### WHO GIVES A CLUCK ABOUT THE CHICKENS? JULIE O'SHEA DOES!

Adopting a chook may not be high on your list of fun things to do, but Julie O'Shea says that it can be a wonderful and rewarding adventure.

"Hens are companion animals, no different from a dog or cat. People who have chickens do fall in love with them and realise how sentient and beautiful they are. They're wonderful little friends who just love being around you. They eat your veggie scraps, provide you with great poo as mulch for your garden, improve your permaculture efforts and generally keep you entertained for hours — and gift you some eggs, too!"

After 35 years of corporate life Julie founded Who Gives a Cluck, a volunteer-driven charity committed to rescuing and rehoming hens from the egg laying industry.

"There are 29.5 million caged hens in Australia. The farm that I deal with has 58,000 battery hens and they cull approximately 42,000 of those hens every year, when the hens are about eighteen months old and are considered to be non-profitable if they're not producing five to seven eggs a week. We collect the battery hens just before they start culling."

Just before the big rescue effort a team of volunteers gathers up the 'floor girls' – hens that may have escaped the cage, and possibly hurt themselves in the fall. Who Gives a Cluck has two operational 'chook

hospitals' – paid for by donations from Hen Heroes – where hens that don't pass the health check go to and are cared for and given any necessary rehabilitation and medical treatment.

"We find homes for about 2,500 hens a year in our eight major adoption locations," says Julie. "In the Capalaba area we have 234 Mother Cluckers – approved adopters; we're hoping to raise it to 300 this year."


Hopeful adopters need to fill in an application form to make sure that they're properly prepared for new feathered family members. Julie says that for the first month the hens have to be treated like a two-year old; they're inquisitive, they've never seen rain or sun and usually their first reaction in their new home is to try for a dust bath. If you let them wander too far they won't know how to get back home because they've always lived in a tiny cage.

"Some people may adopt them for the eggs but we make sure that they tick the box that says: eggs or no eggs, this hen will have a forever home," says Julie.

If you're prepared to enrich your life by becoming a Mother Clucker, make sure that your application is in, at the absolute latest, ten days before adoption day. This year, the Capalaba adoption date is October 25. Sign up here https://whogivesacluck.org/become-a-hen-parent/

### SAWDUST SISTERS: THE WOMEN BEHIND REDLAND BAY'S NEW SHED

Blokes and sheds are a natural fit - but some women need a shed too, says local vet Amanda McLune.

"The Redland Bay Women's Shed was founded in September last year, after a conversation with one of my clients, Shelly Rogers, about the urge to make things manually. We thought it would be a good idea to set up a women's version, having no idea of what we were getting ourselves into. I expected maybe a dozen ladies who'd be interested in working on a project, but at our first meeting, we had a turn-up of 42. There was definitely a need in that area! Shelly became our first president."

Amanda says that setting up a not-for-profit was a journey of discovery, learning as they went; given the variety of shed organisations, there isn't one instruction manual that covers them all.

"Affiliation with other like-minded organisations. like the Australian Men's Shed Association (AMSA) (which gives us access to cheaper insurance) and the Bayside Woodies have helped with support and resources. We started with coffee catch-ups, then the Woodies - who have been awesome - ran classes for us, teaching us basic carpentry skills and tool handling, making boxes and stools."

The group has acquired the resources to buy tools and a trailer from which to use and store them through various grants, and the toy makers from Redland Bay Men's Shed have generously donated a lot of equipment. The Women's Shed will access their newfound bounty as soon as they have acquired one more vital asset: a shed.

"The problem with a lot of otherwise suitable properties is that they have a rule about no mess, no noise, both of which are associated with woodwork," says Amanda.

"Understandably, because the organisation is so young, they want to be sure that we're viable before they make extra effort to find us a facility.

"In the meantime, we have a really good



committee, including an events manager who will coordinate events within the group. We have a website under construction and we're keeping the social meetings going; combating social isolation is part of our charter.

