A GOOD TIME FOR A GREAT CAUSE: THE BROOKESTAR ROCK FUNDRAISER

Brooke, a resilient young girl from Redland Bay, has faced extraordinary medical challenges since birth. Diagnosed with Lennox-Gastaut Syndrome (LGS) – a severe and complex form of epilepsy – Brooke's early life was marked by prolonged hospital stays and countless invasive tests. Her condition, resistant to multiple anti-convulsant medications, has led to thousands of cluster seizures, resulting in brain scarring and additional diagnoses, including low-functioning autism, intellectual and physical impairments, and non-verbal communication.

Despite these hurdles, Brooke's spirit remains unbreakable. Her mother, Tania, describes her daughter's daily fight for life as "something I cannot possibly put into words," expressing deep admiration for Brooke's unwavering resilience.

Tania says that although Brooke is non-verbal, she has a remarkable ability to connect with others. Her joyful expressions and radiant presence leave a lasting impression on those who take a moment to engage with her.

Now, the community is coming together to support Brooke through the *Brookestar Rock Fundraiser*, to be held at The Grand View Hotel on 16 November from 11:00am to 5:00pm. The event will raise funds for a new Kia Carnival, which will be modified to accommodate Brooke's power-assist wheelchair.

"This new vehicle will allow me to continue to maintain both her independence and dignity whilst also ensuring a quality of life that she deserves," says Tania.

This high-energy fundraiser will feature four epic tribute acts paying homage to Cold Chisel, Creedence Clearwater Revival, The Eagles, and AC/DC – along with a host of family-friendly activities including a photo booth, pinball and arcade games, music memorabilia auctions, raffles, lucky dips, and even a special appearance by Batman.

Brooke would love to see you there! Your support brings Brooke one step closer to a future filled with new memories and greater mobility.



A NEW CHAPTER FOR Y SCHOOLS QUEENSLAND OPENS AT VICTORIA POINT

Y Schools Queensland has opened a Redlands Junior Campus at Victoria Point, marking the organisation's 11th school across the state.

The Redlands site is already home to Y Schools' Senior Campus, which serves students in Years 10 to 12. The addition of the new Junior Campus now enables local young people in Years 7 to 9 to access a comprehensive learning pathway from Year 7 to 12 at one location.

The Redlands Junior Campus has been purpose-built to provide an alternative education pathway that nurtures wellbeing, confidence, and connection.

Y Schools Queensland's unique Thrive Wellbeing Pathway underpins the program, combining trauma-aware, evidence-based practices with individualised learning support. The Thrive model, developed in partnership with QUT and funded by Hand Heart Pocket, helps young people develop emotional regulation, resilience, and lifelong learning skills

"This new campus represents hope and opportunity for young people who may not have found success in mainstream education," said Heather Allan, President and Board Chair of Y Queensland. "At Y Schools, every student is seen, heard and supported to grow

academically, socially and emotionally."

"When young people feel safe, connected and understood, their potential is unlimited," said Damian Foley, Chief Executive Officer of Y Queensland. "Our schools exist to re-engage students, nurture confidence, and equip them with the skills to succeed, not just in school, but in life."

Recent research reinforces the impact of Y Schools Queensland's approach. The 2025 Parent and Carer Report found that 87 per cent of families are satisfied or very satisfied with Y Schools Queensland, with 99 per cent agreeing that the school supports their young person's wellbeing. Nearly all families reported improvements in their child's mental health, confidence and engagement in learning.

The 2024 Pathways to Success Report also found that Y Schools graduates report higher employment rates, stronger community connection and greater wellbeing outcomes than peers from similar backgrounds. Many go on to apprenticeships, TAFE study or meaningful employment, highlighting the long-term impact of the program.

Head of Campus, Cam Hales, described the new site as a place where learning and belonging go hand in hand.

"Our students are capable, creative and resilient," Mr Hales said. "This campus has been built to continue to support their future and give young people more possibilities."

The Redlands Junior Campus expands access for local families seeking a smaller, more supportive school environment where each student's strengths are celebrated.







