## REDLANDS SUPPORT GROUP HELPS MEN TO NAVIGATE CANCER

Richard Tetley has confronted and overcome cancer three times — and he's turned his experience to a good cause, volunteering with the Redlands Men's Cancer Support Group as its publicity and welfare officer. A major part of his responsibility is speaking to men's community groups; as a self-confessed "people person" with 16 years of experience on air at radio Bay FM, he's the obvious choice for the role.

"A support group specifically for men is important," he says.

"Some of the issues with cancer are very personal and men aren't always comfortable speaking about their personal feelings. We don't offer medical advice or anything like that, but we offer support, no matter what cancer they're going through. If they come along to a meeting, they can share what their problem is - a problem shared is a problem halved, and there's bound to be someone in the group who's had a similar experience. Then they can get together, have a chat, and work on ways to get through it."

Richard says that a cancer diagnosis can trigger many complex emotional responses.

"Your first reaction when you're diagnosed is oh, well, that's it; will I survive? There's a sense of loss and fear of the unknown, and if it's prostate cancer, there's the possibility of erectile dysfunction. You grieve, but you don't have to grieve alone; you can grieve with your family, or you can come along to a group like ours and just have someone to talk to — and sometimes that's all you need."

Richard says that self-confidence can take a hammering, but that for him, having a sense of humour and his faith really helped.

"You have to believe in yourself and know that you're not alone; there's a support group that cares, they've been on that journey."

In helping the men, the group also takes some of the load off their partners, who are included in some of the social events like morning teas the group organises. The group sometimes sets up a stall in a shopping centre, complete with banners, leaflets, and friendly faces. The group is affiliated with the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia, and September is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month. Look out for a flashing blue light in a shopping mall near you!

## BRING OUT YOUR COLLECTABLES – DON'T BOTTLE THEM UP!

What is there about old bottles that is so fascinating? You can find out at the Antique Bottle and Collectables Association's annual fair in September.

"For many collectors, it's the history that they carry, particularly of a specific area," says Yvonne Taylor, secretary of the association. "Our members have bottles that are up to three hundred years old - oil, pickles, alcohol, and medicine bottles. Some of the colours in the glass are incredible.

"Pottery bottles are most likely to be old ginger beer bottles – one of them sold recently for \$36,000. They're very sought after, especially if they have a good imprint on them – or a thumbprint that will identify them as convict-made."

Yvonne, an ardent collector, has a collection of cemetery vases - floral-designed vases made to hold flowers on a grave. The floral decoration guaranteed that there would always be 'flowers' there, even when the real ones died.

In addition to the opportunity to buy and sell, the fair features an exhibition that's a judged competition for entries in any of the 87 different categories. For those who have a treasure of unknown value, there will be a valuer at the fair, as well as experts in specific types to help with classifications.

The term 'collectables' encompasses a wide range of articles, varying in age and provenance, including everything from pie funnels to money boxes, Avon figurines, shaving and smoking accessories, early plastic items, postage stamps, pot lids, and railway memorabilia, as well as model and real items. 'Garagenalia' refers to collectables related to motoring; enamel signs, petrol pumps, oil bottles, advertising and promotional material, and 'Kitchenalia' embraces appliances that many of us remember from our grandmother's kitchen.







"We have expanded our category list to include 'retro' because that's a category on its own now," says Yvonne. "There's also a fantasy/sci-fi category - Star Wars is in! - and one for promotional toys and collectables."

## REDLANDS ORCHID SOCIETY'S COLOURFUL LEGACY IN BLOOM

At 98 years old, Ugo Belligoi still brings quiet strength and wisdom to the Redlands Orchid Society – a group he helped found decades ago. Ugo remains an active member, and his life story is deeply entwined with the region's agricultural and community spirit.

Pictured is the Cleveland farm where Ugo and his family once cultivated small crops. During World War II, American servicemen would collect carrots from the Belligoi farm and deliver them to Archerfield Aerodrome, where they were flown across the Pacific to support troops. It's a legacy of service and resilience that continues today through Ugo's involvement in the orchid society.

The Redlands Orchid Society offers a vibrant calendar of events for anyone curious about the gentle art of growing orchids. From monthly meetings – held on the third Tuesday of each month and beginning with a welcoming beginner's class – to 12 educational and social Orchid Morning Teas, the

society fosters learning and connection. Members also enjoy two festive Christmas parties and two annual charity shows, all designed to bring orchid lovers together in a spirit of generosity and joy.

This year's Charity Orchid Show is set to be a highlight. On Saturday, October 11, 2025, from 8:30am to 3:00pm, the Birkdale Sports Club at Judy Holt Park will transform into a floral wonderland. Whether you're a seasoned grower or simply orchid-curious, the event promises expert advice, stunning displays, and a warm community atmosphere. 

## Mayor's message

Redlands Coast is ready to embrace spring. It's a fantastic time to get outside and enjoy our natural environment and all it has to offer.

Our catchments and waterways are a vital element and it's important to consider how we, and the flora and fauna that inhabit them, can co-exist and thrive. I was pleased at the recent announcement of a record \$30 million being allocated over two years for the Resilient Rivers (SEQ) program. This investment will help protect and improve the health of our waterways, wetlands and Moreton Bay, making them more resilient for generations to come.