"Future projects could include toy-making for hospitalised children – as the toy makers do – and making bird boxes, and we can seek community support in providing tailored programs to meet member interests, such as disaster preparedness, car maintenance, and basic DIY skills. Lady tradies would be welcomed with open arms, but all women, no matter their skill level, are welcome."

### Our role ... and yours

Community resilience is about collectively withstanding, adapting to and recovering from adversity.

Redlands Coast has a great track record of coming together in times of need, but this is just as important when pre-empting, preparing for, and preventing issues.

Council is committed to working hand-in-hand with our community to strengthen Redlands Coast's resilience.

While preparing for natural disasters is a key focus, our resilience efforts go far beyond emergency response ranging from waste and wastewater management to coastal hazards and biosecurity.

You can also take small actions to help us build a stronger, safer Redlands Coast - whether it's checking stormwater drains, preparing properties or treading gently on our fragile foreshores.



### Mayor's message

It's time to Get Ready Redlands! With storm and bushfire season almost upon us, now is the time to prepare. Get Ready Queensland Week, from 6 to 12 October, is the call to arms to be proactive as we head into late spring and summer, when we know there can be challenging weather events and conditions conducive to destructive bushfires in our local government area.

Council's fire management staff have reduced bushfire risk across the city by undertaking physical and mechanical fuel reduction within asset protection zones, proactive slashing of Council-owned land adjoining houses creating firebreaks (102 ha in total), maintaining fire access tracks within conservation areas (about 160km) and completing prescribed burns.

All residents similarly have a responsibility to prepare their homes, themselves and family for natural disasters. The Get Ready campaign can be broken down to three simple steps:

- 1. understand your risk,
- 2. prepare a household emergency plan, and
- 3. pack an emergency kit.

The Get Ready Queensland website is a great resource with lots of advice on how to prepare for extreme weather events and natural disasters.

Being prepared extends beyond natural disasters. For example, everyone has a role to play in sustainable waste



management, supporting community health by reducing mosquito breeding sites on their property, and reducing fire risk and managing stormwater on private property.

I regularly hear from local SES volunteers that one of their most common callouts is for leaking roofs, often caused by blocked gutters. Blocked drains can cause damage when water flows back towards your house, so I encourage all residents to check, and clear, drains and gutters now.

Council is committed to continuing to work together with our community to create a strong and resilient Redlands Coast. Let's be proactive and Get Ready.

#### The bottom line

An important part of the city's ongoing resilience is maintaining essential infrastructure – like our wastewater network.

Hidden underground, it's easy to forgot this massive system is hard at work – treating wastewater from our kitchens, laundries, bathrooms and, yes, toilets!

While our City Water crews handle the day-to-day operations, there are some simple steps residents can take to help prevent blockages and overflows. Every small action makes a big difference.

#### Did you know?


Last year, Council supplied the city 14,380 ML of clean drinking water, but treated 14,392 ML of wastewater. Why is the wastewater total more? Stormwater!

Entering our wastewater system through illegal connections or damaged pipes, stormwater can cause backflows that impact private properties and vital city infrastructure.

#### How you can help to keep the pipes flowing

- Never plumb stormwater into your wastewater system.
- Flush only the three P's pee, poo and paper. Nothing else belongs in the bowl!
- Use sink strainers and never pour fats or oils down the drain – they can clog pipes and cause blockages.
- Be mindful when planting trees roots can damage underground pipes.

#### **People vs pests**

As the weather warms up, we're not the only ones heading outdoors - mosquitoes and fire ants are gearing up too!

Council runs a year-round mosquito management program and conducts fire ant checks and treatments on Council land, with both ramping up over summer.

#### Here's how you can help protect our community:

- Tip it out remove stagnant water around your yard to stop mozzies breeding.
- Cover up wear light-coloured, long clothing, and use insect repellent, particularly at dawn and dusk.
- Check your screens make sure insect screens are in good condition.
- **Report fire ants fast** if you spot them, contact the National Fire Ant Eradication Program at ants.daf.qld.gov.au.