RAT BAITS AND PETS

Rodenticides are poisons designed to kill mice and rats, but they are just as dangerous for dogs and cats. Dogs and cats may be exposed to rodenticides through direct ingestion



of the products or through ingestion of poisoned rats and mice.

Clinical signs of rodenticide intoxication

There are several different rodenticides available on the market. The most commonly used products work by stopping the blood from clotting. Internal bleeding occurs with signs including:

- Lethargy or weakness
- Pale gums
- Bruising or bleeding from the mouth, nose, anus, or in the faeces
- Coughing due to bleeding into the chest
- Collapse or sudden death

Other products may interfere with Vitamin D levels, resulting in increased calcium in the blood, which can lead to kidney failure. Meanwhile, others may affect the nervous system, causing muscle tremors, twitching, or seizures.

What should you do if you suspect your pet has ingested rodenticide?

If you see your pet eating or suspect your pet has eaten rodenticide, you should ring your local veterinarian or emergency centre and present your pet for treatment as soon as possible.

If you have the packaging, you should show it to your vet so that they can determine the treatment required.

If ingestion is recent, your vet will likely induce vomiting in your pet to remove the material from their digestive system. In cases of suspected bleeding, your vet may run a blood test to check clotting times.

Treatment will vary depending on the type of rodenticide.

Preventing rodenticide ingestion

- Avoid using rodenticide
- Use live traps or ultrasonic deterrents
- Ask pest control services about safe alternatives
- Supervise pets in new environments, around sheds, farms, and garages

Secondary poisoning (through ingestion of poisoned rodents) is very rare and would require your pet to eat a large number of rats or mice. Removing deceased rodents from the environment as soon as they are found can reduce the risk of secondary exposure.



NATURALLY WONDERFUL ... WITH RANGER STACEY

Everyone loves a baby, and each animal species has its own unique baby journey, whether new life hatches from an egg or begins from birth.

Marsupial mums have a short gestation period – a koala joey the size of a jellybean is born after 35 days gestation, while a squirrel glider arrives after just 18 days.

For human mums, pregnancy is typically 40 weeks. Once the precious little bundle arrives, it needs parental care and support for many years. In fact, even when our babies grow up and reach independence, they may choose to remain in the family "nest" for an extended period.

Speaking of nests, many birds are fantastic parents...like ducks, tawny frogmouths, ospreys, and kookaburras. They incubate eggs, feed, protect and teach their offspring, in preparation for life in the big wide world.

But what if you come across a baby bird alone? To determine if help is needed, check for feathers!

If the cute chick has no feathers or fluffy down, expert assistance is required. Redlands 24-hour Wildlife Rescue Service is just a phone call away (3833 4031).

If it's a fledgling with flight feathers it will be learning to fly, gaining strength as it flutters between the ground and low vegetation. The parents are most probably supervising from a nearby tree. You should leave these ones alone — we certainly don't want to be responsible for a chick-napping!

Animal parents display varying levels of care and dedication to their offspring. Some creatures like blue tongue lizards are independent from the start. Yep, these familiar backyard skinks give birth to up to 19 perfectly developed young. They immediately feed on the placenta for nourishment, shed their skin within a few days, and hit the ground running.

The echidna and platypus are the only egg-laying mammals in the world, known as monotremes. Babies are called puggles — even the name has the cute factor!

About 22 days after mating the echidna mum lays a single egg into a pouch-like fold of skin. After around ten days, the hairless and blind puggle uses its egg tooth to crack open the shell. From here, it drinks milk from mum's milk patches to grow and develop its spiky exterior.

Next time you see a baby bird, mammal, or reptile, take a moment to admire the beauty and wonder of nature!

Organic garden waste makes up about 30 per cent of waste sent to landfill each year from Redlands Coast households' red-lid general waste bins.

This includes garden clippings, branches, leaves and other green waste, equating to more than 10,000 tonnes a year of material that could have otherwise been composted.

When green waste ends up in landfill, it breaks down without oxygen, producing methane – a greenhouse gas that contributes significantly to climate change.