For Redlands Coast, the program includes exciting projects such as improving a fish passage along Hilliards Creek in Ormiston, which will help fish migrate and improve habitats. There's also important revegetation and bank stabilisation work planned for Eprapah Creek in Victoria Point.

There are many local native plant species to admire. Eprapah wattle brings colour to our conservation areas



It is also breeding season for some of our local wildlife, so please keep an eye out for koalas, echidnas and other native animals that are more active this time of year.

Council is committed to working with landholders, local groups and the wider community to help protect and care for our unique natural spaces. I encourage you to contact Council if you would like information on any of our environmental education programs or pop into Redlands IndigiScapes, Council's environment and education centre, in Capalaba.

## High-tech help for our flying-foxes

Redland City Council is using a thermal-imaging drone to better protect flying-fox colonies across the Redlands Coast mainland.

The drone flies high above roosting sites and captures real-time data without disturbing the animals. It's made it much easier to accurately count flying-foxes in the roost, especially in areas with thick bushland or limited access.

This clever technology has boosted the accuracy of flyingfox counts by up to ninety-five per cent and can even detect other species like koalas. It's also proving handy during park maintenance and firebreak works, helping Council identify where the animals are and adjust plans to keep wildlife safe.

At Primrose Drive Wetlands in Thornlands, the drone helped monitor a large colony while nearby works were carried out, ensuring the flying-foxes stayed safe and undisturbed.

This new technology adds to Council's suite of conservation tools, which already includes koala Bluetooth tracking, digital mapping, and AI (artificial intelligence) trials demonstrating a strong commitment to protecting local wildlife and their habitats.













Breeding season is here, and Redlands Coast koalas are on the move. From now until December, you're more likely to see them as they search for mates, especially around local roads, parks and even in backyards.

Now is the perfect time to get involved in Redlands Coast Koala Watch. By reporting koala sightings, you will be helping Redland City Council and researchers better understand where koalas are, how they are moving, and what challenges they face.

Koala Watch has had a recent upgrade, making it even easier to take part. The new online form is quick and easy to complete, with no sign up or registration needed. Just visit the Koala Watch webpage and follow the prompts to report what you see.

You can also use the free Survey123 app, which automatically records your location to make your

sighting even more accurate. No special skills are needed, just a few minutes and a keen eye.

If you spot a koala that appears sick or injured, please call the Redlands 24-hour Wildlife Rescue Service on (07) 3833 4031 so it can receive prompt care.

You can also support local koalas by making your property safer. Check that fences and pools are wildlife friendly, keep pets secured at night, and give koalas space to move freely through your yard.

By staying alert and reporting what you see, you're playing an important part in protecting local koalas this season

# Turning the tide on litter in Redlands Coast waterways

Ever wondered where litter ends up after it hits the ground? A new Redland City Council project is shedding light on that journey using GPS tracked bottles to follow rubbish as it moves through our local waterways.

In June, nine tracked bottles were released at four sites: Tingalpa Creek, Eprapah Creek, Hilliards Creek, and the Torquay Road boat ramp. Tracked over 21 days, the bottles showed how litter travels through our catchments and into the bay.

The Litter Quest: Creek to Coast project is the first of its kind in Queensland and is helping Council understand where litter goes and how to stop it.



The findings will support local efforts to reduce marine debris and keep our waterways healthy.

Everyone can help. Picking up rubbish, washing your car on the grass, using fertiliser carefully, and properly disposing of leaves and aquarium waste all make a big difference.

Together, these small everyday actions can help keep Redlands Coast clean and beautiful for generations to come.



## Pitch in to protect our patch

Redland City Council has launched two new volunteer programs and is inviting locals who love the outdoors to get involved and give back to their environment.

Parkcare and Trailcare are hands-on programs that bring together like-minded people to help care for the parks, tracks and open spaces that make Redlands Coast such a great place to live. Whether you are a seasoned bushwalker, a passionate nature lover or simply want to contribute to your community, there is a place for you.

Already successful in other councils around Australia, these programs offer a practical and rewarding way to make a difference in your own backyard.

Council will provide the tools, equipment, training and insurance — you just bring your enthusiasm and willingness to help. Volunteers will support the care and upkeep of more than 175 kilometres of tracks and trails, and over 19,000 hectares of local parks and open space. Current sites include Bayview, Scribbly Gums, and Eastern Escarpment Conservation areas. Whether you can volunteer regularly or just every now and then, your time and energy will help protect and preserve the places we all enjoy.

## THE COST OF NOT USING TICK PREVENTION ALL YEAR ROUND

As we move into the warmer spring months in Brisbane, paralysis ticks become even more active, and the risk to our babies rises sharply. Just one tick can cause life-threatening paralysis, leading to emergency treatment and, tragically, in some cases, the loss of a beloved family member.

## STARFISH TRI ATHLETIC CLUB – MAKING A DIFFERENCE

In 2001, Ben Luscombe developed Starfish Tri Athletic Club, a swim/bike/run concept of training that focuses on participation, fun, and wellbeing.