Together, we can help keep Redlands Coast bite-free this summer!



### **BEACH SAFETY FOR YOUR DOG**

As the weather warms up, we start to look forward to beach days. Many dogs love the chance to enjoy a day at the beach, but there are some important safety considerations to make sure the trip doesn't end in a vet visit!



#### Salt water ingestion

Dogs will often lap at seawater or inadvertently swallow a large volume of water while swimming or retrieving toys. Excess consumption of salt water can result in salt toxicity with signs including vomiting, diarrhoea, excessive thirst, confusion, and seizures. Provide your pet with clean, fresh water, and make sure you give them a thorough rinse in fresh water to remove excess salt from their coats.

#### **Sand ingestion**

Dogs will often consume sand when playing, especially when digging for buried toys. Swallowing a large volume of sand can result in a condition called sand impaction, which can cause vomiting, reduced appetite, bloating, and constipation. Discourage dogs from eating sand and avoid playing with toys in softer sand.

#### **Heat stroke**

Bright sun and hot sand during the day, combined with excessive

activity, can rapidly lead to heat stroke. It is best to avoid the beach during the hotter part of the day, and do not walk dogs on hot sand. If you suspect your dog is overheating, move to a shady, cooler area and offer them water to help cool them down.

#### Sun burn

Dogs with light-coloured coats and thin skin can become sunburnt. Keep your dog out of the sun between 10am and 4pm and provide shade when on the beach for any extended period. Dog-safe

sunscreen can be applied to exposed, less furred areas such as the ears, nose, and belly.

### Fishing hooks, lines, and baits

Dogs can be at risk of serious injuries from ingestion of fishing tackle. If your dog swallows a fish hook, DO NOT cut any attached line. Cover any exposed hooks to prevent trauma from licking and seek veterinary attention. Keep a close watch on your dog while

around fishing areas, as preventing access to fishing equipment is preferable to expensive surgery to retrieve it from your dog's gastrointestinal tract!

#### **Animal encounters**

Our lovely bayside area is home to a number of marine creatures that are best avoided. Puffer fish ingestion and contact with stone fish can result in life-threatening toxicities, while oyster shells can result in nasty wounds on soft paws. Be alert to your surroundings and supervise dogs carefully.

# NOW YOU KNOW WHAT TO RECYCLE, MAYBE IT'S TIME TO UPSIZE YOUR YELLOW-LID BIN

FROM REDLAND CITY COUNCIL

This year across Redlands Coast, we've been working hard to make sure the right items go into our yellow-lid recycling bins, helping reduce the 1300 tonnes of non-recyclables that sneak into the bin every year.

Early results from our education team show that many households are on the right track, with many only needing small tweaks to get their recycling sorted.

The biggest opportunities for improvement have been:

- Eliminating soft plastics like wrappers and plastic bags, as they
  can't be recycled through kerbside collection. These should go
  in your red-lid bin or be taken to Woolworths who have recently
  restarted to trial soft plastic recycling collections.
- Keeping items loose in the bin, as they can't be recycled if they're in a plastic or paper bag as the material often remains in the bag once compacted in the truck.

The great news is that many households have already made

improvements, helping create cleaner, more effective recycling streams and reducing the amount of waste going to landfill.

Our educators have also noticed that many yellow-lid bins are filled to the brim, a sign that some households could recycle even more if they had a bigger bin.

If your recycling bin isn't keeping up with your household's needs, consider upsizing from a 140 or 240-litre to a 340-litre bin. It's just a one-off \$30 establishment fee and no increase in the ongoing costs — a small step for a big impact.

You can also downsize your general waste from a 240-litre to a 140-litre bin and add a green waste bin to keep garden clippings out of landfill. Make these changes together and you'll save on fees, with no extra cost to your rates.