But beyond the environmental impact, landfilling organic waste drives up costs.

More waste means more transport, higher landfill waste levies and increased pressure on limited landfill space.

The solution is to keep green waste out of landfill.

Redlands Coast residents have access to green waste bins on the mainland and drop-off services at all recycling and waste centres.

This green waste is sent to a composting facility and turned into mulch and garden soil, a valuable product that supports local landscaping, agriculture and soil health.

By using these services, we reduce emissions and help control the costs of waste management.

Here's how you can help:

- Use your green waste bin or order one if you don't have
 it yet. There is an annual fee of \$75, which can be offset by
 downsizing your general waste bin from a 240 litre to a 140
 litre general waste bin when you order your green bin at the
 same time. This also helps to free up space in your red-lid bin.
 Call Council on 3829 8999 or go online to redland.qld.gov.au/
 greenwaste for more information.
- Once you have your green bin, keep it clean no plastic bags, food scraps, garden rubbish such as hoses and pot plants, or general waste.
- Encourage others talk to neighbours and friends about the benefits of proper green waste disposal.

Reducing garden organic waste in landfill is one of the most effective ways to manage costs and environmental impacts at the same time.

WHAT IS A REPAIR CAFÉ AND HOW CAN YOU TAKE ADVANTAGE OF ONE?

Over the last four years, Repair Café Brisbane Bayside has saved over 2,000 kg of repairable items from landfills through a free repair service that is part of a worldwide initiative.

On the second Saturday of each month, volunteer 'fixers' undertake repairs to items that include toys, bikes, small items of furniture, household appliances, battery-powered tools and equipment, clocks, audio systems, games, etc. Other free services include sewing repairs on clothing, sharpening of scissors and garden tools, among others.

Visitors pay for replacement parts and materials, while donations help to offset running costs.

Fixers truly enjoy the satisfaction of restoring items to working order while simultaneously educating visitors on techniques to identify problems and how to make basic repairs.

Visitors observe, sometimes assist with repairs, learn how to triage faults, and gain confidence to tackle repairs themselves. Sometimes, items are brought in as faulty when all that is required is some

guidance on maintenance or how to interpret the instruction manual!

Volunteers manage the flow of visitors, allocate appropriate fixers (dependent on the item to be repaired), and keep the work area clean and safe for everyone. To satisfy the café aspect of the Repair Café, Devonshire Teas are available for purchase.

Many visitors come from around the Redlands, and it would be great to have another Repair Café operating to meet the needs of that growing region. Repair Café Brisbane Bayside is more than willing to assist in setting up another Repair Café.

WANT TO LEARN ITALIAN OR STUDY FAMILY LAW? GREG'S YOUR MAN!

If you have a yen to learn Italian – or to study Family Law – Greg Cudmore could be your one-stop shop. He runs courses in both subjects at Redlands Coast Museum. Italian and law may seem mismatched interests, but that's what can happen when you're a dedicated lifelong teacher and school principal.

Greg gained his teaching degree, got a job as a teacher, and was then faced with the need to teach specialised subjects. Undaunted and a natural student himself, he went on to university studies in politics, philosophy, legal studies and arts.

"I fell in love with studying," he says, "I had no social life; I just wanted to accumulate ideas. I thought I'd do a PhD but was prevented because of my other ongoing studies so I settled for a Master's in Education.

"When I retired there was a sudden void; I'm not a natural 'joiner' so I thought to I'd do something I like. I offered adult courses for seniors and found that I love it — and the students come with such enthusiasm and appreciation," Greg says.

Greg has been teaching basic law for over 50 years, offering ten law units with a different aspect of law covered each term. The current term will cover Family Law. "Students who complete all ten units are awarded a 'Bush Law' degree," Greg says with a grin.

Greg started learning Italian as a school student and it became a lifetime habit, reinforced by visits to Italy. His Italian classes cater for absolute beginners and those who already have some understanding of the language.