"I used to be a triathlete myself, and I built the club around coaching that would create opportunities for everyone, regardless of their skill level or ability. All athletes deserve the same focus and support whether they're 'everyday' athletes or want to go on to high-level competition," Ben says. "We have group sessions, but each individual athlete is cared for."

Ben is certainly the right man in the right job; he was recently presented the AusTriathlon QLD Junior Coach of the Year 2024 - 2025 award.

"It's actually quite humbling to receive the award; I prefer to stay in the background and let the athletes be the best that they can be," he says.

The proof of the pudding is in the eating and Ben's approach bears fruit; six Starfish athletes have competed at the national championships, 32 athletes have made it to the state championships and this year, eight triathletes – aged from 16 to 45 – will be competing at the world championships in Wollongong in October.

Ben says that Starfish is registered with Qld. Athletics, which gives Starfish members the opportunity to compete all over Queensland. This provides the athletes more competition opportunities without having to join multiple clubs and pay multiple fees. He points out that

triathlon is an expensive sport, especially when competing at state and national levels.

"There's the cost of equipment, races, travel, uniforms, entry fees, and accommodation. We try to cover what costs we can to make the sport more accessible and affordable.

"Part of the club is funded by our swim club, a fully enclosed and heated learn-to-swim facility staffed by a team of qualified instructors. We provide a safe and encouraging environment for kids to learn how to overcome their fears, learn to swim, respect the water, and have lots of fun doing it. We've also opened a reduced-rate kindy program, complete with a pick-up bus."

A large part of Ben's success is probably due to his approach of creating a caring and supportive environment.

"A lot of our sessions have a mix of adults and kids," he says, "We've found it creates a good sense of competition and camaraderie and the adult athletes become unofficial mentors for the kids. We're like one big family.

"No matter what sporting group you have, I think it's important in society today to have these groups that help form friendships, where people support each other – it makes a much happier community."

## **NOT ALL HARD PLASTICS ARE CREATED EQUAL**

Recycling has become a routine part of daily life for many of us, but confusion still lingers around one common material: hard plastic. While it might seem like all rigid plastic should go in the recycling bin, that's not always the case. Understanding the difference between recyclable and non-recyclable hard plastics can help reduce contamination and improve the efficiency of recycling systems.

So, what can be recycled? Typically, the containers we use every day – milk bottles, cleaning spray bottles, detergent bottles, yoghurt tubs, meat and biscuit trays, and some takeout containers – can go in your kerbside yellow-lid recycling bin. These are made from plastic types that recycling facilities are equipped to process. They are durable, lightweight, and melt at predictable temperatures, making them suitable for re-use in manufacturing.

And what cannot be recycled? While plastic coat hangers, toys, storage bins, buckets, kitchenware (like Tupperware) and garden furniture may be sturdy and seem similar to recyclable hard plastics, they're made from a different type of plastic than what is accepted in the plastic recycling process where a milk bottle is turned into a milk bottle and a soft drink bottle is turned into a soft drink bottle.

To make recycling plastics work, remember this one simple rule: if it's a rigid plastic container that you have bought from the supermarket, containing a product that is edible or that you'll use to wash yourself or to clean your clothes or house, then it is highly likely it can be recycled.

Keeping the right types of plastic in the right bins helps reduce contamination levels, increasing recycling rates and keeping rubbish out of landfill.

The Marine Rescue crew provides the sale day muscle; transporting the books and setting up the tables to a design from retired architect Frank Way. They also run a very popular sausage sizzle featuring local produce from the Dunwich Butchery and bread rolls from local Dunwich Baker Martin Pie.


Richard says that most donations come from locals and holidaymakers.

## **WALTZING THE WILARRA AROUND AUSTRALIA**

David Milroy's *Waltzing the Wilarra* is set in a mixed-race dance club in post-World War II Perth, where locals escape everyday struggles for a brief moment. Elsa, one of the stolen generation, is the club singer, finding solace from a fractured relationship with her mother and her marriage to a veteran battling PTSD and alcoholism. Her husband's best friend Charlie is in love with her, and her half-sister Fay is in love with Charlie. Forty years on, the community gathers one last time before the club is demolished, and buried truths emerge.

Lorinda May Merrypor plays Elsa, and like her character, she loves to sing.

"It's the way I process things too," says Lorinda. "At the beginning I related to her being a singer. For act two, 40 years later, I play an 80-year-old woman. I'm 27, so how do I do that? I drew on my grandmother a lot — my Dad made voice recordings with her, and I used those and videos to study how she talks and walks."

Elsa has developed and changed – as characters do – since the tour took to the road.

"That's the amazing thing about acting; there's no final product, it's always changing and evolving — especially with a story as dramatic as this one, with so many relationships. I get to bounce off these incredible actors and feel everything brand new every night."



# LOCAL ARTIST DELVENE COCKATOO-COLLINS IS CREATING A LEGACY OF WEARABLE ART

Delvene Cockatoo-Collins was destined to create wearable art. Her mother, Evelyn, taught her to sew at 12, on a sewing machine bought 40 years ago.

Delvene spent her childhood on Minjerribah, walking with her mother and grandmother, always aware of the natural surroundings – rushes, shells, and plants later inspired her art. She moved off the Island in primary school.