Bryan Brown has achieved a worldwide reputation as one of Australia's finest actors, but his talent isn't confined to the stage. Rapidly becoming established as a writer, he sees the two skills as being closely related.

"I don't think I'm an author, I'm a storyteller and I've been doing that for 50 years — it's just a different platform, I think.


"I was writing the pitch for an idea I had for a series, but I started to enjoy the writing of it, and I wanted to see where it went — so I just kept going. I ended up with a seventeen-and a-half-thousand word story; different people who read it loved it, so I scribbled a few more stories down, Allen and Unwin said they'd like to publish them, and that was how it all started."

Is it a quantum leap from being a character in someone else's story to creating your own?

"Someone lays down a story and a character and as an actor, I interpret that character — that's the creative part of being an actor. Here, I sit down with a blank screen and think — where do we want to go here? I come up with a character or two that interest me and I follow them to see where they're going to take me. Within a couple of hours I might have written a thousand words and wonder: where

did that come from? It comes from imagination and experience, drawing on the things you've known and done and things other people have done – you're drawing on life."

Despite decades of having his name up on the screen, Bryan is still coming to terms with having his books proudly displayed in bookshops.



"I do find it a little bit surprising to walk in and see *Sweet Jimmy* and *The Drowning*, and now *The Hidden* by Bryan Brown – I haven't quite come to terms with that part of it. I've got used to my name on a TV show or a movie, but I can still walk into a bookshop, look at a title and think: I wonder what that's like? – oh, that's me!"

Bryan is no stranger to the Redlands, having filmed scenes of the popular *Darby and Joan* series on Minjerribah in recent years. Locals are in for a rare treat at the Cleveland Library on Saturday, November 8 when Bryan will talk about his latest crime novel *The Hidden*. 

### **COMMUNITY ORGANISATION PROFILE: AL-ANON FAMILY GROUPS**

If someone you care about struggles with alcohol, it can take a toll on your own emotional health. That's where Al-Anon Family Groups comes in. It's a warm, welcoming fellowship designed to support family members and friends affected by someone else's drinking. It's a space where you can connect with others who truly understand what you're going through, share your story, and learn practical ways to take care of yourself.

Al-Anon meetings are confidential and judgment-free, offering a safe environment to explore how alcoholism affects families and relationships. You'll hear from people of all backgrounds, each navigating their own path toward healing. The program follows a 12-step model, similar to Alcoholics Anonymous, but with a focus on your own recovery — not trying to fix or control someone else's drinking.

One of Al-Anon's core messages is that you didn't cause the problem, and you can't cure it. Instead, the focus is on acceptance, setting healthy boundaries, and finding peace by letting go of what you can't control. It's about learning to detach with love, and supporting your loved one without losing yourself in the process.

Al-Anon is free to attend, and there's no pressure to speak or commit. You're welcome to simply listen, and many people find comfort just being in the room. There's also Alateen, a sister program for teenagers dealing with similar challenges.

If you're curious, the best way to get started is by attending a meeting. They're held in community spaces across the country, and you can find one near you through the Al-Anon Family Groups Australia website. It might just be the first step toward feeling a little more grounded, supported, and understood.

### LE CHAPEAU EXHIBIT: WHERE DID YOU GET THAT HAT?

Redlands Coast Museum is tipping its hat to a fascinating collection of millinery with Le Chapeau, and you're invited to see it up close.

"Many of the hats – and millinery tools – were donated by Brisbane milliner Dell Johnstone\*, as well as some items from her mother, tailor Edna Hicks," says Jan Banks, head of the Textile Group at the Redlands Coast Museum, referring to *Le Chapeau*, one of the museum's current exhibitions. *Le Chapeau* features a curated collection of hats spanning from 1880 to the present day.

"Even up into the 1900s, it was important for a lady to wear a hat when she went out — it was frowned on to go out bareheaded; her hat was a sign of modesty. In some places, a woman could be reported for going out hatless," says Jan.