"Many students come because they're attracted to the romance of the language, and some come because they're going to visit Italy. It does require a lot of work and study; one class a week won't be enough. Visitors to Italy have to be prepared for a lot of dialects and vernacular words, especially in the south, which has been



FINDING THE BEAUTY IN LITTLE GEMS – RIGHT IN FRONT OF US

"The moment one gives close attention to anything, even a blade of grass, it becomes a mysterious, awesome, indescribably magnificent world in itself." (Henry Miller, author).

Seeing beauty in simple, natural things is a quality shared by the four contributing artists at the Redland Coast Museum's Little Gems October/November exhibition. All are committed to honouring the beauty and mystery of nature in a collection that encompasses a wide range of media.

Rhyl Henzell, whose contribution is a collection of cyanotype, eco-print, water colour and gold leaf, has explored the interconnectedness of life forms.

"It's about connections between the cosmos, trees, birds, mycelium – I'm trying to put that into a visual form," she says. "It's quite a challenge to tell a story like that, to make people aware of the miracles that are all around us, fall in love with it and want to preserve it. That's my message to the world."

Rhyl's paintings are of birds (including her favourite, the wren) and she has created silk and linen scarves patterned with complex layered colours and overlapping stencils.

A sturdier art form is found in Louise Saunders' garden sculptures; free-standing metre-high totem poles comprising several handmade individual stoneware pieces that slide onto a central pole in whatever order the user pleases – one topped by a dolphin, one by a barn owl. There's also a flock of stoneware guinea fowl that would add a dash of whimsy to any garden. It's a reawakening for Louise to be working with clay again.

"My audience knows me best for my botanical and natural history paintings, eco-printing and finelydetailed water colours. All of the work is naturethemed; 'Drawing from Nature' is my tag line," she says. "There'll be everything from big pieces to little knick-knacks, a range of gifts including artists' cards, bookmarks, prints and very special bi-fold artist's books."

A committed conservationist, Louise was awarded an OAM for service to conservation and the arts.

The softer side of art is Jen Henzell's specialty.

"Most of it is handstitched work; wall hangings featuring fish I found in a vintage book of tropical aguarium fish, a few little square canvases covered with fabric and embroidery, and a crown sculpture covered in fabric and handstitched Australian native flowers," says Jen. "I've also made little mosaic moths and beetles out of ceramic and glass pieces."

Conversations with silver, hammer and flame are goldsmith Emma Dusting's specialty and she loves the demands of concentration that the craft demands.

"You have to give total focus to goldsmithing to be at one with the metal that you're working with, you have to listen to it talking back to you," she says. "New students sometimes expect it to be easier than it is but even basic things can be a surprise - how to saw metal, tightening the saw blade so that it gives the right note, then using it like a violin

"It's a primitive craft that essentially still works the same way as it did hundreds of years ago. Something as simple as making little silver balls is a miracle to me. The early smiths were regarded as magicians - turning a rock into a liquid then into a piece of art. My favourite subjects are natural

- I love flowing lines, flowers and leaves - I think they're delicious."

As well as the glow of metal and gemstones, Emma will display imaginative leadlight pieces, more lustre and light and flowing lines.

The artists will give floor talks during the exhibition and there will be a range of artistic creations to suit every taste and every pocket. For more details, visit https://redlandscoastmuseum.org.au/ exhibitions/little-gems/









TRIBAL EXHIBITION CELEBRATES ARTISTIC AND CULTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The exhibition showcases personal portraits of the people and the rich cultural practices of these communities, including body painting with white ash, chalk, and red ochre clay, as well as adornments made from beads, feathers, shells, and other prized objects crafted with creativity. Scarification, piercings, and distinctive lip plates worn voluntarily and with pride by women are presented not as curiosities, but as expressions of beauty, strength, and cultural identity.

"With *Tribal*, I wanted to honour the strength and beauty of cultural traditions that continue to shape identity today. These images are about respect, resilience, and the stories that live within communities," said Pia Jessen.

While lip plates are often misunderstood by outsiders, within the Suri and Mursi tribes, they are a symbol of beauty, status, and commitment to culture. Traditionally worn during weddings, dances, and ceremonial gatherings, they remain a powerful marker of identity. Pia presents these practices with dignity and context.