"I missed everyone terribly, I missed the place. I'm so grateful that family stayed. I knew that eventually, one day, I'd go back."

Delvene returned to open a shop, sell hand-printed homewares, and exhibit on the mainland.

"Then I thought: I really should be wearing my prints, so I made a few simple box tops and wore one to a Redlands Chamber of Commerce event about seven years ago. I had the second one on display – it was a dusty pink with a design of eugarie shells – and Kim Richards, our State member, bought it – and still has it. She was the first customer of my garments – and she was a great model!

"I had a local seamstress run up batches of 'commercial' wearable art and they'd sell out so guickly that I was constantly disappointing people.

"I find screen printing a meditative process. Once I've decided the colours and process I can just switch off. Sometimes for bigger shows I outsource printing; to take a bit of pressure off."

Delvene's designs earned stage commissions, including *Capricorn, Dear Brother, and Dear Son.* 

"Stage costumes are a whole other scene – the costume has to work on stage and be durable enough for performances. I learned a lot from Natt Rayner, Queensland Theatre costume manager."

She designed the 2024–2025 Broncos' jerseys, a two-year commitment involving training visits, talks, and player island visits.

Delvene regards as "true art", the exhibition one-off runway garments made from flat, pearly quampie shells, rushes, cottontree, ochre, clay and seeds, referencing cultural resources.

"It's all sustainable," says Delvene. "Quampie are a food source on the Island and the shells are discards," she says; "I don't use freshwater reeds in my workshops as they're used by weavers. My dyes are natural made from banksia."

Delvene is home from World Expo in Japan and is heading to USA for her third trip with a company that brings groups to the Island.

She now has a shop in Brisbane CBD, and two seamstresses to cope with demand. "I'll give it 12 months, if it doesn't work, I'll go back to the Island. It's a calculated risk, yet the way I work!"

## LET WATTLE SHINE IN 2032: LOCAL PUSH TO BLOOM IN TIME FOR OLYMPICS

You can put it in a bottle, you can hold it in your hand. Thus goes the Monty Python's Flying Circus doggerel about a blossom known and loved by Australians – and perhaps no one loves it more than Mike Gilmour. Mike, president of the Queensland Wattle Association, is on a crusade to raise awareness of the wattle plant and encourage more local wattles to be planted in time to blossom for the 2032 Olympic Games.

"There are over a thousand species of wattle in Australia; varieties are found in every state and territory and in a really wide range of environments. It's said that there's a wattle tree blooming somewhere in Australia every month of the year," he says.

"The first wattle celebration was held in 1838 in Hobart; the story has it that people who turned up wearing a sprig of wattle were given a free beer and sandwich!"

Mike says that wattle's rise to floral authority was gradual.


"Wattle was included in our coat of arms in 1913, but it wasn't until Bob Hawke's prime ministership that Golden Wattle was declared Australia's national floral emblem. Green and gold were declared Australia's national colours, and National Wattle Day was established under Paul Keating's stewardship."

Indigenous Australians used wattle for food, tools, weapons, handles and medicine; seeds were roasted and eaten, or ground to make flour for baking, sap could be eaten, made into a drink or be used as a glue. White settlers were quick to appreciate the home-building potential of wattle-and-daub.

Wattles are quick to establish and spread, often unwelcome on farms because they encroach on cropland, but they're welcomed by native birds, insects, and mammalian insectivores for the food and shelter they provide.

"One thing we don't have here is a passion for our floral emblem," Mike says. "We're hoping that the councils and communities in South East Queensland will plant the local wattle varieties — Golden, Silver, Zigzag and Eprapah — so that they'll all be in blossom in time for the 2032 Olympics."

## THREE GENERATIONS, ONE DAY: HOW A REDLANDS FAMILY CELEBRATES FATHER'S DAY

Here, we've asked three generations of a Redlands family what Father's Day means to them.

Father's Day originated in the USA in 1910 and reached Australia by 1936. Explanations for the September date include a desire to avoid all the public holidays in the first half of the year, a celebration of spring, and the commercial consideration of spacing it out from Mother's Day and Christmas. Over the years, it has grown into a gift-giving extravaganza, but for three generations of one Redlands family, it still retains the original ethos of family and appreciation.

Bruce Smith remembers the day as being low-key during his childhood in the 1950s

"It wasn't a big deal; we were probably only aware of it because it was on the calendar. There was no TV, and we listened to the ABC on the radio, so if there were any ads, we didn't hear them. We didn't buy Dad a present, just a card from the newsagent - and he wasn't expected to do much on the day. I was in boarding school for secondary schooling, so we didn't even think about it; there were no societal or family expectations."

For Bruce, the strongest memory of Father's Day was the focus on what sort of man his father was.

"My father always seemed to be doing something for other people, and he'd often get me to help, so Father's Day came to symbolise the role model of what I thought a father should be; I hope I've set as good an example. A meaningful Father's Day for me is just having a family day, keeping it simple, and enjoying the experience."

For Laurence Smith, like his father, the concept of Father's Day is a broader brushstroke than the "one day" concept.