"By the 1960s, that had changed, and hats became more of an enjoyable, optional fashion accessory. As fashions changed, so did hats, and milliners began to play a more important role in couture."

Materials commonly used included straw, felt, silk, taffeta, and sinamay. Sinamay is made in the Philippines from the Abaca banana plant; light, strong, stiff and durable, it is an obligingly adaptable material for hat shapes and decorations. The chaps haven't been forgotten, and the exhibition features some distinctive samples of men's hats, including the iconic Akubra.


The cloche (French for "bell") hat, beloved by the 1920s flappers, is a classic example of a hat that carries a wealth of information about social mores and extended fashions of the time. They suited the fashionable new short bob haircuts and tightly framed the wearer's face, with the new, bold makeup style of the day. Because they were originally worn pulled down over the ears and brow, they required the wearer to tilt her head up,

giving a slightly haughty look that suited her thoroughly modern attitude. For those in the know, the addition of certain ribbons could indicate the wearer's availability for dalliance. What more could one ask of a chapeau?

\*A footnote: one of Dell's commissions was to make five hats for bloodhounds to wear in a dog food commercial.



### **Under the Hammer - Auction Story!**



His latest offering is *The Lost Balloon*, showing at RPAC on November 6.

A survivor of early violence and trauma, Clint credits school teachers with helping him to battle through the difficulties, reconnect to others, find the joy again — and to share the laughter with others.

"Through the clown characters I've created it's as if I've found a way to give myself, as an adult, the childhood that I never had and a lot of my work is autobiographical," he says.

"In primary school I didn't feel that I fitted in; I was bullied a lot and all my friends were older people. The young Hero character in *The Lost Balloon* is about seven years old – he has no friends, he can't connect with people, he feels like an outsider – then a lovely yellow balloon

drifts into his life. Yellow is a symbol of hope and joy and friendship and for the first time ever he has somebody – the balloon is alive – who has befriended him and accepted him. Then a gust of wind blows the balloon away and the chase is on."

What follows is a string of encounters with folk who help him — and are helped by him. Accompanied by an original, soul-stirring musical score, the whole wonderful romp is played by masked characters and the emotional connections are unhampered by age differences, gender differences or language. Even though the characters are wearing full face masks and have no spoken words they communicate precisely through body language, feelings, instinct and music. Each encounter brings unexpected moments of humour, tenderness, and joy.

"Mask theatre connects directly to the heart and *The Lost Balloon* is an exploration of human connection; not judging others for being old or for being young or for being different. Its themes are universally understood, its characters are easy to identify with, and it reminds us that even the smallest acts of kindness can create ripples of change."

### **CHEESY PUMPKIN HALLOWEEN DIP BOWL RECIPE**



Whether you're having a Halloween dinner party or just love a delicious, hot, cheesy dip, this is a fun twist on the good old party cob loaf recipe, but instead of bread, we're using a whole pumpkin to hold gorgeously gooey cheese dip!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 small whole pumpkin (about 1kg)
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp butter
- 1 brown onion, sliced
- 300g cream cheese (full fat)
- ½ cup of sour cream

- 125g freshly grated cheddar or red Leicester
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh chives
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- · Salt and pepper



#### **METHOD**

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C (fan forced).
- 2. Using a sharp knife, cut the top off your pumpkin (like a lid). Scoop out seeds and stringy bits.
- 3. Brush the inside with olive oil, sprinkle with the smoked paprika, and a little salt and pepper.
- 4. Roast pumpkin (lid off) on a tray for approximately 20-25 minutes until the remaining pumpkin flesh is tender, but still sturdy enough to hold your dip.
- 5. Meanwhile, in a frypan, sauté the onions in a splash of oil and a tablespoon of butter over a low to medium heat until they're soft (don't burn). Set aside (keep any buttery sauce).
- 6. In a medium bowl, mix cream cheese, cheddar, sour cream, cooked onions (and any leftover butter sauce from the pan), parsley, and chives until smooth. Season with salt and pepper.
- 7. Spoon cheesy mix into the roasted pumpkin. Return to the oven for 10 minutes until the cheese mixture is melty and bubbling.
- 8. Pop the lid back on your pumpkin, and it's ready to serve.
- 9. Serve warm with crackers, veggie sticks, or crusty bread use a fondue stick if you like!