In November, the Old SchoolHouse Gallery will also be installing popup shops featuring Christmas gifts by members, offering a plethora of

Here in Alexandra Hills, we have our depot for Rotary Australia Repurposing Equipment Northern Region (RARE), a section of Rotary Australia World Community Services (RAWCS). On Thursday and Saturday mornings, volunteers sort and pack donated medical and educational equipment that is no longer of use here, but is very welcome in many areas of the world.

Recently, containers of goods have been sent to Papua New Guinea, Manus Island, Vanuatu, Solomon Islands, Fiji, the Republic of Congo, and Uganda, filled with requested items. Once a month, we call upon Rotarians from several Brisbane clubs to come and assist, and recently, they answered the call with 16 volunteers from Cleveland out of a total of 60 volunteers, made up of Rotarians and friends. It's a wonderful way to help others in the world who do not have the privileges that we in Australia take for granted.

AFTER 174 YEARS, CLEVELAND'S GRAND OLD BEAUTY GETS HER FACELIFT – AND WE'RE READY FOR IT!

Since its origins in the early 1850s, the Grand View Hotel has been a cornerstone of Cleveland, evolving from the original Cleveland House into one of Queensland's oldest licensed pubs. Over nearly two centuries, it has witnessed the region's transformation, serving as a gathering place for travellers, locals and generations of families who've made memories within its walls.

In 2022, the Grand View entered a bold new chapter under the ownership of the Kickon Group, which set out to reimagine the historic pub for a new era. With deep respect for its heritage, the venue temporarily closed in 2024 for a design-led renovation, preserving the bones of the building while elevating its offering for today's guests.

Early in the works, a remarkable discovery was made: a 19th-century underground well, perfectly intact beneath a concrete slab between the old Emu Bar and what is now the new kitchen. This find aligned with historical records referencing an original "water tank capable of holding many hundred gallons" on the property. The team worked closely with heritage consultants to showcase the well as a feature, one of many ways the past now meets the present at the Grand View.

Today, the reimagined Grand View blends coastal charm and modern hospitality with unmistakable echoes of its history. The original foyer, hallway and "Cleveland Room" remain preserved, while newly added spaces include a state-of-the-art kitchen with Australia's largest rotisserie oven, a Josper Grill, Italian pizza oven, multiple dining areas, and a 120-guest function marquee complete with private bar and amenities. The function space is designed to suit every occasion, seating up to 120 guests or hosting up to 150 cocktail style, making it perfect for weddings, milestone celebrations, and corporate events alike.

Outdoors, the pet-friendly beer garden spills across landscaped lawns, with a big screen for live sport, a children's play area and an atmosphere that reflects the spirit of a true community pub. Regular live music will bring even more energy to the bayside, showcasing local talent and creating the perfect soundtrack for lazy weekends and long lunches.

The Grand View has always been more than bricks and mortar. It's a living archive of memory, connection and celebration, and now, with 174 years behind it and a new chapter just begun, the best is yet to come.

LOCAL SHORES, GLOBAL IMPACTS: GUARDIANS OF THE TIDES

Each year, as the tides shift and the weather warms, thousands of migratory shorebirds arrive on the shores of Redlands, Wynnum, Manly, and across Moreton Bay, some having flown all the way from Siberia and Alaska. Watching over them is a group of quiet heroes — the Queensland Wader Study Group (QWSG). For more than 30 years, these passionate volunteers have been rising early, binoculars in hand, carefully counting and recording the birds that feed on our tidal flats and roost along our shores.

Their meticulous work helps scientists understand how bird populations are changing, where they rest, and what pressures they face along the East Asian—Australasian Flyway, one of the world's great migration routes. The data QWSG collects is more than numbers on a page; it's crucial evidence that helps protect the Ramsar-listed wetlands of Moreton Bay, ensuring planners and decision-makers recognise the global significance of these areas.