"I don't recall making too much of a fuss about Father's Day. There were stalls at school and we used to be smuggled a little bit of money clandestinely from Mum. We usually bought Dad liquorice allsorts - always gratefully accepted - and the standard card. For all that, I have a high regard for community - I'm less volunteeroriented and more family-oriented. It's awareness of the role of the

father that matters. Spending time together with Dad is important; you don't need just one day of the year for it."

Harrison, Laurence's nine-year-old son, has a beautifully uncomplicated - and generous - nine-year-old's take on Father's Day.

"Mum gives me money and I go to the shop in the school's music room and buy something for Dad. Last year, I got him a sort of car with a tyre for keeping paper clips in. For Dad and Poppy (Bruce), I make a card – I pick something out of my line drawing book. This year, I think I'll draw a picture of Dad in the middle. I haven't decided on his present yet – and I haven't decided yet what to cook him for

breakfast. The best thing to do on Father's Day is just hang out with my Dad. I love my Dad - he's the best Dad in the world."

So, has Father's Day changed? Laurence has the last word.

"I think it's easy to fall for the current commercialism of Father's Day – ad campaigns implying that you should cover dad's workshop wall with matching power tools because that's what dads want and expect - and you can pay \$12 for a basic Father's Day card. We're trying to resist the philosophy that all you need to show someone you care is a price tag. The most expensive thing you can give is what there's only a limited amount of: time."

## WHY SO BLUE?

Surely everyone has heard of superfood turmeric by now. It's the latest latte, capsule, powder, anti-inflammatory paste (with the added benefit of providing skin tone vibes that would fit a Simpson character), and, of course, curry ingredient. Curcuma longa comes in a variety of shades from yellow to orange and is eaten all over the world for its colour, flavour, and health benefits. But have you heard of black turmeric?

Black turmeric is a close relative of our common edible turmeric and (despite what the name suggests) is BRIGHT BLUE! The scientific name is Curcuma caesia. Caesia means bluish-grey, so I'm not really sure how black came into it, but regardless, the colour is outstanding. It grows in similar conditions to common turmeric, preferring warm, sheltered, part-shade locations in rich, moist soils. The long and broad, lance-shaped leaves have a very ornamental dark pink/purple stripe down the mid-rib (centre), and the flowers, or rather bracts, are a bit like a pinecone that is pinkish white with darker tips. The real flowers that peak out of each 'pinecone hole' are yellow, but they're a little bit insignificant.

Although the rhizome is technically edible, it is primarily used medicinally and has a very bitter taste. As a plant, black turmeric is an extremely lush ornamental plant that would make itself at home in a tropical garden. Be warned, though, it completely dies back over winter. This is when you can harvest the rhizome to use or split and spread around the garden (or simply marvel at the not-quite-natural-seeming colour!). When the weather finally warms up (I'm sure we're all ready for that now), the leaves appear first, sometimes hiding the flowers that come a little later, so keep an eye out. As a cut flower, they last well in a vase, and you aren't harming the plant by cutting them, so bring them inside where you can see them better!

On a side note, if you really love the flowers, why not try Cape York Lily (Curcuma australasica)? It's a native turmeric that sends its flowers up first and makes for a wonderful sub-tropical substitute for that spring-bulb impact.

I've been working on our current garden in subtropical Brisbane for the last six-plus years, but have been gardening for much, much longer in all sorts of places. I'm an ex-engineer, recently turned horticulturist (life's too short not to work in something you love!). I grow edibles and ornamentals in an often wild, rambling jungle, filled with birds and bugs, including a handful of pet chooks and a brand new puppy (who likes to chase said chickens, and is not averse to helping me dig a hole!).

Spring has sprung! This is the season when Mother Nature embraces the warmer weather and longer daylight hours. For many native species, spring sparks courtship and mating behaviours across a range of wild habitats, both terrestrial and aquatic.

On land and in trees, birds are creating cosy nests and marsupials like koalas are busy attracting a mate in preparation for the arrival of tiny offspring.

Redlands Coast is the gateway to magnificent Moreton Bay – pure paradise – and permanent home to schools of fish, pods of dolphins, herds of dugong, and turtles (which are mostly solitary).

At this time of year, the ocean beyond our naturally wonderful coastline transforms into Humpback Highway.

If you haven't watched whales frolicking off our coast this year, let me remind you, there's still time!

Magnificent southern humpback whales are currently cruising past, on their annual migration up and down Australia's east coast. From June until around November, an estimated 40,000 whales will make

the mammoth journey all the way from their feeding grounds in Antarctica to Queensland...and back again.

The Great Barrier Reef is the ultimate destination for breeding and calving, its warm tropical waters providing shelter for the whales. Mothers make the long journey back to where they were once born, to welcome a single calf.

Right on our doorstep, you'll find the ideal vantage point to watch whales breach, tail slap, and spyhop ... North Stradbroke Island, aka Straddie, aka Minjerribah.

High above the vivid blue ocean, Point Lookout is the perfect place on dry land to spot this natural phenomenon – forget about any risk of getting seasick!

Humpback whales are humongous, yet graceful. I'm constantly in awe of their aquatic acrobatics, tail flukes so unique that researchers use them to identify individuals, innate sense of navigation, as well as the use of complex underwater songs to communicate over long distances.

