trial is designed to inform and educate Queensland drivers about tailgating, and to reduce dangerous driving on Queensland roads

The new system will operate in a similar way to the successful Slow for SAM system (Speed Awareness Monitors), which are currently used on the network to 'nudge' drivers to reduce their speed.

"Tailgating is a major contributor to road trauma in Queensland, being one of the main causes of rear end crashes," said Joanna Robinson, TMR General Manager (Land Transport Safety and Regulation).

"Motor Accident Insurance Commission data from 2023-2024 shows that rear-end crashes are the most common crash type in Queensland, comprising 50 per cent of all crashes in the Queensland Compulsory Third Party Scheme.

"This new technology will detect unsafe tailgating behaviour, and display a message to motorists in real-time on electronic message boards, similar to the Slow for SAM signs.

"This awareness and educational initiative is about encouraging safe driving behaviour, rather than focussing on enforcement. No infringements will be issued as a result of these monitors.

"The technology will be trialled at several sites across the state, and evaluated to determine if they have been effective in encouraging drivers to stop tailgating.'

Making the Most of End-Of-Financial-Year Opportunities

The 30th of June is fast approaching, meaning it's that time of year again to think about making the most of the current financial year arrangements. Here is a quick (non-exhaustive) list of items to think about and action where appropriate before the financial year closes out.

Superannuation contributions

Individuals have an annual cap of \$30,000 for concessional contributions to superannuation. The contributions that count towards this cap are the superannuation guarantee from employers, salary sacrificed (pre-tax) contributions, and personal contributions that are to be tax deducted. They are known as "concessional contributions" because these superannuation contributions are only taxed at 15%, which is often less than an individual's marginal rate of tax. If you're eligible, and if you have unused caps from previous five years, the Australian government allows you to catch up on your super contributions by adding in more than the annual limit.

Because the cap is calculated per financial year, it may be worthwhile to check how much you have already contributed, to decide whether any last minute contributions would be useful to grow super and control tax. This could also be useful if a capital gain was realised during the year, as a gain could increase your taxable income, resulting in a higher calculated tax obligation.

The second way to contribute to super is through a non-concessional contribution. The annual cap for this type of contribution is \$120,000

per annum, and these are contributions that cannot be used to directly modify taxable income (that is, through claiming a tax deduction). If certain requirements are met, you may be able to use the three-year bring forward rule and contribute more in a single year. Most often the benefit that arises from this type of contribution is to shift funds available for investment into superannuation, which is a low tax investment environment for many people, to boost retirement savings.

Low and middle income earners making a non-concessional contribution may be eligible to receive a government co-contribution of up to \$500. Another specific benefit can be gleaned from making a contribution to a low-income earning spouse's superannuation account. Spouse contributions count towards the receiving spouse's contribution cap, but can enable the contributor to claim a tax offset of 18% of the amount contributed (up to \$540). Income limits apply to both of these strategies, so check the finer details before moving ahead.

Deductible expenses

Tax deductions reduce taxable income before the applicable tax is calculated. For example, someone earning \$80,000 (sitting in the 30% marginal tax bracket), may pay \$1,000 for a work related subscription. Claiming this as a tax deduction reduces that individual's taxable income to \$79,000 and therefore reduces the tax calculated by \$300 (or \$30% of the \$1,000). If these expenses are incurred in June, rather than July, then the reduced taxation can be recorded in the current year's tax return, meaning a larger tax refund received sooner.¹

Asset Sales

The tax implications resulting from asset sales can depend heavily on the timing of the sale. The best laid plans can come undone by not considering the correct date associated with a sale. For example, an individual selling an investment property may plan on making a tax deductible superannuation contribution from the proceeds of the sale, which may also reduce the tax payable in that

financial year. It's important to consider however, that the contract date will determine when the sale is taxed (not the settlement date).