Species like the Eastern Curlew, Bar-tailed Godwit, and Grey-tailed Tattler depend on these safe feeding grounds to recover from their

long flights. "Without healthy mudflats and mangroves, their future is at risk. Thanks to QWSG's ongoing commitment, we're not just counting birds, we're keeping watch over the health of an entire ecosystem," said Una Sanderman. Their work reminds us that what happens on our local shores truly connects us to the rest of the world.

Moreton Bay is one of the most important stopover sites for shorebirds travelling between Alaska, Siberia, and Australia, some flying over 10,000 kilometres to rest and feed on our tidal flats. These athletic birds rely on healthy mudflats and mangroves to survive their epic journeys. With increasing coastal development pressures, QWSG's long-term data provides essential evidence for environmental planning and habitat protection. Their citizen science work is all voluntary to help ensure that future generations can continue to see these remarkable birds along our shores each summer.

The Ramsar Convention is an international treaty for the conservation and wise use of wetlands, signed in Ramsar, Iran, in 1971. Its main goals are to stop the worldwide loss of wetlands and conserve those

that remain through national actions and international cooperation. Countries that are part of the convention must protect a designated Ramsar site, which is a wetland of international importance, and work to conserve all wetlands within their borders.



SMASHED POTATOES WITH SPICED BLACK BEANS AND AVOCADO LIME CREAM RECIPE

Here's an easy yet flavour-packed recipe that turns humble ingredients into a knockout dish – perfect for spring or summer! You can also cater for picky eaters by leaving the potatoes plain, because they still taste delicious.

INGREDIENTS

- 6 to 8 whole white potatoes (medium size)
- 1 tin of black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- · Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/4 cup parmesan cheese, grated

- 1 ripe avocado
- Juice of 1 lime
- 1 tomato, diced
- 1 small red or yellow capsicum, diced
- Optional: fresh coriander or spring onion for garnish



METHOD

1. Boil and Smash the Potatoes

- Place whole potatoes in a large pot of salted water.
- Boil until fork-tender (about 20 minutes).
- · Drain and let cool slightly
- Preheat oven to 220°C (fan-forced).
- Place potatoes on a lined baking tray and gently smash each one with a fork, the bottom of a heavy glass, or a potato masher.
- Drizzle with olive oil, scatter the parmesan over them, and season with salt and pepper.
- Bake for 25 to 30 minutes until golden and crispy.

2. Roast the Black Beans

- Spread black beans on a separate lined tray.
- Toss with cumin, olive oil, salt, and pepper.
- Bake in the same oven for 10 to 15 minutes until slightly crisped and fragrant.

3. Make the Avocado Lime Cream

- In a bowl, mash avocado until smooth.
- Stir in lime juice and a pinch of salt and pepper.
- Whip until creamy (use a fork or small blender for extra smoothness).

4. Assemble

 Top each smashed potato with a very generous dollop of sour cream – because sour cream makes everything better!

- Spoon the roasted black beans over the sour cream.
- Sprinkle with diced tomato and capsicum.
- · Finish with a swirl of avocado lime cream.
- · Garnish with fresh herbs if you have them.

LOCAL FISHING WITH SPERO

GET YOUR POTS IN THE WATER — THE CRABS ARE ON THE CRAWL!

The weather has warmed up nicely, and it's time to get your crab pots in the water. There are plenty of crabs around the bay, and you can tell as there are so many more crab pots you need to dodge on the way to your favourite fishing spots, and some folks just drop them anywhere – even in the channels where all the boats have to travel.

The crabs seem to be all over the bay now, from close in between the foreshore and Green Island, St Helena, and Mud Island, and in the deep and fast-running water on the eastern side of the Hope Banks and Amity Banks. I personally love to eat crabs, but I hate the mess of having pots on the boat, so I'm happy when a mate or two drops off a few.

As the water warms up even more, the crabbing should get better, so fresh boiled crabs and chili crab will be on my menu over the summer months.

The whiting fishing should be very good in the Rous and Chain Banks, with squid strips and bloodworms best for bait. I have been trying to save a few dollars and have been using frozen pipis as bait, which is working a treat and is very economical (and I find the paternoster rig works the best).