Aren't we lucky to be able to enjoy one of the best land-based whale

watching locations in the country? If you're yet to experience this natural wonder, go for it... and if you've done it before, do it again. It's always a giant thrill!

## HOLIDAY BOATIES URGED TO TAKE THE HELM ON LIFEJACKETS AND SPEEDING

Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ) is urging Queensland boaties to turn the tide these school holidays, after a worrying number of skippers were found flouting the rules on speeding and lifejacket requirements over Easter.

During the Easter break, more than one in three boats intercepted by MSQ's compliance officers were caught speeding, while one in four weren't complying with lifejacket laws, despite new lifejacket rules having been in effect since 1 December 2024.

Despite the cooler weather, thousands of Queensland families are expected to be out on the water over the school holidays, and MSQ is reminding skippers that there is a clear need for them to do better to ensure family fun does not turn into tragedy.

MSQ's data has consistently shown that most boating fatalities involve boaties who drown, or are never seen again, after falling overboard while not wearing lifejackets.

Over the five years between 2019/20 and 2023/24, 64 people drowned in boating accidents in Queensland. Only five were known to have been wearing lifejackets.

Following extensive consultation, MSQ introduced new laws from 1 December 2024 requiring that lifejackets be worn by all skippers and passengers operating vessels in certain high-risk situations.

Boaties were given a six-month period of adjustment to understand and comply with the new requirements before Maritime Safety Queensland began enforcing them from 1 July. Fines for noncompliance with lifejacket rules start at \$333.

MSQ is also reminding skippers that speeding is always dangerous, but is especially so during holiday seasons, when many more boaties are out on the water and waterways become congested.

Speeding reduces a skipper's ability to respond and adjust to developing or unexpected situations on the water and increases the chances of a marine incident occurring.

Queensland laws require that lifejackets must be worn when:

- Boating alone (or only with children under 12 years) on an open boat that is less than 4.8 metres in length whilst underway.
- Crossing a designated coastal bar on an open boat, or on an open area of a boat, of any length.
- Boating at night, that is between sunset and sunrise, on an open boat that is less than 4.8 metres in length whilst underway.
- If you are under 12 years (aged one year or more, but less than 12 years) in an open boat, or open area of a boat, of any length while underway.



Further, wearing a lifejacket is compulsory when crossing a coastal bar on certain craft in the style and risk profile of:

- · Small sailing boats (such as lasers, herons).
- · Pedal boats.
- · Rafts, including inflatable rafts.
- Rowboats (excluding Surf Life Saving Australia Club Surfboats).
- Sea and surf kayaks.



And many of those younger players now have a benchmark for success in their own club's Youth Academy. The future looks bright for the Doggies!







# STRESS, ANXIETY, AND ADRENAL HEALTH

Are you feeling irritable, nervous, and having trouble regulating your emotions? Is your brain busy, whirling thoughts around, or are you running on empty, experiencing energy slumps in the afternoons, or having trouble getting started in the morning? Or maybe you feel like you're always run-down, and just can't get back your 'zing'. If so, we need to have a chat about stress and anxiety.

### **CORTISOL AND STRESS**

When you hear 'stress hormones', the main hormone being referred to is cortisol. It's produced by the adrenal glands. When in rhythm, it is highest in the morning, which wakes us up and gives us a bit of pep, and then it peters out during the day, aligning with the natural rhythm of sleep, activity, and energy.

# SMOKED SALMON, ASPARAGUS, AND FETTA FRITTATA RECIPE

The weather's not too hot, not too cold – what to eat? This fantastic frittata makes a quick and easy meal for breakfast, lunch, or dinner, which is just as good eaten cold as it is warm.

### **INGREDIENTS** (SERVES 4 TO 6)

- 8 large eggs
- 100ml milk (or cream for richness)
- 4-5 asparagus spears, trimmed and chopped into 3cm pieces
- 100g smoked salmon, torn into strips
- 80g Danish-style fetta, crumbled
- · A handful of grated mozzarella cheese (freshly grated tastes better!)
- 1 spring onion, finely sliced
- · Salt and pepper, to taste
- Olive oil or butter, for greasing
- · Optional, but delicious: fresh dill or chives for garnish

### **METHOD**

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180°C (fan-forced). Grease a 20cm oven-safe frying pan (or a 30cm pan for a thinner frittata) or baking dish with butter or olive oil.
- 2. In a small frypan, sauté the asparagus until it's just tender (about 2 minutes). Set aside.
- 3. In a large bowl, whisk the eggs and the milk, then season with salt and pepper.
- 4. Stir in the sliced spring onion, cooked asparagus, the smoked salmon, and ¾ of the fetta.



- 5. Pour the mixture into the pan. Scatter remaining fetta and all the grated mozzarella on top.
- Bake for about 20 to 25 minutes until it's puffed, golden, and cooked in the middle the time this takes to cook
  through will depend on how deep your frittata dish/pan is. Let it rest for about 5 minutes before cutting and
  serving.
- 7. Top your frittata with fresh herbs, and serve with fresh crusty bread or a green leafy salad.