### A BOOK REVIEW – TWIST BY COLUM MCCANN

#### WHAT THE EXPERTS SAID:

"Anthony Fennell, a journalist, is in pursuit of a story buried at the bottom of the sea: the network of tiny fibre-optic tubes that carry the world's information across the ocean floor - and what happens when they break.

"So he has travelled to Cape Town to board a cable repair vessel captained by Chief of Mission, Conway. Conway is a talented engineer and fearless freediver - and Fennell is quickly captivated by this mysterious, unnerving man and his beautiful partner, Zanele.

"As the boat embarks along the west coast of Africa, Fennell learns the rhythms of life at sea. But as the mission falters, tensions simmer - and Conway is thrown into crisis. Then Conway disappears, and Fennell must set out to find him." Bloomsbury.

#### **MY THOUGHTS:**

Fennell says at the beginning he "needed a story about connecting, about grace, about repair". Did he get one? ... Before repair comes rupture.

The story has the air of a mystery from start to finish. "Others have tried to tell Conway's story, and so far as I know, they got it largely wrong." Fennell becomes obsessed with everything Conway, and

particularly with solving the puzzles that surround the enigmatic man, to the end.

Along the journey, we experience captivating and vivid descriptions of the process of freediving, the depths of the ocean and its undiscovered creatures, and the enormous collection of human rubbish below the surface (including that transmitted through the cables).

We learn that Waiting for Godot (Samual Beckett) is actually today's great climate play, according to Conway's actress partner Zanele -"let us do something while we have the chance" (quoting Beckett).

We observe through Fennell's narration a lengthy ocean voyage involving sea-sickness, storms, calm, the ever-changing nature of the sea, and the regimen of managing the ship.


We gain fascinating insights into the process of cable repair, beginning with finding a needle in a haystack, more than 4km below the surface - literally a stab in the dark! Repeat until successfully locating and retrieving the fibre-optic ends and fusing them – as long as it takes.

I enjoyed the book's intertwining metaphors, for example, cables with relationships and human wiring, and the surface and depths of the ocean with human connection and understanding. Conrad's relationship apparently unravels, while Fennell works on repairing his

with his alienated son, starting with drying out during the sea voyage.

"The task at hand was to knit at least some distant parts of myself anew.

"The disease of our days is that we spend so much time on the surface. Part of our human warmth is the darkness we don't show each other."



And I enjoyed the succinct but evocative writing style and apt use of words. (I confess I referred to the dictionary more often while reading this book than I have in years.)

As to the answer to the opening question, Conway says, "Everything gets fixed, and we all stay broken." Perhaps this explains the final plot twist, though my book club was equally divided as to its plausibility. I was left wondering: perhaps it is understandable as a break in the cabling in a person.

Either way, Twist is worth reading





### OCTOBER'S BAY BOUNTY: MACKEREL, WHITING AND SNAPPER ARE ON!

You won't find better weather for a fish in the bay than right now — and with the fish biting in good numbers, it's easy to put something fresh on the dinner table this month.

So, where are they? The school mackerel have come back on the bite, and the whiting will be in good numbers in the Rous Channel, the Sand Hills, and close in to the Wynnum foreshore and Darcy Light, all the way to St Helena. If October is anything like September, the snapper fishing should continue to be excellent.

School mackerel will be all over the bay, especially on the western side of the bay from St Helena to Ormiston, and some in the Rous and the Rainbow Channel. Using diving boards with 3-inch Halco spoons is the way to go. And once you find the mackerel, floating out pillies on 3-ganged hooks will get you plenty as well.