The school mackerel will be hit or miss this time of the year as the small ones are growing and having a break close in, but it's worth trying in the shipping channels. I am hoping the spotty mackerel season starts this year, as the water temperature will be warming up nicely – 71 degrees to 74 is the ideal temperature for the spotties to come into the bay. I hope it doesn't get too hot like last year when the spotties bypassed the bay, but all we can do is get the spinning gear and chrome slugs ready and hope for a good season.

The squire and snapper should be very good in November. and the fishing



should be good around Mt Cotton Reach. The Rous Channel and Harry's Artificial Reef are two of the best spots this time of year. Whole whiting is by far the best bait, followed by half crabs if you can afford to use them, and octopus and garfish are also very good options.

Wow! What a whale season in the bay! In October, it was amazing to see so many whales in the bay and so close again, and we might still see a few in November as well.

Till next month, good fishing, and good luck in the Melbourne Cup if you are having a bet; I am sticking with Zardozi if she runs ... haha!









Research consistently shows that vegan diets can be linked to lower rates of chronic illnesses like obesity, type 2 diabetes, and heart disease. A vegan label doesn't always mean healthy, with many processed vegan foods (snacks, frozen meals, and sweets) as nutrient-poor as their non-vegan counterparts.

One major risk with a restrictive diet is nutritional deficiencies such as vitamin B12, iron, calcium, vitamin D, iodine, zinc, and omega-3 fatty acids. Left unaddressed, these gaps can lead to serious health issues such as anemia, osteoporosis, cognitive decline, and nerve damage.

Spotlight on Vitamin B12

Among these nutrients, vitamin B12 stands out as especially critical. It plays a vital role in energy production, nerve function, and cognitive health. Since B12 is naturally found only in animal products, vegans must rely on fortified foods or supplements. Even then, absorption can be an issue due to individual digestive health.

To avoid deficiency, it's important to take a highquality B12 supplement and monitor your blood levels regularly. You can then determine the right dosage based on your needs.

Don't Forget Protein

Protein is essential for muscle repair, bone health, immune function, and mental wellbeing. Vegans may need more to account for lower absorption rates of plant proteins.

Plant-based protein sources include lentils, chickpeas, black beans, nuts (especially peanuts), soy products like tofu and tempeh, hemp seeds, and sea vegetables. Some plant foods, such as quinoa, chia seeds, soy, and buckwheat, are complete proteins, meaning they contain all nine essential amino acids. Combining different protein sources — like rice and beans — can also help ensure you're meeting your requirements.

Omega-3 Fatty Acids: The Inflammation Factor

Omega-3s, especially EPA and DHA, are crucial for brain, heart, and skin health. These fatty acids are usually found in oily fish, making it easy for vegan diets to fall short. Meanwhile, omega-6 fats — found in many plant oils — are often overconsumed, leading to inflammation when the omega-6:3 ratio is out of balance.

To counter this, include more omega-3-rich plant foods such as flaxseeds, chia seeds, walnuts, and hemp seeds. A clean algal oil supplement is also a great way to boost DHA and EPA intake.

Eating well on a vegan diet takes planning, but it's entirely possible to meet all your nutritional needs with the right approach. Focusing on whole, minimally processed foods, supplementing smartly, and checking in on your nutrient levels can help you avoid the pitfalls of "vegan depletion".

LOCAL GARDENING WITH KAT

FINE PINES!

Surely most people like pineapples. Unless they're on pizza, in which case it's swords drawn. But let's not go down THAT particular path. Pineapples exude tropical holidays – fresh slices wedged on the side of your cocktail (or mocktail) or tiny triangles adding a bit of zing to a fruit salad. Delicious.

Did you know that the pineapple you are savouring took anywhere from 18 to 24 months to grow? Definitely patience-testing – but that being said, they don't require any interference during that time, so you can set and forget.

Pineapple plants (*Ananas comosus*) are a member of the Bromeliaceae (bromeliad) family. They come from the Brazilian region in South America and their genus name, *Ananas*, means 'excellent fruit' in the Indigenous Tupi language.