# LOCAL READERS A BOOK REVIEW: THE EASEMENT BY LOCAL AUTHOR LARAINE DILLON

After a career in journalism spanning more than half a century, much of that time as a newspaper and magazine editor and publisher, I believe that I am qualified to cast an opinion on the merits of literary manuscripts. And within the bounds of that background and experience I must confess that editing Laraine Dillon's *The Easement* gave me enormous satisfaction.

First-time authors seldom have the ability to immediately find their niche in the literary world. But Laraine has achieved this with *The Easement*. That she is able to develop her craft from the opening pages and expand it throughout the story is a remarkable achievement. It is a cleverly written work that held my interest from the moment I glanced through the opening pages to the last paragraph of the final chapter. I can't recall having become so absorbed in the betrayal of a book's characters.

Thankfully, I resisted the temptation to flick to the final chapter for the ending. The author has cleverly disguised the completely unexpected ending until the very last sentence. When I finished editing the penultimate chapter

I was convinced that Laraine had written herself into a corner because she had satiated all the angles. Not so; there is no anti-climax. The ultimate 'punch-line' is brilliantly conceived. So much so, that a sequel is inevitable.

Laraine appropriately describes the genre as "humorous fiction". The humour is subtle and cleverly interwoven with each character's indelible imprint on the story.

The Easement is a great story, relevant, totally believable and written with the technique of an established, experienced author.

# CHAI TIME AT CINNAMON GARDENS BY SHANKARI CHANDRAN

### WHAT THE EXPERTS SAID:

"Chai Time [Booker Prize winner 2023] is set in contemporary Australia, in a nurturing old-age nursing home in Sydney started by Sri Lankan Tamil refugees [Maya and Zhakir], but open to all. The novel keeps flashing back to Sri Lanka during the country's nearly four-decade civil war... it charts their twin traumas: racism in their adopted country after having fled persecution at home. But it also celebrates their resilience.

"It raises a host of penetrating questions ... Yet these questions emerge organically from an engrossing story peopled with vividly-drawn characters and told in elegant prose." (Frontline: Interview with Shankari Chandran).

### **MY THOUGHTS:**

I had been largely ignorant about the long-contested history of the first occupants of Sri Lanka, the atrocities committed against the Tamils, and their battle for recognition and independence (culminating in the civil war 1983-2009).

Parallels are drawn with the impact of Australian colonialisation on our First Nations people. In explaining to his seven-year-old son why he had removed a statue of Captain Cook from the nursing home, Zhakir explained, "I don't like him because he was a conqueror and a

coloniser...When he came here, he told a story about this country. His story erased the past and rewrote the future...".

Zakhir's act eventually became the excuse for an application to the Human Rights Commission by Gareth, rapidly disintegrating after the death of his young daughter and rupture of his marriage (and his contributions to those). This plot line is a bit farfetched, and quoting provisions from the Act unnecessary, but it provided a vehicle for discussing racism experienced by these immigrants (and others in real life) — a serious physical attack on Ruben, a kind and dedicated nursing home handyman, media fanning the fear and anger of white folk because the non-white immigrants 'are coming to take what's ours', and ultimately a deadly attack on the nursing home itself.

But there's more here than all the serious stuff.

My favourite characters were Maya and Ruben. The respect and love shown by Maya and her family to the residents of the nursing home, engendering a sense of community was refreshing — if I end up in a nursing home, I hope it will be like this one!

The irony is not lost on Maya that she is unable to get her first book published until she takes on a pseudonym - then she becomes a best-selling author whose lead character is an indomitable white Australian woman whom readers imagine as the author herself.

And I laughed with Maya. By now a resident herself, in competition with one of the other residents about the appropriate configuration of Hindu God figurines in a shrine — based on their own opinion of which deserved the most deference — they raced each day to get there first to arrange them so.

Ruben is an unfolding mystery. Committed and loyal, he helps staff and residents



alike — no task is too menial. And he is also fluent in 10 languages! Gradually, we learn more about his Sri Lankan background as well as solving other mysteries — what happened to Zhakir, and why Ruben has chosen to work at the nursing home despite his exceptional qualifications.

The weightiness of some subjects in the book is balanced by the colour, humour, and human kindness of others, making it a very readable and memorable book.

# SEPTEMBER IS THE HEIGHT OF WHALE SEASON ON MORETON BAY

I know this is a fishing column, but when the whales are in, and when you see the size of them as they go past your boat and you realise that the calf is as big as your little karavaki (small boat), it's pretty amazing! Seeing Mum being so protective is one of the best sights in the bay this time of year, and how lucky are we to see them just east of Green Island, Wellington Point, and around Peel Island? Looking at my past records, the next four weeks are when some whales will come in to rest in the bay before their long journey to the South Pole. So, if you get the chance during the school holidays, it's worth a look around the bay to see these magnificent mammals. To be honest, I love fishing, but seeing the whales so close in takes your breath away.

Fishing-wise, the school mackerel season should be on in earnest with fish all through the bay from close in at the last leads to harbour entrance through to King and Green Islands, all the way to Ormiston, and east to the Naval and Hope Banks. So, there's no excuse for not getting a good feed!