The whiting are caught best with a good run in the tide, and I use a paternoster rig. Bloodworms are the best bait by far, and frozen beach worms would be my second choice. Peeled prawns and strips of squid work, but not as well, unless the fish are thick on the bite.

The whale sightings in August and some of September in the bay have been very disappointing compared to previous years. Let's hope they come in for a little rest in October.

So get out there when the conditions are good and get a fresh fish or two for dinner!

#### **LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT**

### THE PURPLE HAZE

"Jacaranda!!!" That is what my sister and I would yell out every time we saw the purple haze of a Jacaranda tree. It was a game to see who could say it the fastest when a tree was spotted — and you said it once for every tree. I'm not sure if this was a legitimate game or something my mum made up to keep us occupied in the car. Considering the avenue of jacaranda trees that lined the street of our primary school and the ensuing month of car-chaos when she took us to school, I suspect she regretted it either way.

Jacarandas (*Jacaranda mimosifolia*) are an introduced species (from Brazil) and are actually classified as a weed in Queensland due to their ability to happily self-seed and take over native vegetation. They're an iconic weed, though. Grafton and Ipswich even have celebrations and festivals in October/ November to celebrate these special trees that drop all their foliage, covering everything below them in teeny tiny leaves that block all sorts of gutters and downpipes, then put on a fabulous show of little mauve trumpet-shaped flowers that eventually fall and become a brown slushy mess all over the pavement. Most people still love them, though. At least from afar.

Jacarandas are in the Bignoniaceae family, which includes other trees such as Tabebuia (also flowering now) and vines, such as our native *Pandorea* and the classic orange trumpet vine (Campsis radicans). Take a closer look at the trumpet-like flower shape next time you get a chance, and you will see the similarities.

Jacarandas are a fast-growing tree, generally up to 15 metres with a canopy just as wide and an extensive root system. There are now more compact dwarf varieties available, and even the rarer white jacaranda, which is the same species, just a special cultivar with white flowers instead of the typical purple. While they are beautiful, I think it's the purple colour that makes Jacarandas special.

Sadly, many of us do not have the space for a Jacaranda, but there's no reason we can't enjoy the magic of the trees that are already here. "Jacaranda!!!"

I love gardening, growing my own food and plants in general. I've been working on our current garden in subtropical Brisbane for the last six-plus years, but have been gardening for much, much longer in all sorts of places. I'm an ex-engineer, recently turned horticulturist (life's too short not to work in something you love!). I grow edibles and ornamentals in an often wild, rambling jungle, filled with birds and bugs, including a handful of pet chooks and a brand new puppy (who likes to chase said chickens, and is not averse to helping me dig a hole!).

- · Check out all levels, from the canopy to the leaf litter.

- Use a range of senses look for signs of animal activity, smell native mint or eucalypt, touch rough and smooth bark, and listen for wild sounds.

### WELLO POINT RACER SHATTERS DOUBLE WORLD DRAG RACING RECORD

Wellington Point's own Errol Brittain has officially rewritten the record books, blazing his way to a double world record in high-octane Sport Compact ¼ mile Drag Racing.

At the 2025 Brisbane Jamboree on Sunday, August 24, Brittain's iconic Drag Brumby – a Subaru-powered beast – claimed the titles for both the Quickest Elapsed Time and Fastest Speed over a quarter mile for 4-cylinder Subaru vehicle in the world.

With a blistering 7.49-second run and a top speed of 189.3 mph (305 km/h), Brittain's performance stunned spectators and solidified his place as the quickest 4-cylinder Subaru driver on the planet.

- 0 to100 km/h in just 1.3 seconds
- 100 to 200 km/h in 2.1 seconds
- 0 to 200 km/h in a mere 3.6 seconds

This isn't Brittain's first brush with glory. The Drag Brumby team has been chasing — and smashing — records since 2010, with multiple resets along the way. But this latest feat marks a new high, proving that when it comes to speed, precision, and Subaru-powered innovation, Errol is in a league of his own.