The fruit is a compound fruit – the flower head has lots of individual flowers that each form a little fruit that then fuse together to make the pineapple we know, and at the top of the pineapple fruit is the start of another plant! The original plant your fruit grew on will die, so that more or less leaves you with a perpetual pineapple

situation. Unless, of course, you're lucky and your plant produces pups or 'slips' (baby plants) at the base, which can also flower and grow pineapples.

Pineapples are a non-climacteric fruit, which means they don't ripen after you pick them. They may continue to soften, and the chlorophyll (green colour) will fade, so they might get more yellow, but technically, they will not get sweeter. This means that pineapples grown at home are the best, because you can wait until they're golden yellow and perfectly ripe to give you the most excellent fruit!

To grow your own pineapple, take the top leafy section off a store-bought fruit, peel off the bottom few layers of leaves, and sit it in a saucer of water until it develops roots. Then, find a sunny spot to plant it (either in the ground or a pot) and water it a few times until it's established. Wait two years, testing your patience particularly over the last six months from the beginning of your flower (very exciting) until the fruit is perfectly ripe, and then be devastated when you realise there's a rat-sized hole in the other side and you need to start the process all over again. So, maybe plant a couple for backup...

LOCAL READERS A BOOK REVIEW – *SMALL BOAT* BY VINCENT DELECROIX

WHAT THE EXPERTS SAID:

"In November 2021, an inflatable dinghy carrying migrants from France to the United Kingdom capsized in the Channel causing the death of 27 people on board. Despite receiving numerous calls for help, the French authorities wrongly told the migrants they were in British waters and had to call the British authorities for help. By the time rescue vessels arrived on the scene, all but two of the migrants had died.

[This is a true story, detailed in the book's introduction, including conversations recorded among the boat's occupants and marine rescue officers in France and UK.]

"The narrator of Delecroix's fictional account of the events is the woman who took the calls. Accused of failing in her duty, she refuses to be held more responsible than others for this disaster. A shocking, moral tale of our times, *Small Boat* reminds us of the power of fiction to illuminate our darkest crimes." *Source: Reading Guide for Small Boat, published on the Booker Prize website.*

MY THOUGHTS:

What a gob smacking, gut-wrenching story – both the real and fictional versions!

The book is in three parts: the first, apparently a police interrogation of the French marine rescue officer (the narrator) who received the refugees' calls for help and failed to act; the second, the harrowing experience of the refugees on the boat as it filled with water and ejected them into the sea; and in the final, we are inside the marine rescue officer's head as she interrogates herself.

She appeared to be inhumanely cold and indifferent, refusing to be apologetic for her callous remarks — "I didn't ask you to leave". "You will not be saved". She said she had no opinions, no thoughts on the refugees. "[In my job] I'm required precisely not to have convictions or a conscience."

Regarding the sinking, she expressed exasperation and indifference. Boat people should have been calm and patient, "instead of continuing their endless pointless pleading ... instead of calling 14 times in two hours to say they were sinking, instead of annoying me by saying it over and over again as if it was me that didn't understand when I did... Your feet are in the water, but it's English water, not French."

Despite being astounded and disgusted by her heartlessness, through attempting to understand how she could have become so, I felt some sympathy for her. "When had the sinking begun? I was just the last


link in the chain." Part of the author's message is that we are all accomplices and bystanders in the suffering of refugees and the situations that make them so. I take the point.

And the narrator's perception of empathy struck a chord: "You can either have it and do nothing, or act without it, but you can't act with empathy". I disagree,



but I recall that as a trainee nurse, some of the more experienced nurses expressed a similar view. It was a self-protection mechanism to prevent themselves becoming too personally affected by others' suffering – one that emerges when someone is burnt out by constantly facing misery they can't avert.

In the end, despite her protests about having no conscience, I think her doubts about this prompted the very deep, circular personal interrogation she underwent to try to understand herself and how she had come to act as she did. The outcome of this is vague, but my interpretation was she found herself wanting.