The whiting will be going strong in the Small Boat Channel, Rous, and the Sand Hills time of year, and there will be plenty of snapper and squire in the bay to keep us all happy. Try the shallows around the Bay Islands and artificial reefs. As for cuttlefish, the season has not been the best, and the same applies to arrow squid – very hit and miss. The last few weeks have seen the tiger squid in good supply around Green Island and Wellington Point.

Remember the laws regarding whales and dolphins in the bay. Keep a safe distance from them and don't approach them – just admire their beauty and grace.

# **How to Retire**

Every client I meet is chasing a different dream. A common desire is to never have to work again. It doesn't need to take a lotto win to make this happen, but it will take some planning, some thinking, and some time. Good thing too... as the chances of winning first division in Powerball are one in 134,490,400, and I'm interested in a bit more assurance for my client's financial future.

There are some common questions that need to be considered when thinking about retirement.

First of all – retirement age. This is the first question that requires some thought, because in Australia, there is actually no set age that determines retirement. Age-based eligibility for the Age Pension currently commences when a person reaches age 67, and Preservation Age (the age at which a person can access superannuation) is currently age 60. But Retirement Age should simply be when a person is no longer reliant upon working to meet their lifestyle expenses.

For some, this could be from 55 if they have investments or income outside of superannuation or 60 if they are planning to access their superannuation for regular income, but there is no hard and fast rule. I've come across individuals in the past who continue to work well into their 80s. Granted, they were owners of successful businesses that became multi-generational, and it allowed them to see their grandchildren every day as they became involved in the business, but it is still work. Keep in mind that the earlier one retires, the longer that retirement is likely to last.

Secondly – lifestyle expectations. Again, there is no hard-and-fast rule here. I've met people who said they needed a minimum \$150,000 per year to remain comfortable, and others who said all they needed was \$45,000 per year, a camp oven, and some stars overhead. To some degree, this will be influenced by the income you have been using leading up to your retirement. The best way to find out the expectation that is needed is to complete a budget exercise, but ignore the "income" side of it. Just concentrate on the estimated expenses of everyday life, plus an extra amount for luxuries or "wants". Things that come to mind may include holidays, travel, home renovations, car replacements, or experiences.

There are also plenty of resources that can help with this stage. For example, the Association of Superannuation Funds of Australia suggests that a comfortable lifestyle for a couple who own their home outright will cost an estimated \$73,875 per annum<sup>1</sup>. They also offer a detailed expenditure breakdown on their website for comparison or reference.

Next, looking at what resources are available to make the first part and the second part sing in perfect harmony. Or, at least march to the same beat. This is where financial advice becomes really useful, because funding retirement will come down to a large melting pot of complementary strategies. Will you be funding your own retirement through super? Will an early retiree continue to work part-time? Will someone downsize their family home? Is it important to be debtfree? What if superannuation rules change over time? Will it be

useful to use a guaranteed lifetime income product to meet basic expenditure needs?

Retirement isn't always a set-andforget situation. Life can throw a few curveballs, and it's worth considering how things like family dynamics, the longevity of your savings, your changing needs or those of your loved ones might

might affect your best-laid retirement plans. In some cases, these factors could even lead you to return to work, whether by choice or necessity.

There's no one-size-fits-all approach to retirement, and it's never too early to start planning. Taking the time to prepare and think things through can make a real difference down the track, helping you build a retirement that truly suits your needs and lifestyle.

# SHOULD YOU SELL FIRST OR BUY FIRST?

Whether to buy or sell first is one of the most common questions in real estate.

It's also one of the toughest to answer.

So, if you already own property, and are looking to sell and buy again, let's take a look at the pros and cons of the different scenarios.

### The case for buying first

Generally, the argument for buying first is that it gives you more control over the property you move into. That's because you're not under time pressure to choose, but can take your time waiting for the right property to appear on the market. With no deadline looming and no need to go out into the rental market, you can also give yourself greater negotiating power.

There are downsides too. One of the biggest is that you have to be in a strong financial position to buy first. Unless you can sell quickly and arrange a simultaneous settlement, you'll usually have to take out a bridging loan. These aren't just expensive, they can also be difficult to qualify for if you don't have substantial equity in your home.

Many people try to buy subject to the sale of their existing house and will most likely get beaten to the table with someone who has already sold or has the finance.

If buying first is possible it usually works best in a rising market because you lock in today's prices on what you're buying but can potentially then sell your home for more than you'd get right now.

### The case for selling first

The argument for selling first is that it lets you know exactly how much you have to spend on your next home. After all, you'll have the money in your pocket (or at least coming into your pocket on settlement) and that can help set your budget when it comes time to buy, removing the risk you'll overspend.

Of course, there is always the risk you may find it difficult to find your next property and could even be forced to rent for a while until you do. And, if the property market were to rise after you've sold, you may not be able to afford as much as if you'd waited.

It's at this point that most people are forced into procrastination mode not knowing how to sell and buy at the same time.

### How to sell and buy at the same time

Selling first or at least getting your home on the market is the first step. But remember listing your house is not selling your house! The way to do it is select an agent (such as Tidbold Real Estate) that charges nothing for listing and nothing if you don't want to sell so the risk is totally removed.