### DRUMMING FOR THE SOUL: BEAT OUT THAT RHYTHM ON A DRUM!

It's been said that music and rhythm, found in every culture, can inspire, soothe, and heal us; it has been postulated that humans used song even before we developed language. The experiences of the Drum for Life participants certainly bear that out.

Drum for Life, part of the Live for Life program, has a core group of about 15 participants, but there's a constant flow of new members, says committee member Ellen Bennett, a long-time drumming aficionado.

Ellen says that the first lesson is free, giving potential participants a chance to try before committing.

"Djembes are wonderful drums; we have big ones that stand alone, they're good for your posture, they encourage you to sit up straight. As well, we have smaller ones that walking drummers can carry in a sling.

"Drums are supplied, though if people come to love them, they usually go on to buy their own. People who have drums can bring their own,

even if they're not djembes, and sometimes other instruments are introduced for special sessions, such as African music. We have a qualified music teacher and the results are really wonderful."

Ellen says that drumming provides more than just physical benefits.

"All of the rhythms are great for the brain," she says. "In fact, one of our ladies, who is nearly 90 and has Parkinson's Disease, has been encouraged by her doctor to take up drumming. Research indicates that rhythmic cues can help retrain the brain and that slow, steady rhythms — like drumbeats — can help Parkinson's patients to move more steadily. We also have drumming sessions for disability clients.

"It develops a sense of camaraderie and teamwork, and some members find that it helps them cope with depression or anxiety. Most of us just do it for fun — we call it our Here's to Life Family!"



### **Personal Insurance: Focus On Trauma**

There are four types of personal insurance available in the Australian market. Three of these are broadly discussed and more well-known, and the final one is less so.

Let's start with familiar territory. Life, Total and Permanent Disability (TPD), and Income Protection cover are broadly covered and discussed in the news and through superannuation fund education seminars. They are all very important and play a vital role in any financial plan. One of the reasons that these insurances have had more exposure to consumers is their broad distribution through superannuation products.

Because large superannuation funds can purchase a policy that can cover all their members (also called "Group Cover Insurance" if you want to Google for more information), Life, TPD, and basic income protection are often offered to members by their super fund. And rightly so too — these covers provide benefits to nominated beneficiaries when a person passes away or can assist in managing the long-term costs of an illness or injury that forces someone to stop working.

But what about if an illness or injury is serious, but not serious enough that the insurer determines a benefit is payable? TPD and Income Protection insurance both rely on a definition of "disability"

being met. If cover is held through superannuation, the definition is broader and slightly more difficult to meet. The insured person must also contend with the tax implications of accessing a benefit from the insurer.

Trauma insurance provides the final missing piece to a comprehensive insurance plan. Trauma insurance policies (also commonly referred to as "Critical Illness" insurance) also rely on a definition being met for a payment to be completed; however, they are not based on a subjective condition of whether an insured person is able to work. They are instead based on the medical diagnosis of the condition.

All policies will list the conditions that are covered and will generally cover heart conditions (including heart attacks or surgery on the heart), cancers, organ diseases, neurological diseases, and burns or traumatic events, and normally a range of others. The insured benefit of this kind of insurance is not like that of private health insurance. The policy has a dollar amount of benefit, which is normally paid as a tax-free lump sum.

The benefit of the policy is that the payment can be used for any purpose that is needed. It can be used to pay for medical treatments, taxi or Uber fares, groceries, bills, or to maintain mortgage repayments. The difference between trauma insurance and private health insurance is that a private health insurance policy will cover some treatments and the cost of a hospital admission. It will not cover any of the ancillary or extra costs associated with a serious illness, like transport, lost earnings, or just keeping life going. In many instances, it is not only the individual who has had the trauma

who is impacted, as often family members step in to help care for the individual.

Like most insurances, it has a cost. There needs to be a commitment of the policy holder to purchase and maintain the policy, and the costs may increase each year. But, like with most insurances, the decision comes down to what will cost more: having the policy or not having it when it is truly needed.
